PRESIDENT'S REPORT

2018 was a year of highs and lows for hockey in Queensland.

The Commonwealth Games provided many highs including the selection of Mark Knowles -#TeamQld Ambassador - to carry the Australian Flag during the opening ceremony. The successes of the Kookaburras and Hockeyroos at the state-of-the-art Gold Coast Hockey Centre highlighted the caliber of players and facilities. Sadly, yet understandable, we saw the retirement from the representative scene by Mark immediately at the conclusion of the final. However, he remains committed to hockey and is greatly involved in coaching, mentoring and still enjoying playing on a more local level.

Congratulations to Jan 'PB' Hadfield on the outstanding achievement of being awarded a Member of the Order (AM) in The Order of Australia for significant service to hockey as an international umpire, and to professional development of officials. This is an exceptional achievement recognising Jan's long term commitment, contribution and major impact on hockey from local to international level.

The decision by Hockey Australia to return to a home and away competition for the final year of the Australian Hockey League and transition into a new national format was also a great success. A home game was hosted at the State Hockey Centre which was well attended. A real festival atmosphere enveloped the centre. The final week of the competition and finals were conducted at the Gold Coast Hockey Centre which also provided an engaging atmosphere for players and spectators.

Congratulations to the Scorchers and Blades for their continued success in the Australian Hockey League. The Blades played exciting hockey to secure another Gold Medal victory, gaining their 10th title. The Scorchers made the final, only to fall just short in an exciting finale to the women's AHL, finishing in 2nd place. Congratulations to all management personnel in the programs.

The new National League will see an exciting brand of hockey to continue to raise hockey's profile and fan base, showcase our high performance players and support our grass roots clubs to grow their members.

Our technical officials and umpires have also achieved great things during 2018. Congratulations to Aleisha Neuman who was awarded the QSport's Konica Minolta Queensland Sport Officiator of the Year and officiated at both the Commonwealth Games and the World Cup. Congratulations also to Adam Kearns who officiated at the Rio Olympics, achieving the Golden Whistle with 100 International games at this year's World Cup final.

Joanne Greensill and Gary Marsh were appointed as Technical Officials for the Commonwealth Games.

The Masters International Hockey Association also recognized the significant contribution of Australian technical officials, particularly the large contingent of Queenslanders.

These are just a few of the high achievers in the officiating area of hockey in Queensland and they should all be commended for their commitment to the sport.

We also saw the Australian men's and women's indoor teams achieve their best ever results, rising two spots up the FIH Indoor Hockey World Rankings and Hockey Qld is extremely proud of our four Queenslanders - Lindsay Howard, Clare Comerford, Troy Rossiter and Aidan Campbell. 2018 also saw a very successful inaugural Indoor Masters National Competition.

A significant low was when the hockey community paid tribute and said goodbye to former Hockey Queensland President, Jim Quaite OAM, who passed away. Jim played a pivotal role in the formation of Hockey Queensland in its current format and held the position of President from 1995 through to 2001. He was also integral in obtaining funding for the construction of the State Hockey Centre. Jim was also an accomplished coach and led Under 18, Under 19, Under 21 and Open Women's teams successfully over many years. Jim was awarded QHA Award of Merit in 1985, an OAM in 1990 for services to hockey, HQ Life Membership in 1996 and Hockey Australia Life Membership in 2000.

A highlight for the Women's Masters through the year was an extremely successful tournament in Townsville where the Townsville Hockey Association and their volunteers out-did themselves. This was made even more special by three members of the original Townsville Veterans Team from 1984 being present to assist with the tournament's awards ceremony. Townsville also achieved great success with their new junior program attracting over 170 under 11 players.

Rockhampton Hockey Association's success in securing the 2019 Oceania Cup is an outstanding achievement and we look forward to the hockey community enjoying the first international event in Queensland in many years.

Further in this Annual Report the many successful teams and officials will be reported in full by their respective committees. To all involved, your passion and energy for the sport is recognised and from all who participate a hearty thank you.

To those players who have been honoured with National selection and those who have attained National Awards, Hockey Qld is proud of your achievements and celebrate them in conjunction with all.

The State Hockey Centre (SHC) management and infrastructure continues in a positive manner and has this year seen a number of improvements. The SHC will continue to be upgraded as a result of significant grants being received. Work will begin soon, specifically to enhance facilities around field two.

Throughout the year many Associations obtained grants and funding for projects. Acknowledgment of our sponsors and partners is a necessity and your involvement and support is appreciated. Major League Marketing continues to work in conjunction with Hockey Qld to promote our great game, launching the Play Hockey campaign, attracting and maintaining sponsors and uphold communication avenues to hockey's benefit. Their work is acknowledged in that capacity. The support of the Queensland Government, Australian Government Department of Prime Minister and Cabinet, PCYC and QAS are all instrumental in the functioning of our sport - and we gratefully acknowledge each contribution.

