THIRTY-SIXTH ANNUAL REPORT

Mr. Patron, Mr. President and Gentlemen,

In this, the Thirty-sixth Annual report of your Association, I will place before you a brief, but concise, review of the various activities of the Association during the 1966 Season. The main items to be noted since my last report are:-

1. This Association entertained the first Great Britain Team to make a tour of Australia and our Senior team acquitted itself well by holding the visitors to a draw.
2. School Hockey again maintained its record number of teams and our Ipswich Schoolboy team won the State Championship held at Townsville.
3. Our Junior Team won back the Memorial Shield, which has eluded them since 1962.
4. This Association was once again able to stage a successful Queensland Championship when we held the Queensland Junior Championship for the first time.
5. We again had representation in Queensland teams with two players in both the Colts and Junior teams.
6. This Association and the Lions Club of Ipswich again combined to stage a successful Christmas Festival Carnival.
7. Hancock's Club Senior team were able to win their twelfth successive premiership which we feel creates a world record.

OUR PATRON - E. H. MEYERS, ESQ.

The 1966 Season again saw Mr. E. H. Meyers as our Patron. It was Mr. Meyer's fourth term as our Patron and he again, as always showed a keen interest in our welfare at all times.

THE GROUNDS

The 1966 Season again saw the four playing fields in service with Hockey played on them all day Saturday, as well as on Tuesday nights on No. 1 and No. 2 fields.

The Cricket Association has again put our grounds to good use by playing Club Fixtures, and Intercity Games on them during our off Season. With the present good rains we are having, the fields should be well grassed for the coming Season.

COMPETITIONS

It is not my intention to deal at length on the fixture play of last Season, as it appears in full detail in the Record Secretary's Report, but I would like to refer to a few facts briefly, and they are ;

Firstly, I point out that we are not living up to our Motto, "The Game that Grows", as a couple of years back we had eight Clubs and now we have dropped down to six when Rosewood withdrew during the Season. Also in 1962, we had twenty-eight teams registered and at the end of the 1966 Season we had twenty-three teams playing. This is a matter we must look into and make sure we again start to grow.

During the Season, we saw the introduction of Night Fixtures and it proved successful and we look forward to more development in this section in the coming Season.

I congratulate the premiers in all grades, namely; Hancocks in A Grade, C Grade and D Grade, Northern Suburbs in Reserve Grade, and Bremer High in B Grade.

To all those losing teams, we say thank you and hope the new Season is a more successful one for them. I congratulate all those players who were selected to represent Ipswich during the Season.

ADAMSON CUP - EASTER CARNIVAL - BRISBANE

Ipswich was represented by two teams at the Easter Carnival held in Brisbane. The teams being, Ipswich No. 1 and Ipswich No. 2. Neither team met with outstanding success, but all players said it was a good conditioner for the start of the Season. The Adamson Cup was won by Valley Club from Brisbane and Redcliffe won the Executive Cup. The Carnival was well organised by the Brisbane Association, and an interesting point was that a Sydney Club team "Glebe" took part in the Carnival and made the final against Valley.

STATE CHAMPIONSHIPS - MARYBOROUGH

(June 11th, 12th, 13th - Queen's Birthday Weekend)

Held in Maryborough, as always an outstanding success. With the weather frowning on us the week prior to the Championships, and with doubt about getting to Maryborough. It was very pleasing when the weather cleared, and the Carnival turned out to be a great tribute to the Maryborough Association.

The Ipswich Senior Team did not perform as good as the previous year, but still were only beaten by one team. That team being Brisbane, who won the State Championship.

Our Colts team again had an outstanding Carnival, going through the Weekend undefeated and only losing the Championship to Brisbane by one point.

Congratulations to both teams.

COULTER SHIELD AND DUNBAR PENNANT

The Ipswich Senior team again won the Dunbar Pennant, by defeating Toowoomba, Border and Warwick, but again lost the Coulter Shield to Brisbane, when they lost 5 - 1 to Brisbane. If it was any consolation to Ipswich the game against Brisbane was the most spectacular seen for some time and both teams received a great ovation as they left the field.

POWELL-HEUER CUP

The Ipswich Colts again proved too good for all teams, except Brisbane who won the Cup when they beat Ipswich two goals to one. With Ipswich winning the Cup in 1963 - 64 and now Brisbane winning in 1965 - 66 it could be it is going in a two year pattern, and so it is Ipswich's turn in the 1967 Season. I leave it with the Ipswich Colts.

MEMORIAL SHIELD

After having lost the Shield to Brisbane in 1962, and trying to win it back since, our Juniors were able to win it back during the Season. I think our Juniors started to worry when the Shield left Brisbane and went to Toowoomba last Season. I congratulate the Juniors on their success and a special word of praise for their Coach M. McGuire who has done a fine job with the Ipswich Juniors since he took them over last Season.

