



Rowing Victoria Incorporated- Rules and Related By-Laws

Rule Book

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PART I SCOPE

RULE 1 ROWING, BOATS, REGATTAS, ROWERS

Rowing is the propulsion of a displacement boat, with or without coxswain, by the muscular force of one or more rowers, using oars as simple levers of the second order and sitting with their backs to the direction of movement of the boat. Rowing on a machine or in a tank which simulates the action of rowing in a boat is also considered as rowing.

In a rowing boat, all load bearing parts including the axes of moving parts, must be firmly fixed to the body of the boat, but the rower's seat may move along the axis of the boat.

A rowing regatta is a sporting competition consisting of one or more events divided, if necessary, into a number of races, in one or more classes of boats for rowers divided, as a general rule, into different categories of gender, age, weight, or skill level.

RULE 2 APPLICATION

RV is empowered under the Constitution to govern the conduct and control of regattas & competitions at selected and approved venues by RV. These rules are created to ensure the orderly conduct of such events.

- 2.1 These Rules and the relevant By-Laws shall apply to the conduct of all RV events including where appropriate Ergometer (Indoor) rowing competitions and Coastal Rowing and provide direction for the administration of competition within the sport.
- 2.2 Any club or individual who participates in any capacity in a rowing competition governed by these Rules is deemed to accept without exception or reservation the application of these Rules, the related By-Laws and Event Regulations, particularly those relating to the authority and jurisdiction of RV and of the Australian Court of Arbitration for Sport.

- 2.3 Each Club or appointed Organising Committee is responsible for ensuring that the organisation of any RV Event complies with the requirements of these Rules.

RULE 3 EXCEPTIONS

- 3.1 RV CEO may, in exceptional cases, grant exemptions for departure from the rules and By-laws, and such exemptions shall be posted on the RV website.
- 3.2 In any such case, the Board shall be notified immediately after the decision and the reasons for such exception shall be given.

RULE 4 MEMBER PROTECTION POLICY

Each competitor, coach, official and employee of RV agrees, in entering into any RV Event, or being involved in the conduct of any RV Event, and while a member of, or having nominated for, any team representing Victoria, to abide by, and conform to, the terms of any Code that the Board may adopt and maintain to govern the conduct of such persons from the date of commencement of the RV Event, appointment as a coach or employee or the date of nomination for or selection to any team until the later of:

- 8 hours after their release from an RV Event,
- 7 days after their release from a trial,
- 4 weeks after their cessation of employment, or
- 1 week after their release from a representative team.

The RV Member Protection Policy is listed Appendix 10.

RULE 5 RV REPRESENTATIVE TEAMS

- 5.1 The RV CEO in each year shall:
- 5.1.1 Appoint the Team Manager to manage all representative teams.
- 5.1.2 Appoint a Chairperson of Selectors and two (2) Selectors to select the rowers, coxswains and coaches of the following crews:
Interstate Regatta:
- King's Cup men's eight oared crew
 - Penrith Cup men's lightweight four oared crew
 - President's Cup men's single sculler
 - Queens Cup and ULVA Trophy women's eight oared crew
 - Victoria Cup women's lightweight quadruple scull
 - Nell Slatter Trophy women's single sculler
- The Chairperson of Selectors will exercise a casting vote should this be required. These selectors would be known as the senior selectors.
- 5.1.3 Appoint two (2) selectors to select the rowers, coxswains and coaches of the following crews:
- National Interstate Regatta
 - Wilkinson Trophy - Men's Youth 8+ crew

- Bicentennial Trophy - Women's Youth 8+ crew and,
 - The Australian Youth Cup Regatta and,
 - The Australian Youth Olympic Regatta
- Any other competition designated by the Board from time to time.
The Chairperson of Selectors will be the third selector and may exercise a casting vote should this be required. These selectors would be known as the Youth selectors.