In closing I would like to thank Louisa, all of the Hockey Queensland staff and the army of volunteers for their tireless service and contribution in promoting hockey and providing a framework for all player levels to participate, enjoy and progress in our great game.



REMOTE AND INDIGENOUS HOCKEY PROGRAM

Hockey Queensland's Remote and Indigenous Program (RIHP) was busy in 2018, making inroads in numerous communities and regions around the state. The program takes a whole of community involvement approach in educating and training participants for life long learning and engagement.

The Community Actions Plans for regions and communities are progressing and continues Hockey Queensland's State wide commitment Reconciliation Action Plan. These plans will be integrated into future policy and planning of the Indigenous program. Letters of support from our associates in the program as well as parliamentarians is testament to the ongoing positive impact the program is having in regions.

Without doubt the stand out for the RIHP was the staging of the Commonwealth Games Legacy event on the Gold Coast. Four regional events were held and culminated with the Gold Coast festival. The Preston Campbell Foundation allowed the participants a glimpse into Indigenous culture. The logistics of transporting young Indigenous people and carers from around the state to the Gold Coast was a massive effort. The local media featured the games on television and papers which is a positive for the RIHP and hockey. Feedback has been overwhelmingly supportive and Hockey Qld will look to source backing for future Championships.

The program covers a large physical area with delivery covering in the far north to Weipa and Aurukun, west to Charleville and south down to Goondiwindi. Many remote communities in between including the Indigenous communities of Cherbourg and Murgon situated in Central Queensland and the Indigenous community of Stradbroke Island and Dunwich State School.

In central Queensland Hookin2Hockey programs with schools, distance education centres and PCYCs have been well received. Isolated Children and Parents Association (ICPA) have invited RIHP into their Clermont Festival for a number of years and have now extended the invitation to the Charters Towers Festival. The festivals expose Remote and Indigenous children to sport, the start of friendships and life-long learning and enjoyment. Gala days in Murgon and Cherbourg are increasing as the community realises the importance that sport can play in the lives of young people.

The Mt Isa region which includes Doomadgee, Camooweal and Dajarra is progressing and the links with PCYC's, communities and Sport and Recreation departments are being cemented to ensure that the program is ongoing. The Karumba Sports Festival was attended and will be part of the calendar in future planning days. The South West region, in partnership with South West Indigenous Network toured a couple of 10 day sporting trips to the western towns of Queensland. The RIHP has immersed into the Townsville area with numerous schools and communities taking on hockey sessions. The nearby towns have also embraced the program and taken advantage of the availability of a development officer.

Hockey Queensland is pleased to thank all of our stakeholders, partners, communities, local community members and Associations for their support of the RIHP and to enable the continuing success of the program. We would also like to acknowledge the on-going support of the Queensland Government and Federal Government. The positive outcomes from the programs and services we deliver are achieved by leading and setting achievable expectations and improving on what has been delivered previously.

Tributes flow for stalwart of game

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HOCKEY: "It's hard to believe what he did could be done in a lifetime."

Bundaberg's Jim Quaite will be remembered by those who knew him as a family man dedicated to his business and his love of one sport - hockey.

Quaite died suddenly on Thursday at the age of 85 after battling heart issues for almost two decades.

He leaves behind a legacy that might never be matched, particularly in hockey.

Quaite was instrumental in establishing and setting up what is now Hockey Queensland.

In 1995, he amalgamated the men's and women's association to set up the one entity, breaking down barriers that led to Queensland becoming the dominant force in the sport.

He would serve as president from the start until 2001, overseeing the building of the State Hockey Centre and the hosting of the international competition the Champions Trophy.

But not only was Quaite an astute administrator, he knew plenty about the game.

He represented Queensland and helped The Waves Cities dominate the Bundaberg Hockey Association competition with 16 straight titles from 1960 to 1976, which Quaite captained 10 of them.

He also represented the Rum City and led the side to a win in 1967 at the state championships against Brisbane that featured five Kookaburras players.

Finally, he could coach, guiding the women's under-17, under-19 and open sides to national titles for Queensland.

He did it all and was officially recognised with an Order of Australia merit award in 1990 for his services to the sport.

Quaite also has life memberships in the BHA, Hockey Queensland and Hockey Aus-

tralia for his achievements.

