As we saw at the last regatta, a capsize can happen when you least expect it and keeping a calm head and working together as a team is paramount this is what Anita's sessions are all about.

Thanks to **Anita Godley** who held another fabulous Water Safety Session with new insights and experiences for paddlers. Each of these sessions enables us to test what we know and discover something we didn't know. Each time we do this, we can be more confident about our response should our boat ever capsize. All paddlers are strongly encouraged have the full experience of being in the water fully clothed; plus or minus a PFD; to understand your own response and how we support each other as a team. If you haven't been yet, please make the next session a priority.

Our other work currently is building up for the IBCPC Participatory Dragon Boat Festival NZ in

April. The team is coming along fabulously; the commitment and effort of each member is evident every we go out in the boat. We have dual paddlers and supporters coming alongside our usual crew to create a progressive momentum that is positioning us well for New Zealand. An amazing team!

Our team is always a delightful mix of paddlers who are new to the club through to those well experienced. As such, we seek to create different sessions to accommodate all paddlers. **DAC Lite** is now a regular session for newer and returning paddlers and the **Extra Effort** session is now 45 minutes for those who want to go harder for longer. Successful Green Shed submission

Both **Kellie Nissen** as our current Dragons Abreast Coordinator, and myself, as a former Coordinator, were very pleased to accept the \$10,000 from <u>The</u> <u>Green Shed</u> co-owner **Sandie Parkes**

(28 December 2022) for our successful Green Shed submission to their call to charities and nonfor-profit organisations in February 2018 (https://www.canberratimes.com.au/story/6022784/calling-allcharities-the-green-shed-wants-you/).

The successful Dragons Abreast Canberra 28 March 2018 submission was compiled by Julie Kesby (Coordinator 2016-18) and Susan Pitt (Assistant Coordinator 2017-18) and supported by the DA Canberra Committee at the time. We were very excited to be notified on 27 April 2018 by one of the co-owners Elaine Stanford that we were to be the recipient of the full \$10,000 as part of The Green Shed (TGS) Charity Day. The TGS owners, at the time, checked 140 requests and selected organisations for the next round of recipients. All local not-for-profit organisations were eligible, but applicants were ranked according to their needs, and the community benefit they offered. We were advised to be patient as it could be up to 24 months (or more) for our club to be 'Green Shed Club of the Month'. This meant receiving publicity for the club, and The Green Shed sales on the last Wednesday of the month, (where 100% of the total sales for that day from Mitchell and Mugga Lane sheds goes towards the chosen charity or not-forprofit organisation for that month) until reaching the magic figure of \$10,000!

Wow! Our persistence with our Green Shed submissions paid off. I first made a submission to The Green Shed in 2014 and obtained \$500 towards the design of our IBCPC parade T-shirt for Sarasota, Florida. This had been their last call for their charity/not-for-profit listing. It took four years to get through their listing after the call in 2014, before their next call in 2018. Many thanks to **Susan Pitt** for her advice in the preparation of the successful 2018 The Green Shed submission, for which we received \$10,000 in 2022!

Some of the delay in receiving these funds in 2022 was due to our place in the listing, but, was also mainly due to both sheds being shut down during the COVID-19 pandemic. Co-founder Elaine Sreiic kindly notified us on 25 March 2020 that they were suspending TGS Charity/Non-for-profit collection day/process until further notice as they had to close two of their outlets due to COVID-19, and were unsure what the future held for the two sheds. There was a change in the TGS partnership of four (Elaine, Sandra, Tiny and Charlie) to two (Sandie and Charlie). Sandie Parkes advised me on 25 October 2022 that they would begin collecting for Dragons Abreast Canberra at their Mugga Lane and Mitchell Green Sheds. We would be advised when the \$10,000 target was reached. I received the good news on 19 December 2022 from Sandie that they collected enough on our 'Green Shed Club of the Month' days to pay us The Green Shed donation of \$10,000.

Finally, on 28 December 2022, **Kellie Nissen** and I were photographed with Sandie Parkes to celebrate the receipt of the \$10,000.