STATE JUNIOR CHAMPIONSHIP - IPSWICH

Held in Ipswich, for the first time. This Championship, held on a Zone basis, another great success for this Association. I will not go into any detail about the Carnival as it appears on the report of our Zone Manager, later in this report. I would like to thank all those people who billeted the visiting boys during the weekend, also all Officials who helped make the Carnival the success it was.

SCHOOLBOY HOCKEY

This section of our Association again had an outstanding Season. We again had a high number of teams registered, twenty-five teams playing in five grades.

After having held the first Queensland Championship under Q.H.A. ruling last Season our Ipswich team was able to win the second one, held in Townsville, an outstanding performance. Our congratulations go to all concerned.

Once again on your behalf, I must thank Mr. Noel Harvey and Morrie Fraser for their efforts during the Season, and also Messrs. J. Graham, L. Kinnane, R. Woodfood, M. Kinnane, D. Fullelove and J. Tupper and also all Coaches and Umpires for their efforts during the past Season.

STATE SELECTOR

Mr. J. T. O'Brien was again re-appointed to the State Colts Selection Committee, for his tenth term on same.

INTERSTATE HONOURS COLTS

We again had representation in the Queensland Colts team when Ross Woodford and Bryce Peapell travelled to Melbourne with the Queensland team. The Queensland team finished second to West Australia in the Championship.

INTERSTATE HONOURS - JUNIORS

Another good performance by our Junior players, when two of them, W. Greene and S. Meyers were selected in the Queensland Junior team which took part in the Australian Championships held in Perth. We congratulate all players who were selected in the Queensland teams.

INTERNATIONAL HOCKEY

GREAT BRITAIN Versus IPSWICH

We again had the pleasure during the Season to have a visit from an International team, this time it was a Great Britain team, making their first tour of Australia. UMPIRES ASSOCIATION

Once again, our thanks go to this section of our Association. As always they were always wrong but still a very important section of our Game. Once again the Umpires Association was controlled by K. IPSWICH CHRISTMAS FESTIVAL CARNIVAL

Well after months of organising by our Joint Committee our Third Annual Carnival, the largest so far, took place on 24th, 25th and 26th November. It got away with a pamphlet drop of 40,000 leaflets over our city and suburbs on the previous Saturday. This in itself was a first for Ipswich, as many old-timers were only in short pants when the last drop was made. The largest Marquee ever to be erected in Queensland, measuring 320 ft. long by 50 ft. wide, and this was filled with exhibits of Electrical Appliances, Cars, Boats, Caravans, Blue Nurses, Lifesavers, Opportunity School, Army and many others.

In addition to this there were three small marquees which also had displays, and then the many Knock-em stalls, chocolate and grocery wheels, Merry-Go-Rounds, Ferris Wheel and Side Shows, all helped to make the opening night a good pace setter. All expectations were exceeded when over 3,000 people streamed into the grounds for the first night.

The Friday night came when all records were to be broken, but old man fate had a hand. A storm which hit the city early in the night was almost ended, when gleeful Officials were glad for all the dust had been laid and people were starting to come in, when a severe Electrical and Wind storm redeveloped and again down came the rain, this time much harder. Everyone on the grounds (fortunately not a large crowd at this time of night) made for the shelter of the large Marquee. Then it happened, down came the large Marquee on top of over 200 people.

Quick thinking by Electricians and several others, who directed rescue operations, stopped almost what could have been disaster. The Carnival was in complete chaos. Fortunately only about six people were injured.

Not to be daunted Lions and Hockey members banded together and a huge task of cleaning up began, and went on until the early hours of Saturday morning. Then again at daybreak scores of willing helpers arrived to continue the cleaning up operation. Wrecked exhibits, torn tents and water logged grounds. It was then decided that the Carnival would go on the Saturday night as planned, but without the Huge Marquee. Several twisted stalls were straightened out, and exhibitors brought in fresh stock and re-displayed in new areas.

Saturday night, and the Carnival was ready to start and the crowds began to stream in, as Press, T.V. and Radio had given the affair "top billing". Success was assured when well over 8,000 people turned up to support the efforts of both the Lions and the Hockey Association.

Everyone is glad its over, and we are now awaiting results, but the old saying, "The Show must go on" and it's a good bet we'll have our fourth Annual Carnival this year.

LIFE MEMBERSHIP MR. N. HARVEY

As the Executive Committee of your Association recommended the appointment of Mr. N. Harvey as a Life Member of this Association at our last Annual Meeting it is with pleasure I report that Noel is now a Life Member of our Association.