"He was a down-to-earth humble man with an enthusiasm, energy and knowledge of the game that helped Queensland teams become a leading force in all ages/teams," Hockey Queensland participation manager Margaret Diller said.

"As a coach, Jim's forward-thinking ideas took hockey in Queensland to a new level and then - as an administrator - led Hockey Queensland to become the organisation we have today.

"Jim was a true gentleman and great statesman for the sport. His legacy to hockey is far reaching as a player, coach and administrator. He will be missed by the hockey community."

For Quaite's family, he was the man they could rely on in times of need.

He ran his own electrical business, away from hockey, which still runs today through his son Robert, and was happy to live and bring up his family in Bundaberg.

Quaite moved to the region in 1949 and lived here until his death after being born in Townsville.

"He gave them (family) strength in times of trouble, wisdom in times of uncertainty and sharing in times of happiness," Michael Edgar said on behalf of the family.

"He was extremely happy in his own environment."

"He was a great friend to a lot of people."

Edgar, who is also writing the eulogy, said the family told him Jim Quaite was a wonderful man that always had time for people.

"With his ability in hockey he could have gone anywhere," he said.

"He was very close to his family and had a great value of life."

"He didn't tolerate fools but didn't have a go at any that failed."

"He believed in having a go and that was one of his mottos."

Quaite is survived by his wife Elsie, his children and children-in-law Marion, Carol and Gary, James and Rhonda (deceased), Robert and Barbara, his eight grandchildren and 12 great-grandchildren.

His funeral will be held tomorrow at the Branyan Gardens on Cummins Rd at 1pm.

Big win top way to retire

Mark Knowles was sent into retirement a happy man as Australia beat New Zealand 2-0 in the Commonwealth Games hockey final. The Easts Hockey Club member played strongly in his 325th and last match of his 15-year international career as Australia maintained their standing as the kings of the Commonwealth, securing their sixth men's hockey gold from as many attempts. Knowles did, however, fall short of nailing the fairytale punchline when he took a penalty stroke with five minutes to play but lifted it just above the bar.

Teammates swooped on the match ball at full time and gave it to their captain. "It's a beautiful night, couldn't have scripted it, the boys were so good," Knowles, a Carina resident, said. "I'm so proud. I looked at the clock a few times after I missed that stroke. I am so glad the boys held out. I love the game and I leave it in a good place. "Maybe tomorrow it will sink in, I'm so proud, I'm so happy for the guys, the ones that haven't done this before. I wouldn't give back a second of my career."



Knowles was honoured with the role as Australian flag-bearer at the opening ceremony and had moved home from the national hockey base in Perth to Brisbane last year with a view to concentrating on Commonwealth Games gold. Murarrie local and Bulimba Hockey Club junior Daniel Beale, Easts Hockey Club junior Jake Whetton and ex-Easts player Dylan Wotherspoon were also members of the gold medal-winning Australian team. In the women's event, former Bulimba Hockey Club player Sean Dancer helped New Zealand win its first Commonwealth Games hockey gold medal. Dancer, who also represented the Queensland Blades, is manager of the New Zealand women's hockey team. New Zealand defeated Australia 4-1 in the Commonwealth Games gold medal game at the Gold Coast on Saturday. Another past Bulimba Hockey Club player, Danielle Hennig, helped Canada finish fifth in the women's hockey competition.

W-League shot won't sway Rosie

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HOCKEYROOS young gun Rosie Malone has turned down a shot at a W-League football career to chase her Australian hockey dream.

Less than 48 hours after accepting a spot in the 27-player national senior women's squad based in Perth, the *Bulletin* understands Molendinar-based Malone was on Thursday offered the chance to trial with a W-League heavy-weight.

The 20-year-old striker, who left on Friday to link with the Hockeyroos at the Tri Nations series in New Zealand, plays NPL Women's football for Souths United and, at 14, was the youngest player ever chosen in the Australian under-17 female team.

Her talent was on full display earlier this season when she shut down Gold Coast United goal machine Meg McElligott in their sides' NPL showdown.

Malone has often been forced to choose between the two sports but the biggest moment of her career arrived in January when she made her Hockeyroos debut against Spain.

She will have just two weeks to relocate to Perth when the Hockeyroos return from New Zealand on May 29.

"The big thing for her now is the hockey World Cup (in England from July 21 to August 5)," mother Cheryl said.

"I'm definitely heartbroken (for her to go to Perth) but obviously very happy she's living her dream as well. It's all very emotional and it's never nice to say goodbye to your daughter but I just said 'you've got to do it'."

Hockeyroos coach Paul Gaudoin, who oversaw Australia's 4-1 win over New Zealand in Cromwell on Sunday, said Malone was a special talent. "We're excited to welcome her into our squad and ... continuing her development," he said.