5.1.4 Appoint a Head Coach to provide technical direction and support to all team coaches.

- 5.2 Nominations for candidates for appointment as selectors shall be made in writing in the form published from time to time at the RV website, and signed by the candidate and be delivered to the CEO of the Association not less than 21 days prior to the date fixed for the holding of the meeting at which the appointment is to take place.
- 5.3 Following appointment, the selectors must publish a Selection policy as approved by the Board and shall undertake the selection process in line with this document.
- 5.4 A selector shall not be entitled to be appointed coach of any crew for which that selector is appointed to select.
- 5.5 All members of Victorian crews shall be registered members.
- 5.6 RV Head Coach and RV Team Manager
The RV Head Coach and RV Team Manager shall consult with the selectors in the formulation of Selection Policy, the selection of coaches and the selection of crews.
- 5.7 Nominations
Registered members wishing to nominate for selection in Victorian representative crews must do so in writing in the form published from time to time at the RV website.
- 5.8 RV Colours
The RV colours worn at the Interstate Championships shall be navy blue with a white "V". The Board may, from time to time, elect to nominate other colours to be worn by Victorian representative crews at competitions other than the Interstate Championships.
- 5.9 Representative Team Expenses
- 5.9.1 RV shall with the funds made available from the Interstate Fund, and if an international event the International Fund, assist in defraying the expenses of Victorian representative teams consisting of selected manager(s), coaches, coxswains, scullers and crews.
- 5.9.2 The appointed manager shall in preparing the team expenses be authorised to include the equipment and team costs as set out hereunder:
- (i) Travelling expenses to and from the venue.

- (ii) Approved racing attire and uniform for each team member.
- (iii) Transport of all team rowing equipment to and from the venue.
- (iv) Insurance of all rowing equipment used by crews selected to represent RV pursuant to these rules.
- (v) Where equipment is to be hired by the Association for the exclusive use of a crew such equipment shall be provided by the club with a majority representation in that respective crew. The Board shall fix, in its opinion, a fair and reasonable weekly hire rate for such equipment and RV shall pay such rate for a period of no more than four weeks. In the event of any member club requiring a higher rate than that fixed by the Board, the additional hire fee will be the responsibility of the members of that particular crew. Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this sub-clause, if any of the said crews also compete in the same class of boat for their member clubs at a National Regatta, in the same period and use the same equipment, no hire fee will be paid by RV in terms of this Policy. In the event of any crew being wholly comprised of members of one club and such club and such crew is also competing in the same class of event in the National Regatta as hereinbefore mentioned, no hire fee shall be paid.
- (vi) If there is no member club with a majority of competitors in a crew covered by the preceding sub clause, or equipment is unavailable or unsuitable, the applicable team manager shall arrange for a boat from another of the represented member clubs.
- (vii) Single scullers shall provide their own boats and sculls.
- (viii) Accommodation at the venue for the number of days approved by the RV CEO.
- (ix) Any other expenses as approved by the RV CEO.

5.9.3 The total team expenses shall be ascertained by the team manager and after deducting the funds provided by the Interstate Fund or the International Fund, the balance shall be apportioned among the team members and paid by them to the team manager(s) no later than 7 days prior to the departure of the team from Melbourne.

5.9.4 The team manager is permitted to arrange fund raising to assist in meeting Victorian representative team expenses not provided by RV, but any such arrangements or appeals must be authorised and conducted in accordance with Rule 5.6.

5.9.5 No members of any Victorian representative team are permitted to engage in any advertising or soliciting of sponsorships without the authority of the Board and must sign an undertaking to that effect upon selection.

5.9.6 The team manager shall present a report to the RV CEO within six weeks after the event at which the Victorian team competed (referred to in this sub-clause as "the Regatta").

The team manager shall report on the following matters:-

- (i) Members of the team;
- (ii) Detailed financial statement including fund raising;
- (iii) Training prior to the Regatta;
- (iv) Competition prior to the Regatta;
- (v) Transport of the team to, at and from the Regatta venue;
- (vi) Transport of boats to, at and from the Regatta venue;
- (vii) Accommodation at the venue;
- (viii) Team manager's accommodation costs (receipts to be supplied);
- (ix) Officials and social functions at the Regatta;
- (x) Results; and
- (xi) Any other matters.

5.9.7 RV will not be responsible for costs of testing of competitors involved in the selection of crews to represent Victoria. Such costs shall be borne by the competitors who, before undergoing such tests, shall give a written undertaking to meet their individual costs.

5.10 No appeals for funds shall be made on behalf of or in the name of RV without the prior authority of RV and then only upon such terms and conditions as the Board may decide.

5.11 Management and financial control of RV teams

Each team manager shall:

5.11.1 Prior to the selection of their team, submit to the RV CEO a budget of the estimated costs of the team's representation.

5.11.2 Not make any material alteration to any approved Team budget without the prior written consent of the RV CEO acting on the advice of the Board.

The RV CEO shall:

5.11.3 Consider, and if necessary in consultation with the team manager, amend and approve the budget of each Team.

The manager of each team shall be delegated in writing by the RV CEO such authority as is necessary to undertake the role and shall only act in accordance with such delegated authority. Such authority will include the power to enter into agreements on behalf of the team so long as such actions comply with the team budget.