SAVAGE, David Austin - 25, Schoolmaster. Married, Oxton, U.A.U., Cheshire, Wales, 5ft. 8 $\frac{1}{2}$ ins., 10st. 9lbs. Regular Welsh goalkeeper. Chosen for Hamburg, but did not get a game. Often brilliant.

HARRISON, Howard Montague - 22, Right back. Sales Manager. Single. Surbiton, Surrey. No representative honours. 6ft. 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ ins., 13st. 2lbs. The giant of the side. Potentially brilliant young player who could well make his mark on the tour. Played very well for London against India recently.

OLIVER, Richard Michael - 21. Left or right back. Oxford Univ. Student. Single. Oxford Univ. (capt.) England Schools, Under 23, England. 5ft. 9ins., 12st. 10lbs. Certainly for Hamburg, but not available. A player of tremendous promise.

PROSSER, David John (Captain) - 23. Left or right back. Senior Sales Executive. Commercial T.V. Company. Single. Old Ingstonians, Middx, Wales (25), 6ft., 12 $\frac{1}{2}$ st. First capped when schoolboy of 17. Stocky. Very dependable. His chance at last. Also good cricketer.

EKINS, Anthony (Tony) Howard - 22, Centre half. Chartered Auctioneer and Estate Agent, Single, Cambs Nomads, Cambs, East and England Under 23. 6ft. 2ins. 13 $\frac{1}{2}$ st. Player of tremendous strength and potential. Also good cricketer (Cambs.).

- GREAT BRITAIN V IPSWICH -
31st July, 1966

SCORELESS DRAW AT IPSWICH - Former Olympian John Dwyer wrote:-

The visitors were back in Brisbane on Sunday, July 31, and left by cars for Ipswich where they were to play the same afternoon.

A crowd of 1000 watched Ipswich hold the touring Great Britain Hockey side to a scoreless draw at the East Ipswich grounds.

With the first of the six test games the next Saturday, the tour selectors gave every member of the party of 18 a run in one or other of the two matches.

It was quite obvious that the tourists had still to build a combination as there was a great deal of misunderstanding which cost opportunities, especially in the forwards.

It was the first Great Britain side ever to play in Ipswich and the standard did not reach that of other touring sides seen here, but it was apparent that there are players of outstanding ability.

The Great Britain forwards were much faster than the Ipswich set in the mid-field play, but they had trouble adapting themselves to the hard grounds and the irregular bounces and they broke down inside the 25yd. area at times when they had a ball running for them.

Outstanding forward of the match was Great Britain left winger Jerry Barham.

In the second half particularly it was through Barham that the halves and fullbacks tried to direct their attack and he frequently bewildered the Ipswich defence with his speed and stickwork, but he lacked support at crucial stages.

Barham could have brought victory to the side in the closing stages of play when he used a neat body swerve to advantage to take the ball almost to the backline and then got it across the goalmouth, but the opportunity went begging, as there was not a forward with him to take advantage of it.

In mid-field play inside-left Tim Lawson and centre-forward Col Whalley trapped the ball well and showed plenty of pace, but they did not look for support often enough.

This made the task of Ipswich full-backs Don Fullelove and Ross Woodford much easier and both played soundly, although Fullelove made some early mistakes which could have been costly.

Arthur Busch, in the Ipswich net, was not called on to do a great deal of work, but his clearances were strong and he made no mistakes.

In the early stages of play Great Britain looked superior and on two occasions it was only clever cover defence from Ipswich left-half Ron Flor saved dangerous situations.

Great Britain lapsed towards half-time, when Ipswich had chances, but they rallied in the latter stages of the second half and for the final 15 minutes of play Ipswich were hard pressed to keep them out.

- GREAT BRITAIN V AUSTRALIA -
1ST. TEST BRISBANE
6th August, 1966.

Over 3,000 spectators watched Australia defeat Great Britain by 2 - 0 in the First Test at the Brisbane Cricket Ground on August 6. Conditions were perfect. Both goals were hit in the first half and the Australians were hard pressed in the second period to hold the Britishers at bay.

It was a splendid exhibition of Hockey between two very fine teams, and much credit must go to the Umpires for their efforts in keeping the game flowing.

The umpires were International badge holders Eric Eastman (W.A.) and Mack McLaren (N.S.W.)

With the exception of R. Haig all the Australian players were Olympians.

At the request of Great Britain, Australia played the no replacement rule while the umpires kept the time.

It seemed a pity that Great Britain was not prepared to see in use the replacement of injured player rule and the use of official time keepers.

Neither would have had any bearing on the result, but at the same time it would have enabled the G.B. manager to see how the system really worked.

Neither rule is in accordance with International practice, although previous International teams have never raised any objections to their use.

It was strange then at the Brisbane Cricket Ground to see no reserves or time-keepers on the side line.