Blood in the water

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SOUTH Coast veteran Renee Ashton believes the Sharks can build a Queensland Super League dynasty of their own after ending Brisbane's reign at the State Hockey Centre.

Runners-up to Brisbane for the 2016 and 2017 seasons, South Coast finally broke through for a maiden QSL title with a comprehensive 4-1 triumph over the three-time champions in the final on Monday.

Ashton, whose career CV includes Brisbane and Gold Coast division 1 premierships and national titles in Australia and New Zealand, opened the scoring in the 10th minute, before Brisbane hit back in the second quarter through Rhyleigh Brown.

But it was all one-way traffic from then on, with third-quarter goals from Emily Hetherington and Sarah Gasnier and a last-minute strike from Hetherington sealing an unbeaten tournament for the Sharks.

"The girls were so happy and even more so because we'd played Brisbane in the final twice already," said the

25-year-old, who hasn't missed a tournament for the Sharks since the launch of the QSL in 2012.

"To have a win and not just a win, we beat them convincingly, it was a great feeling for everyone to get that one."

"Everyone loves to beat Brisbane and because they've been dominant for so long, even the crowd in Brisbane were cheering for us because we've been the underdogs for so long."

"We've got so much depth

and we can see it coming through in this tournament."

"The team is so experienced but the juniors that are coming through are showing so much promise."

"We've been knocking on the door for so many years

but this year we were able to show we'll be a competitive team, not just for this year, but for many years to come. It was fantastic to see."

The South Coast men finished fourth at the three-day, six-team competition.

Hill's career powers on

LYN Hill will be playing with the Australian Wattles over 60s hockey team in this month's World Cup, five decades after starting in the sport.

"I have played it since I was 11 years old," Hill said.

"It was a family sport which has given me family, fun, friends and fitness along the way," the Ascot Women's Hockey Club vicepresident said.

Hill started her hockey life in Rockhampton which has a rich, proud history in hockey.

Retiring Australian captain Mark Knowles hails from the Central Queensland city along with the great Jamie Dwyer, among many other fine players.

She has called Ascot Hockey Club home since 1998, a place Hill describes as "really friendly".

"Everyone gets along from the top division to the lowest division and everyone is treated equally. It is a small club striving to do good things."

Corey craving spot

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LABRADOR midfielder Corey Piggis is treating every game as a Queensland Blades selection trial as he closes in on his Australian Hockey League dream.

Named in a preliminary Blades squad for the third time during the week, the 23-year-old is still waiting for the chance to represent his state at AHL level.

One of 35 players chosen in the Queensland squad, the Ormeau resident will have another golden opportunity to push his selection case when Labrador tackle table-topping Commercial in Round 5 of the Brisbane Hockey League today.

"I've played with the Blades, like when the Commonwealth Games were on. I played against the Indian and Scotland Games teams, but never in the AHL. I was going to think a year ago but I went over to Belgium to play so I kind of flagged that one and did the tourist thing over there," Piggis, a member of the South Coast team that finished fourth at last weekend's Queensland Super League, said.

"For me, AHL is one step next to playing in the Kookaburras team. In the AHL, you're playing at the top level representing Queensland and all the way through juniors that's what you aspire to."

"Playing well at Super League does affect (selection chances) but they also look at, throughout the whole year, how consistent you are. You've got to play well in your club hockey, that's what I've been told. Hopefully the next step is to play for the Kookas."

Labrador enter the 3pm battle with Commercial at Chermide in third spot, having picked up their third triumph against Valley in their last start on April 28.

Training routines for the Tigerstix have been hampered by the staging of the Commonwealth Games, but Piggis said they would be firing on all cylinders against a Commercial side riding a four-game winning streak.

"You always have that one team that you're not big fans on. We're not big fans of Commercial and it's always good to get on top of them," the born-and-bred Gold Coaster said.

"Everyone does lift for those games against them and gets geared up for it."

Tears and gear

PAPUA New Guinea-born Dawn English was brought to tears when she learned the Gold Coast Hockey Association was arranging donations of playing equipment to PNG children.

"I grew up playing hockey in PNG, so I know equipment is expensive and hard to come by," Dawn said.

"Kids are carving hockey sticks from trees and playing barefoot, which means so many injuries."

The Gold Coast Hockey Association put the call out for equipment donations when they learned of the plight of PNG junior hockey.

Brisbane-based Dawn, 46, and her team The White Orchids say the donations will fill a genuine need.

"Hockey is a family sport we love in PNG but our clubs are struggling so it's brilliant to hear of the donations campaign," she said.