One of her favourite changes has been the way in which Goodwin has become a part of the local community, aided by the distinctive new uniforms. She says, 'You walk into Woolworths now and people recognise you, we get acknowledged a lot.'

When asked if she has ever considered moving, Denise said, 1've been offered other jobs lots of times, but I've olways said no I'm quite happy where I am. I like the people, and there were clients that would miss me and I'd miss them.'

Denise describes being a carer as 'being a window to the outside world' for many clients, and exploins the joy they have brought her, too. 'I've learnt so many things. There are excellent cooks, and there are people who love gardening, which I love, and there are quilters and more. Everyone has something interesting and special about them.'



My mastectomy didn't affect my femininity

Diary of a breast cancer survivor

At age 52, **Clare Purcell** was busy and distracted. Her work as a registered nurse was intense and her mother had just passed. 'I was just doing so much, and life was pretty emotional at that point. So, I chose to put screening to the side,' she remembers.

A year later, she was walking past a BreastScreen clinic when she decided to take action. She booked a screening, and several appointments later was told she had a tumour that was too big to operate on.

'I look back at the time where I didn't do anything and think, 'Why did I take so long? Why didn't I do things differently?" she says. "So many regrets.'

'My mastectomy didn't affect me in terms of femininity or a sense of worth.'

For eight months, she underwent non-surgical treatment to shrink the tumour to have surgery. Luckily the treatment was successful, and her surgery was booked in.

'It would be wrong to say I wasn't nervous, but I wasn't scared at that point either,' she recalls.

Unfortunately, one surgery turned into six. In the end, she elected to undergo a mastectomy to ensure she was cancer-free. Now, ten years later, Clare understands many women might be nervous about screenings, but her advice is simple.

'You may want to take a friend or your husband in with you but go and get it done! Screenings are so quick. BreastScreen are so experienced at it and they're very respectful of you as a patient,' she advises.

'It's just not worth procrastinating. Trust me.'

Is it time?

One of the most effective ways to treat breast cancer is by detecting it early, before you may even notice any symptoms at all. By inviting women 50–74 to book free mammograms, Australia's national breast screening program, **BreastScreen Australia**, aims to be the breast friend you need for your breasts.

Did you know?

- One in seven women will develop breast cancer in their lifetime. Of these, only 1 in 10 women with breast cancer have a family history of the disease.
- Age is the biggest risk factor. Around 75% of women diagnosed with breast cancer are over 50.
- The best way to find breast cancer is to have regular breast screenings.
- Early detection saves lives. If found early, breast cancer is easier to treat and there's an increased chance of survival.
- Aged between 50 and 74? It's time for your free screening. Regular mammograms can detect very small breast cancers before they can be seen or felt.
- Breast screenings are recommended every two years for women.
- There are 750 locations nationally.
- All BreastScreen radiographers are female and use state-of-the-art equipment.
- Just 20 minutes every two years could save your life.

<u>Beth Lefevre</u>, now almost 40, is a strong advocate for younger women dealing with cancer. She finds the theme of **World Cancer Day, 4 February**, *Close the Care Gap*, especially relevant.

"What we're all trying to do — community groups as well as government and medical service providers — is work together to better support each other."

'It's also important to recognise the role of carers and friends. A housemate or close friend can go through the same stages of grief as a family member, which should be recognised.'

Breast cancer research in MJA top 10

BCNA celebrates **Dr Sally Lord** and her colleagues for being acknowledged for their research on the long term of risk of metastatic breast cancer after a breast cancer diagnosis.

Their research was named in the top 10 of original research articles published in 2022 by the MJA's editor-in-chief.

They found distant metastasis (DM) in women with non-metastatic breast cancer risk declines with time from diagnosis of non-metastatic breast cancer, and the annual risk of dying from breast cancer declines with time from initial DM detection.

These findings can be used to inform patients at follow-up about changes in risk since diagnosis and for planning health services.

In 2022, Sally also informed modelling used by BCNA for its issues paper <u>Making Metastatic</u> <u>Breast Cancer Count – No longer Hidden in</u> <u>Plain Sight</u> released last year.