Australia, Bronze Medal winners at the Tokyo Olympic, were expected to outclass the Great Britain side but the visitors played tenaciously throughout and the Australian forwards found it hard to break through to get set for a shot at goal.

From the start of play, Australia was on the attack but Great Britain captain, David Prosser, playing at full-back, was a hard man to pass.

With excellent anticipation he was able to take the ball away from the Australians and relieve the pressure for his side.

Great Britain persisted in slow, short passing movements, while the Australians continually threw the ball from wing to wing to keep the play open. Although they had the better play territorially, it was not until the thirtieth minute of play that Australia scored.

A good move down the centre saw inside left Des Piper receive the ball and with a good shot pass the Great Britain keeper, Roger Flood.

A great penalty corner shot by Australian full-back Brian Glencross in the final minute of play in the first half saw Australia go to a commanding 2 - 0 lead.

Second half, which was scoreless, was marked by some brilliant play by opposing goal-keepers, Roger Flood for Great Britain and Paul Dearing for Australia.

Great Britain tightened its play in this period and for the first time in the match the forwards made some good moves.

Centre forward, Colin Whalley was deceptive when in possession and he broke through several occasions but his efforts were in vain as Australian full-back Don McWatters, stopped his moves.

In an excellent move, Piper and Nilan penetrated the Great Britain defence and Nilan's shot was well saved by Great Britain keeper, Roger Flood's sliding tackle.

The rebound was picked up by Australian right-half John McBryde who switched play to the left but Don Smart missed the open net.

Great Britain had the better of the play in the later stages and was awarded a succession of penalty corners but all were stopped by Dearing, who was in outstanding form.

- GREAT BRITAIN V AUSTRALIA -

2ND. TEST

The Second Test Match between Australia and Great Britain which resulted in a 2-all draw was played at Wentworth Park, Sydney, on August 7. Great Britain showed a tremendous improvement from the First Test in Brisbane the previous day and were unlucky not to win a drawn match. A crowd of some 3,000 spectators watched the Test in cool but fine conditions. Unfortunately the surface conditions of the ground did not match the weather as there had been a series of Soccer matches played at Wentworth Park on Saturday and the ground was cut about considerably.

The Australian team for the match, chosen by the Australian Selectors, was the same as that which played in the Brisbane Test. However on the morning of the match Pat Nilan had caught the flu and his place at centre-forward was taken by N.S.W. forward Paul Willott. This was a parallel to Paul's initial match for Australia when he replaced Eric Pearce in similar circumstances for the Second Test against New Zealand in 1965.

The team which took the field was:-

Great Britain had made one change in their goalie from the side which played at Brisbane. The team was:-

Goalkeeper, D. Savage; Backs, R. Cliver, D. Prosser (Capt.); Halves, A. Jackson, A. Ekins, G. Nott; Forwards, D. Gaffney, J. Barham, C. Whalley, T. Lawson, M. Crowe.

The umpires appointed for the Test were Dough Hill and Reg Hanson, both from New South Wales.

Great Britain attacked from the opening bully and with a flashing run down the left flank forced a penalty corner in the opening minute of the match. Australia defended successfully and play was taken to mid-field. The Great Britain team were showing much more teamwork and understanding than the Australian side and a feature of the match which was apparent right from the initial stages was the short passing between the halves and backs which had the Australian forwards constantly defending.

In the eighth minute of play a free-hit was quickly taken by Don Smart. The ball travelled back to Bob Haigh who through passed neatly into the Great Britain circle but the defence beat the Australians to the ball. From ensuing play Australia received a penalty corner when a Great Britain player was caught obstructing in his circle. Don McWatters came up to take the hit and Australia went to an early lead with a crashing shot by the Australian skipper.

G.B. CAPTAIN IN GOOD FORM - Australia were nearly in again one minute later but a magnificent save by the Great Britain captain David Prosser relieved the pressure. Both teams were having trouble trapping the ball on the soft bumpy surface although the visitors appeared more at home than the Olympic Bronze medallists: Australia continued to have the best of the match and in the 15th minute a well directed pass by Don Smart gave Paul Willott an opportunity but he couldn't control the ball for a shot at goal. Ray Evans also had a chance but the defence scrambled the ball clear.

The defence of the Great Britain team was outstanding with both backs, Prosser and Richard Oliver, being very safe under pressure. For the Australian team Don McWatters was keeping the G.B. forwards at bay with his strong clearing hits. He was well supported by Brian Glencross.

In the 18th Minute David Gaffney the left-winger for Great Britain, eluded John McBryde and made a great run before centering brilliantly into the Australian goal-circle. A first-time shot by inside-right Timothy Lawson gave 'keeper Paul Dearing no chance to save and the scores were levelled with a copy-book goal.