"A lack of equipment is definitely a barrier to playing at hockey tournaments since

they require shoes and mouthguards for safety.

"Junior hockey is continuing to grow so we are grateful for the donations that will go a long way to help children enjoy their favourite sport safely."

The White Orchids have been playing at the Pan Pacs since 1996.

"The team have been selling doughnuts and ice blocks for two years to save money for their plane tickets; their families even chip in," Dawn said.

"Coming to the Pan Pacs means so much to them because hockey is such a big part of their lives and brings people together."

Pan Pacific Masters Games hockey convener Kathy Devitt has been leading the donations effort.

"In the hockey community, if one person spreads the word it has a domino effect," Kathy said.

Donations can be left at the Gold Coast Hockey Centre in Musgrave Ave, Labrador, until 5pm today.

Kenny's title bid starts at same venue

BURPENGARY husband and wife Shane and Jodie Kenny and their Queensland teammates will be seeking revenge when the Australian Hockey League starts on Saturday.

The Queensland Blades men and Scorchers women's sides lost their 2017 Australian Hockey League finals against Victoria.

Jodie Kenny is one of 10 past and present Australian Hockeyroos players in the Scorchers squad.

Shane's Queensland Blades men's side has nine Australian players, but for the first time in around 15 years the Blades will be without captain Mark Knowles, who has retired.

The 2018 Australian Hockey League has two pools of four teams playing home-and-away matches for three weeks, before the finals.

Queensland is in the same pool as Canberra, Tasmania and New South Wales and opens their campaign against New South Wales in Sydney on October 6.

Hockey's 'Big Bash' will be in a league of its own

AUSTRALIAN hockey is determined to shed its reputation as a sport which pokes its head into mainstream media coverage every two years.

Hockey is best known in Australia through the deeds of the men's Kookaburras and women's Hockeyroos at Olympic and Commonwealth Games but next year it will

introduce a city-based format like a version of cricket's Big Bash League.

Momentum is building and tonight the Queensland men's and women's sides - the Blades and Scorchers - have attracted a sold-out crowd of about 1500 fans to the Australian Hockey League matches against Tasmanian sides at the Queensland State Hockey Centre.

With Australian hockey moving into a new phase, the Queensland teams decided to pay homage to the

players who performed for their teams during the AHL's 18-year existence when they won eight men's and four women's titles.

Every player's name has been emblazoned on the new strip.

"Hockey in Australia has long had great participation figures and enjoyed fantastic support from within our community," Hockey Australia chief executive Matt Favier said.

"We're wanting to capitalise on this but also build the sport's profile

and audience with a revamped domestic league played around Australia and broadcast into living rooms.

"It is ambitious but next year's league will be bigger and better than ever before."

In a bid to make the sport more attractive several new rules have been trialled in the AHL this year including allowing a player, after they have scored a goal, to have a shot at an extra goal with a one-on-one shootout with the goalkeeper.

Soap hockey fun at the Mount Isa fields

Soap and hockey are not normally two words uttered together in the one sentence but soap hockey was the fun on offer at the Mount Isa Hockey Grounds on the weekend.

Created in Sweden where it is called "Håsjösåpan" (taking its name from the town in which it was founded - Håsjö - and the Swedish word for soap "såpan"), soap hockey is played on a soap-slicked tarp and is a craze sweeping the world and arrived in Mount Isa on the weekend.



Hornets Hockey Club were holding their annual general meeting at the grounds on Saturday and club president Fiona Liddle said soap opera was their way of getting the kids involved. "It's a way of welcoming the kids to the season," Ms Liddle said. "One of our members had a video of it posted on his Facebook page and he tagged us all in it and said this would be a fun thing to do. "But I don't know who's having more fun, the big kids or the little ones."

Ms Liddle said they would now look at adding soap hockey on a more regular basis as preparations continue positively for this year. "Our club had a rough year last year," she said. "Our mens and our ladies teams struggled for numbers last year but we've had a bit of a resurgence this year."

Ms Liddle said they were looking really good for the season ahead.

"Numbers for all the club team members have improved this year although we are still looking for players for our under 15s in particular.

"So any under 15s that want to come along and give it a go please come on down."

HQ OPERATING COMMITTEES REPORTS

HIGH PERFORMANCE ADVISORY GROUP (HPAG)

The HPAG was formed in 2014 with the key objective to facilitate the advice and recommendations from the HPAG to Hockey Queensland on strategic matters pertaining to the talent development pathway, competition and development programs in Queensland. HPAG currently meets monthly and agendas include a range of matters listed below based on key activities, priorities for the year and specific needs.

- Oversee and provide input into strategic matters relating to competition and development.
- Provide recommendations to the CEO across Talent Development, High Performance and Competitions including timing of the Annual Events Calendar.
- Opportunities to attract visiting teams and/or potential development tours and linkage into Hockey Australia Player Development initiatives.
- Provide advice on innovations to competition formats.
- Establish, implement and review a robust, transparent and timely selection process and development pathway system for players, coaches, managers, selectors and officials for HQ teams.
- Appoint coaches, managers, selectors and officials based on recommendations from the Operating Committees.
- Establish, implement and review the required policies to ensure alignment with national policies and relevance for Queensland.

During the year considerable time has been spent on reviewing the changes in format for AHL. An invitation was issued to HA President Mel Woosnam to attend our July meeting which she did in conjunction with HQ President Steve Stewart.

The Commonwealth Games provided opportunities for matches against visiting teams from Scotland & India (March 2018) as well as Malaysian Women (July 2018)

COACH & PLAYER PATHWAY

Some of the initiatives undertaken in 2018 involved:

Identifying and developing, through camps, players in the 16 years age group, who historically lose interest beyond Under 15 representative level. The players at these camps are coached by the HQHP Coaches on the latest techniques for skill development. The camps conducted have received very positive feedback from the Hockey Community and are conducted in Regional areas, providing opportunity for local coaches to attend and update their knowledge.

Coaching Conferences were again conducted for all RCD's & RDO's with all State Team Coaches invited as part of the support and development of those coaches. One of the conferences targeted "Participation" and was conducted in conjunction with Hockey Australia and the 2018 AHL Finals.

A High Performance, Advanced Coaches course was conducted in conjunction with Hockey Australia, with 15 Queensland Coaches upskilled to the next level of accreditation.

The introduction of an Under 23 program for both Female and Male athletes (block training) has been well received and provides opportunity for further development to those players moving out of the Under 21 age group, and having not yet achieved AHL level. As part of this program the squads travelled to Sydney for competition with NSW which was scheduled during the AHL round that weekend. This competition provided the next step in the Development of this group and provided the HQ High Performance Coaches with an opportunity to assess the players and their ongoing development.

It is important that we continue to support our State Team Coaches with their development, through attendance at Nationals by the HQHP Coaches & TPPM where ever possible.

Due to the good work of the RCD/RDO network, we continue to conduct numerous Level 1 & 2 Coaching Courses throughout the State, which provides a great foundation for all Coaches looking to progress on the Coaching Pathway.

Another great coach development initiative has been coaches attendance at State Team Trials (U15 and U18) and the 16 years Player Camps to develop coaching skills in a competition environment. This opportunity allows for coach assessment with feedback provided to coaches who may wish to continue to develop to a representative level.

Hockey Queensland now ensures Assistant Coaches are appointed to all Queensland Teams from U13 to AHL.

These roles provide excellent development opportunities in a National Championship environment.

The Regional Coaching Directors around the State play an important part in the development of coaches within each centre and do a great job in continuing to bring competent coaches through the Queensland coaching system.

The continued growth of Indoor Hockey has provided yet another Pathway for players and coaches within Hockey Queensland. Thank you to all those who work so hard in the area of Indoor, led by Lyn Hill.

Thank you to all coaches across Queensland for their commitment and contribution to developing players on their pathway.

The IHA Group held a Season Review Meeting in February, 2018 with a main focus on the following:

HQ Registration Fees for all Indoor Players

Discussion continues on how to encourage all Indoor Centres to have their players register with HQ regardless of whether they were participating in State Team Challenges or not. There is definite growth in the number of players attending STC in Queensland and it was recognised that there is a need to re-align the State Team Challenges for teams to enter and have reasonable playing time in each competition. It was decided to separate under age tournaments by holding male and female tournaments at different venues or weekends. The Super 6 Series to be combined for Men and Women as a trial to showcase the premium Indoor event and continue live streaming.

The need for more venues to host State Team Challenges

In 2018-19, Gold Coast held their first STC (U18 girls) for a number of years, Toowoomba hosted both the Super 6 Series Men and Women and the U18 Boys, Maryborough hosted the U15 Girls and U13 boys, Brisbane the U15 Boys and Rockhampton the Under 13 girls.

Recognition of all Centres with Indoor Competitions

Apart from those Centres who hosted STC's other Centres with Indoor Competitions are - Cairns, Mackay, Sunshine Coast, South Brisbane Vipers & Ipswich also ran Indoor competitions.