Great Britain were nearly in seconds later when centre-forward Colin Whalley broke away but he could not penetrate custodian Paul Dearing, who saved brilliantly. Australia replied immediately and a fine centre by Robin Hodder went begging as his fellow forwards missed a golden scoring opportunity. With play sweeping from end to end of the field the match was now proving an entertaining one for the crowd.

Right winger Michael Crowe centred in the 22nd minute and Colin Whalley's shot caught the defence on the wrong foot as the Australian players tried to clear the ball. This was a surprising turn of events for the spectators who had expected to see the Australian team in complete command. It was not long before the gap was bridged though. A minute later a poor roll-in allowed Australia possession. This was followed by two defensive errors and centre forward Paul Willott goalied from a narrow angle as the Great Britain defence tried to scramble out of trouble.

TOP HOCKEY WHEN SCORE EVEN - With the scores tied the best period of the match followed as both teams tried to find the gap. There was a stoppage in play during the 29th minute when Paul Willott was injured, however he was able to resume his play and soon afterwards figured in a passing movement which almost led to a goal. Willott unfortunately for Australia was off-side when he received the final pass. He had another chance almost immediately when he netted but was penalised for "Sticks." Don McWatters was in brilliant form constantly preventing any Great Britain attack from penetrating too far into Australia's territory.

Colin Whalley made another of his penetrating runs down centre-field and only a brilliant save by Paul Dearing at the edge of the Australian goal-circle prevented Great Britain from going to the front again.

The visiting centre-forward Colin Whalley was most penetrative and was given plenty of chances by his insides. However Paul Dearing was the one man whom he couldn't penetrate. Play halted midway through this half whilst Des Piper received treatment following a knock. Play was hard throughout as the traditional rivals strove for possession. Brian Glencross and John McCormack both executed excellent saves under pressure on a number of instances. The Great Britain team, sensing a chance to snatch an unexpected win, were now right on top. Their forward line was moving the ball cleverly with support always ready to assist a team-mate.

G.B. INNERS WERE A DANGER - The inside-forwards Jeremy Barham and Timothy Lawson constantly menaced the Australian goal with well-timed passes, particularly to centre-forward Whalley. However the Australian defence withstood the pressure and although they could not mount a worthwhile attack the cover defence was always there. In this period of the match the Australian forwards became disjointed and individualistic as they strove to penetrate Great Britain's blanket defence. The selectors will probably have to do some hard thinking in this department before the next Test is played.

For Australian supporters the first half was their team's best. However the second half definitely belonged to Great Britain. In the second stanza the visiting team played with much more confidence and purpose than did Australia. Australian forwards made many elementary fundamental errors in trapping the ball. This was not assisted by the Australian halves whose passes were often poorly directed. The best players for the home side were Paul Dearing, Brian Glencross and Don McWatters, although the halves all played well under pressure. Robert Haigh, the newcomer this season to the Australian colours, can be assured of more matches for his country on his showing at left-half.

Although he played quite well it is likely that John McCormack will be replaced at centre-half, as he has already announced his retirement from big Hockey. His place will probably go to Olympian Julian Pearce. Australia's three inside-forwards all worked hard but unfortunately often to little avail.

Great Britain played well as a team and thus it is hard to distinguish their best players. The two backs David Prosser and Richard Oliver were in control of the Australian attack and their combination with the halves Geoffrey Nott, Anthony Ekins and Alan Jackson completely foiled all of Australia's efforts to assume command of the match.

The two inside-forwards, Timothy Lawson and Jeremy Barham, combined well together and with their team-mates. Lawson in particular was the initiator of many fine attacking moves. The Great Britain centre-forward Colin Whalley also had a memorable match and only for Paul Dearing's brilliance could have scored more than the one goal.

- GREAT BRITAIN V AUSTRALIA -

3RD. TEST

During its Tasmanian tour, Great Britain seemed to have the happy knack of playing Hockey good enough to hold the opposition - from local competition, combined team to Australian side - and drew all three matches played throughout the State, in two cases with no scores being registered by either side.

Heavy rain in Hobart during the days prior to the Third Test made the pitch muddy and heavy. Consequently, ball trapping, passing and hitting by both teams was not up to their usual standard, and if anything, Great Britain was superior in general ball handling. This was not the case in general field play, however, which showed the Australians clear winners on the majority of occasions, faster to the ball and showing greater determination in attack. Both defences proved superior to the forward lines, with the G.B. defence showing out well when under constant pressure for most of the second half.

After feeling each other out for some minutes Australia forced a penalty corner which was cleared. Another a few minutes later resulted in a poor hit for goal and from the resulting clearing shot Great Britain made a strong attacking move which brought goalie Dearing out to clear. Great Britain was awarded a penalty corner but Knott missed. The next few minutes saw many promising moves by the Australian forwards broken up by the strong G.B. defence with Prosser to the fore. At this stage Great Britain was handling the conditions better. A bad hand stop by Australia resulted in another penalty corner being cleared as was a following corner awarded to Great Britain which led to dangerous play and a free hit to Australia.