A big thank you to all of the Centre who hosted State Team Challenges and for the hard work invested into each STC. An extra "well done" to Toowoomba who took on the extra workload of Live Streaming the Super 6 Men and Women via their Toowoomba Face book page - some great feedback and interactions received. The ongoing concern for many Indoor centres is the cost to hire venues and this is recognised by HQ and IHAG and continues to be high on our list of working with Centres in this regard.

Participation Numbers by Teams at State Team Challenges over the past 3 years.

- From 2016 to 2018 the Girls and Women numbers of Teams participating at State Team Challenges has increased by 25%.
- From 2016 to 2018 the Boys and Men's numbers of Teams participating at State Team Challenges has increased by 24%.
- This growth and success has forced changes and an increase in the number of State Team Challenges required, placing an added pressure on finding appropriate venues.

A Good News Story from this is that Maryborough has been successful in obtaining a \$425 000 Grant from the Federal Government to do up their own Indoor Stadium based at their Hockey Centre. More information will be provided on this as further detail comes to hand.

The Indoor State Teams continue to achieve with the majority of teams in medal matches at the National Festival of Indoor Hockey held in Goulburn, NSW in January.

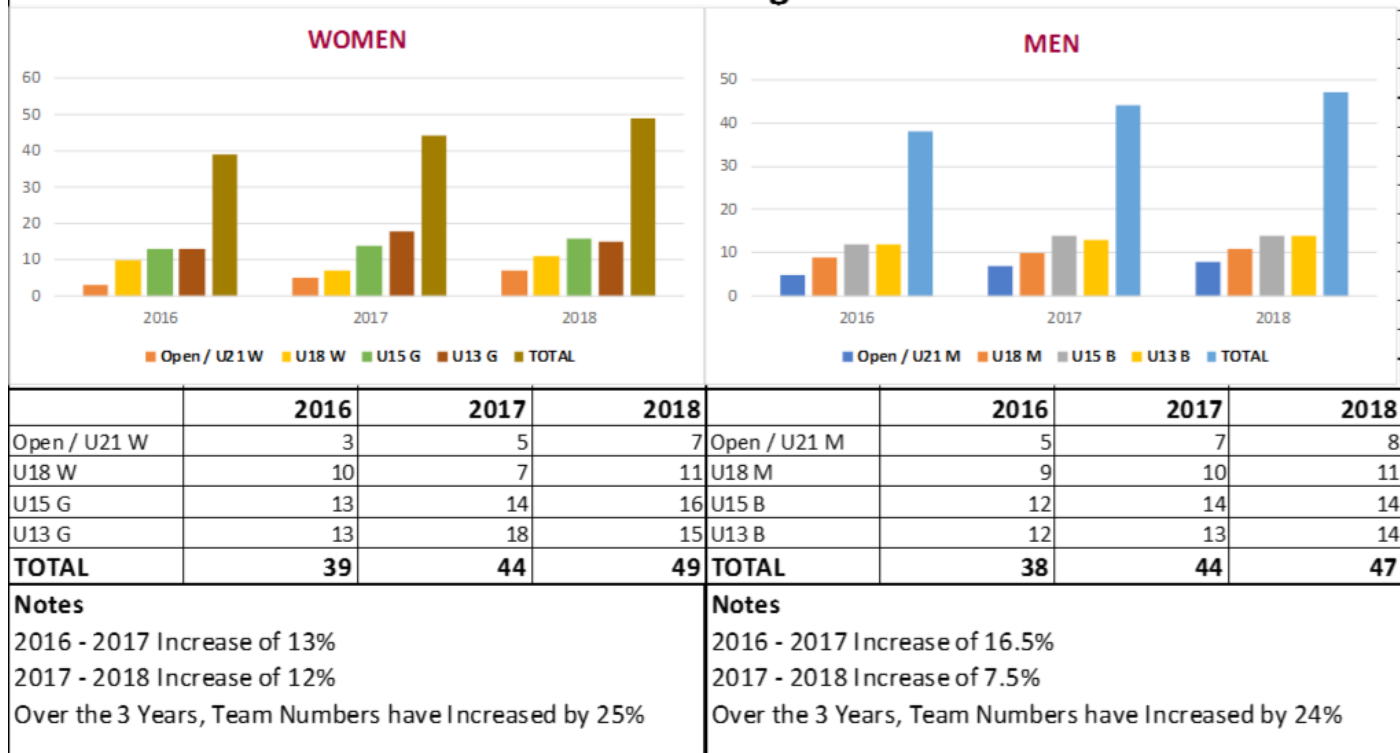

“I’VE GOT YA BACK MATE”

This year we were challenged with a new AHL format with a three week home and away series and a finals week on the Gold Coast. Adding to the challenge was the unavailability of our National Senior Players for weeks 2 & 3 and our National Junior Players for weeks 1 & 2, but this presented the opportunity to debut 6 new players across the tournament. New rule changes were introduced which all teams had to adapt to, which made the games much more tactical at different stages.

The Plan was to pick up from where we left off last year and bring a wider playing group across our way of play and expose them in competition at the highest level in our country. It was also important for these athletes to learn firsthand about our culture and how the Blades operate off field on match days and what the expectations are to ensure consistent quality performances at a high level. We also made significant changes from last year in regards to how we pressed (defended) when not in possession of the ball which allowed us to be unpredictable to the opposition but at the same time added more versatility to the way we can play at any time during a tournament.

Overall the performance as a whole was quite mixed. Week 1 & 4 we were outstanding and we were able to take our game to another level and play with a real belief and confidence but most importantly we were united as one group. Against Victoria in the quarter final we were down to 9 players for pretty much the second half and we held on by the skin of our teeth but from that moment our whole demeanor grew stronger. This was the pivotal moment of the AHL where we really showed our character and belief and the culture that has been derived over a number of years stood out and proved that it’s not just the Hockey skills that win you games.

During weeks 2 & 3, we had a mixed bag of performances. At times we were brilliant but at other times we were well below the required standard with not having enough care in executing our way of play. The learning from this was that at this level of competition, if you are only slightly off your game, the opposition will pounce no matter who you are playing. These inconsistencies challenged us and questioned our depth but the learning curve through these experiences will place us in a better position to see continued success in the future.

Sustainable success is something we value and feel is important to the culture of the Queensland Blades. To win another Championship just adds to that growth and to the list of outstanding performances over the last 19 years.

NOTE 1: STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

This financial report is a special purpose financial report prepared for use by the Association's Directors and Members and in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act 1981 (Queensland). The Board of Directors has determined that the organisation is not a reporting entity.

The requirement of accounting standards and other financial reporting requirements in Australia do not have mandatory application to Hockey Queensland Inc. because it is not a reporting entity. This special purpose financial report has been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act 1981 (Queensland) and the following Australian Accounting Standards.

AASB 116:	Property, Plant and Equipment
AASB 102:	Inventories
AASB 101:	Presentation of Financial Statements
AASB 110:	Events after the Reporting Period
AASB 1031:	Materiality

No other applicable Australian Accounting Standards have been applied.

The financial report has been prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historical costs and does not take into account changing money values or, except where stated, current valuations on non-current assets. Cost is based on fair values of the consideration given in exchange for assets.

The following material accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless otherwise stated, have been adopted in the preparation of this financial report.

(a) Inventories

Inventories consist of uniforms and equipment and are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

(b) Employee entitlements

Provision is made for the Association's liability for employee entitlements arising from services rendered by employees to balance date. Employee entitlements expected to be settled within one year together with entitlements arising from wages and salaries, annual leave and sick leave which will be settled after one year, have been measured at their nominal amount.

Long service leave provisions are calculated once an employee has seven years' continuous employment.

NOTE 1: STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

(c) Income tax

The Association considers that it is exempt from Income tax. No provision for income tax has been brought to account on this basis.

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST except as allowable by the taxation authority.

Cashflow is included in the cash flow statement on a gross basis.

(d) Plant and equipment

The Board of Directors records expenditure on plant and equipment as non-current assets.

Plant and equipment are brought to account at cost, less where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and any impairment losses. The carrying amount of plant and equipment was reviewed in the year by directors to ensure it was not in excess of the recoverable amount from those assets. The recoverable amount is assessed on the basis of expected net cash flows, which will be received from the assets employment and subsequent disposal. The expected net cash flows have not been discounted to present values in determining recoverable amounts.

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets including capitalised leased assets, are depreciated over their estimated useful lives commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

The depreciation rates used for each class of depreciable asset are:

Buildings and facilities	3% - 40%
Fixtures and fittings	10% - 50%
Office equipment	10% - 40%
Plant and equipment	3% - 40%

(e) Revenue

Revenue from the sale of goods and services is recognised upon the delivery of goods/provision of services to customers.

Revenue from member's affiliations, registrations and insurance is recognised at the beginning of the hockey season and is based on the number of registered players throughout the Queensland Region. The revenue for member's levies, insurance, registered player's competitions, and some indigenous funding are recorded on a gross basis.

Revenue from government grants and assistance is recognised on a proportional basis taking into account the period for which the grant is given.

(e) Revenue (continued)

Interest revenue is recognised upon receipt.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

(f) Provisions

The Association provides for employee entitlements as per Note 1(b).