A strong move by Australia through right-winger Hodder looked dangerous and obstruction in the circle by G.B. led to a penalty corner. Before it could be taken, however, the half-time whistle blew.

(Although Australia had a few more attacking moves in this half, the honours were slightly in Great Britain's favour at this stage in general field play. Australia, however, had been awarded four penalty corners to one to Great Britain.)

The second half saw Australia in attack immediately and they were to continue this pattern for most of the half. Great Britain was to reach its circle only once or twice in major sorties goalwards.

Goalie Savage cleared a strong move by Australia and he and Oliver were to figure in many defensive actions during the next half hour, strongly backed by Prosser in particular.

A strong move by Australia found Eric Pearce in the circle with only the goalie to beat, but the shot went high over the goal. Another shot from Hodder a few minutes later just missed and a penalty corner to Australia was also cleared.

Negative play in centre-field for some minutes finally set up an Australian attack but again Eric Pearce missed. The forwards were finding it difficult to get set for their shots with the Great Britain half-backs dropping back to form a line of defenders across the head of the circle.

A shot by Smart went over the back-line after bouncing off Prosser and Great Britain cleared the resulting corner with comparative ease.

Australia had been almost continually in attack but was finding it most difficult to penetrate the strong G.B. defence.

A penalty corner to the Australians at the 30 minute mark saw the ball banged into the net, but the goal was disallowed because of a bad stop.

The Australians were showing more determination in going in for the ball while Great Britain was inclined to wait for it to come to them.

At the 33 minute mark Smart had another shot but could not find the net. Immediately afterwards another shot hit the upright and stayed in play, only to be cleared by Great Britain, and time ran out on the Australian forwards.

Summing Up: Defence predominated throughout. The conditions mitigated against good ball control and good stopping. Of the two forward lines the Australians showed out to greater advantage. Great Britain had good individualists on the day but did not combine to the same extent as the Australians.

- GREAT BRITAIN V AUSTRALIA -

4TH. TEST

Olympian goalkeeper Lou Hailey, who played in the Melbourne and Rome Games and is now President of Brisbane Hockey Association, wrote of the Fourth Test:-

The Melbourne Test was a game of Hockey to talk about, something rarely seen these days and a contest which I'm sure was enjoyed by Players and spectators alike. Although a cold windy miserable afternoon the field looked perfect except for one patch of the sticky black cricket pitch extending beyond the 7 yard line about centre field on one side. The ground was conducive to good ball control except this patch which brought play almost to a standstill whenever the ball reached this area.

I would think it fair to say that the score 2 - 0 in Australia's favour was a good indication of the team's superiority in this particular test. Perhaps I was watching the Australians more carefully than the visitors but they were attacking more consistently than their opponents and the forward line looked dangerous on many occasions. The British forwards could not get going as a line, their combination was not so marked as that of the Australians. We saw many fine forward line thrusts from the Australians with good passing and understanding between them. They used the occasional hard crossfield drive to advantage and as a result the visiting halves worked hard and their full-backs were like stone walls to the Australian inside forwards.

One could not help remarking on the outstanding game played by inside-right Ray Evans who surely dominated the game.

He worried the life out of his opposing inner and yet was able to spearhead the Australian attack. He and Pat Nilan with their cross passing set up a monotonous drive towards opposite circle. It was within the scoring zone however that the attack lost its punch due to the excellent English defence and its weight of numbers.

The first goal scored by Don McWatters off a long corner was a gem. The ball was stopped and Don had time to move forward with it a yard and hit. The ball did not appear to leave the turf and thundered into the back boards. Shortly after this the British forward line made a strong attack with the centre-forward Col Whalley penetrating and finding himself in the open a yard within the circle. He hit a hard drive at goal which was magnificently saved by Paul Dearing who had moved out quickly to intercept. Had he not moved out so far this might easily have been an equaliser at that stage. However the British forwards did not move as a line and were seldom dangerous.

The second goal scored by Australia came in the second period when the goal-keeper David Savage, who was playing very well, fell near the ball and was unable to prevent Eric Pearce flashing in to score.

The British side had opportunities particularly from corners in the second half but they were not well executed. One feature of the defence worth note was the accuracy of Don McWatters' free hit, helped by his forwards moving into the gaps, he rarely missed driving the ball right to an Australian's stick.

I thought it a good Test. Congratulations to players of both sides who played the game as it should be played, to umpires who did let the game roll, to the ball boys who must have been frozen, and to all Australian and Victorian officials who provided the facilities and arrangements for his fine spectacle on the St. Kilda Cricket Ground before 2,500 spectators.

- GREAT BRITAIN V AUSTRALIA -

5TH. TEST

There was a sensation in Adelaide when Don McWatters, Australian Test Captain, declared himself unfit for play on the morning of the Fifth Test. Don had been hurt while playing Badminton at the Point Cook Naval Depot in Melbourne. A Hockey stick wielded by a player in a nearby training squad struck Don on the ankle as he stepped back to make a shot. Ian Pitt, the South Australian captain, replaced him. B. Glencross took over the team leadership.

The Test Match played at the Olympic Sports Field in Adelaide was a fine example of controlled Hockey, but the lack of goals by both teams was disappointing. Brilliant playing by both centre-halves, Tony Ekins and Julian Pearce set up the forwards, but the solid defence on both sides kept them out of the circles.

Changes of play across the field were features of the Australian game in the early stages of the match, but the openings thus created were soon closed by the backs David Prosser and Geoff Poole. Britain's Colin Whalley thrilled the crowd when he moved from centre-forward to left wing with the ball, but the back pass failed to bring any result. The effectiveness of the Australian inners was reduced by the defence, and this took much of the initiative from the forward line. After 13 minutes of play a pass from Smart to Nilan on the left was hit across goal, but as it was touched, the goalkeeper hit the ball out. The resulting penalty corner was hit too slow. A later corner was stopped well, but the scoop shot missed the goal. Britain could not convert their two penalty corners with bad stopping and "Sticks."

Australia attacked incessantly in the second half and hit the ball across the circle for scoring opportunities. Forwards were too slow to hit the ball and persisted in moving with the ball allowing the clever backs to close any openings. Great Britain looked dangerous when they square-passed and the inner-forwards tried to break into the circle, but they were either defeated by Glencross and Pitt, or the brilliant keeping of Dearing. In the 14th minute the "Brits" pressed and sent Barham into the circle, but Dearing thrilled the crowd by clearing near the edge of the circle with a spectacular sliding kick.

In the latter stages, Australia stepped up their attack, but found ten red shirts in defence, who quickly pounded the ball towards the other end. A pass by Australia's Ray Evans found Don Smart free on the left wing, but his valiant shot missed as the final bell rang.

- GREAT BRITAIN V AUSTRALIA -

6TH. TEST

A DULL SIXTH TEST IN PERTH - Perth's Test Match played on August 28 and the last of the current series ended on a note of anti-climax. Whether due to Australia having already won the series, or to the participating teams having played too many matches in too short a time, the large crowd of 5,000 was treated to a rather mediocre game for an international Test Match.

For the most part play was scrumbly and congested, except for occasional passages, in particular by Great Britain, which showed that this young side will be a formidable combination in the future. The flow of the game was not helped by umpiring which was inclined to be perhaps a little over-technical, particularly where the advantages were lost with premature whistles.

Great Britain again showed up better as a team, with hard-working inners in Forster and Gaffney combining well with their halves and speedy wingers. It was only the brilliance of the Australian half-line with Julian Pearce and Des Piper showing outstanding form that kept Australia on top. The Australian forward line lacked cohesion and might have been playing together for the first time. Such attacks as developed arose mainly from solo efforts.

In the first half Australia, with Don McWatters back as captain, had most of the play with the half-line clearly on top, but their drive was largely squandered by the forwards, although some strong opportunist shots by Smart, Nilan and Hodder went close.

The few Great Britain attacks, with their forwards moving in line and using the through-pass well, looked dangerous, but fell down on the steady McWatters and Glencross.

Shortly before the interval Glencross goaled from Australia's third short corner for the term, but Great Britain immediately attacked with a beautiful through pass to the right wing Crowe whose centre was acutely angled towards goal by Forster, to be deflected over the line by McWatters.

Great Britain pressed home a series of attacks in the beginning of the second half with crisp square-passing back and forth between the halves and forwards. After a mis-kick by Deering an angled shot by Gaffney was spectacularly saved on the line by Piper.

Australia steadied with Piper dominating the left side of the field and Julian Pearce impeccable in the centre. Nilan and Smart began to combine well and only good defence by Halves Nott and Ekins, fulback Poole and goalie Savage prevented each from scoring.

Great Britain retaliated by working the ball upfield with square-passes travelling back and forth across the field, and only good first time clearing kicks by the goalie kept the fast-moving forwards out. Australia moved forward again and solo runs by Nilan, Eric Pearce and Evans, culminated in Evans hitting the crossbar with the goalie well beaten. Near time a premature whistle with Nilan having the advantage changed a goal to a penalty flick which Eric Pearce had little trouble converting. The game ended with Australia running out winners, 2 - 0

Although qualifying their remarks by saying that he seemed to be running out of form towards the end of an exciting programme, most of the members of the Great Britain team nominated Ray Evans as the best player they have played against during their tour. An exception was John Forster (inside-right with four goals in a low scoring series to his credit). John was very impressed by Julian Pearce and John McBryde.

They found the grounds variable, and surprisingly poor in comparison with playing surfaces in the U.K. The best ground they have played on is the W.A.C.A. ground.

Overall the comment on umpiring was that it was of good standard and in the State and Test matches, first class. Although consistent from State to State, some players found it inconsistent with the interpretations in England. "Our main difficulty", said left-half Alan Jackson, "was associated with the obstruction rule. Particularly where a left-side tackle is involved".

TREASURER'S ANNUAL REPORT - SEASON 1966

Mr. Patron, Mr. President and Gentlemen,

It gives me pleasure to present this year's Financial Reports and Statements.

A successful season has produced an increase in our Bank Account and as at the 31.10.66, our balance stands at \$1389.59.

Again our Carnivals have been a good source of Income and our Association with the Lions Club has been very successful. \$1273.84 for Carnival Proceeds and \$182.00 for Ground Rental for conducting the major Carnival was quite a good result for the year. Gate takings of \$306.85 came mainly from the game against Great Britain. Ground Fees of \$1767.40, show a decrease from the previous year.

Our main item of expenditure was on Floodlighting two fields, at a cost of \$2489.16. We were successful in obtaining a further Loan of \$2000.00 from our Bank, towards this project. The lighting has proved its worth for the conducting of our Carnivals and night fixtures were played during the Season and rentals received from these games, amounted to \$302.00. Other payments made during the year are on a par with the previous Season.

The accumulated nett Income to the 31.10.66, amounts to \$12463.01, after transferring \$1056.00 from this Season's Accounts. The necessary Depreciation has been written off all fixed Assets.

Since the close of the Season, our Christmas Carnival, after being wrecked on Friday night, was rebuilt, to operate successfully on Saturday night. From this experience we should learn not to be reliant on proceeds from our Carnivals and foster other methods of fund-raising, to further improve our position. Our Bank Commitment has to be met twice a year and every Association Member must work hard and so help meet this Commitment.

In conclusion, I wish to thank all who have helped me in the past year and wish you all good Hockey for 1967.

The Season progressed smoothly and few complaints were heard. It was pleasing to note on quite a few occasions young Umpires, who umpired Senior games being thanked by players for their efforts. More courtesy in this direction would do a lot to swell our ranks in coming Seasons.

During the Season seven Umpires submitted themselves for Local Umpires Examinations. These consisted of four Senior and three Junior Umpires. All the candidates obtained the required percentages and will sit for practical exams in the coming Season.

Two Umpires were awarded Queensland "B" Badges last Season. Congratulations to Herb Elleison and John Cushing. Our badged Umpires last Season were as follows:- Q'ld. A1 (2 Umpires); Q'ld. A2 (3 Umpires) and Q'ld. B (3 Umpires). Queensland Examinations will be held again in the coming Season and it is hoped Ipswich will be well represented.

The Season, as far as Umpiring, was highlighted by a visit to the State Championships at Maryborough by Mr. Jim McDowell, Secretary of the A.H.U.A. and an International A1 Grade Umpire. Mr. McDowell lectured on Umpiring and Rules and the Ipswich Umpires who travelled to Maryborough thoroughly enjoyed hearing him talk on this aspect of our game. Mr. McDowell umpired the Final of the Championships and B. Coker of Ipswich had the honour of being his fellow Umpire.

The Ipswich Umpires who travelled to Maryborough were:- S. Fullelove, J. Cushing, H. Elleison, B. Coker, M. Kinnane and F. Young.

A Film Evening pertaining to Umpiring and Hockey Rules was held last Season and Mr. V. Morrow of Brisbane and Queensland Hockey Umpires Association Lectured. This evening was very well attended and it is hoped to repeat this type of lecture this coming Season.

A visit to Ipswich last Season by the Gt. Britain Hockey team enabled local Umpires, S. Fullelove and B. Coker to gain more experience in International Umpiring and also J. Cushing who was selected to Umpire the main curtain raiser (Ipswich V Brisbane) to the Hockey test between Australia and Gt. Britain at the Brisbane Cricket Ground, gained valuable experience in top game atmosphere.

To all players, officials and Umpires who so ably assisted me last Season I extend to you my sincere thanks, especially to the young umpires who so ably umpired the early games every Saturday. Again to our all too few non-playing Umpires, Merve Kinnane, Stan Fullelove, Eddie Richards, Herb Elleison, John Jeffreys and company, thanks fellows once again for your support.

May I, in closing, make an appeal for your support once again this Coming Season and to thank all for the fair go I have always received from "Ipswich Hockey".

I wish you all good Hockey and Umpiring in 1967.