RULE 6 BLANK

This rule is purposely left blank

RULE 7 RIGHT TO PARTICIPATE

7.1 Registration with Clubs and Schools

Clubs and Schools must be affiliated with RV, or with a state or national rowing federation/association recognised by RV, in order to be eligible to enter RV Events.

7.2 Transfer Between Clubs

- 7.2.1 All competitors who wish to compete for a Club other than the Club they last competed for or were registered with, must apply for and be granted, a transfer prior to being eligible to enter an RV Event and be permitted to race.
- 7.2.2 A competitor requiring a transfer shall apply to the Club with which he/she was last affiliated with. The transfer must be processed via the form provided on the RV website and must be approved by both the source and destination club.
- 7.2.3 Such competitor shall not be entitled to race for another Club affiliated with RV unless:
 - (i) they receive a clearance and approval to transfer from the prior Club; or
 - (ii) a period of 7 days has elapsed from the date of their service of a request for transfer has been delivered to the Club from whom they seek clearance, and that Club has not indicated their objection pursuant to the provisions of this rule.
- 7.2.4 A Club shall be entitled to refuse a clearance and transfer approval to any applicant if:
 - (i) any monies are outstanding to it or a Club affiliated with it;
 - (ii) disciplinary action has been taken and the terms of such action have not been fulfilled.

7.3 Exceptions

- 6.3.1 An undergraduate of a University may compete in rowing races for which they are eligible as a member of their University notwithstanding that they are a member of another Club.
- 6.3.2 A student genuinely attending any recognised primary, secondary or technical school as a full time student may compete in rowing races for which they are eligible as a member of their school crew entered in the name of the School, notwithstanding that they are a member of a Member Club.

RULE 8 DEFINITIONS

- 8.1 “The Board” shall mean the Board of RV.
- 8.2 “Clubs” shall mean the Clubs and Schools affiliated with RV and where the context permits, shall mean solely club and not clubs and schools.
- 8.3 “Code” means any code of conduct adopted by RV to govern the conduct of competitors, coaches, officials and employees of RV.

- 8.4 "Commission" shall mean the commission appointed by the Board in accordance with these Rules.
- 8.5 "Fairness Committee" shall consist of the Board of the Jury, Field of Play Manager and the Chair of the Organising Committee.
- 8.6 "FISA" means the International Rowing Federation.
- 8.7 "Interstate Events" are events conducted at the Interstate Rowing Championships, open only to crews and scullers representing Members Associations under the Rules of RA.
- 8.8 "Interstate Fund" means the fund established at rule 10.1.
- 8.9 "International Fund" means the fund established at rule 10.2.
- 8.10 "Organising Committee" means the Club or approved association awarded the right to conduct an RV Event.
- 8.11 "RA" shall mean Rowing Australia Ltd.
- 8.12 "Rowing Manager" shall mean the on-line membership management and regatta entry system used by RV from time to time.
- 8.13 "RV" shall mean Rowing Victoria Inc.
- 8.14 "RV CEO" shall mean the Chief Executive Officer of RV as appointed by the Board, or their delegate.
- 8.15 RV coxswain accreditation policy means the policy from time to time promulgated by RV regarding the accreditation of coxswains.
- 8.16 "RV Event" a rowing event conducted under the auspices of RV. The regattas at which these events are held shall be conducted under these Rules and related By-Laws.
- 8.17 "RV Field of Play Manager" shall mean the person appointed to that position by the Board or their delegate who shall be pre approved by the Board.
- 8.18 "RV Head Coach" shall mean the person appointed by the RV CEO.
- 8.19 "Safety Management Plan" shall mean the safety management plan adopted by RV, it's affiliated Clubs and Schools, and rowing associations.
- 8.20 "State Championships" are events open to all competitors and to all crews comprised of competitors who are members of Clubs affiliated to RV or Members of Clubs affiliated to other Rowing Associations recognised by RV under Rule 6.1.
- 8.21 "VIS" means the Victorian Institute of Sport

8.22 “RV Website” or “Rowing Victoria Website” shall mean content hosted on the web domain rowingvictoria.asn.au or Rowing Manager.

RULE 9 RV EVENTS

9.1 Control By RV

RV Events shall take place under the authority of RV, which may give directions to the Organising Committee through the President of the Jury to supervise and verify the application of the RV Rules of Racing and By-Laws or any variation of them approved by RV. Details of any departures from the RV Rules of Racing or By-Laws must be provided to competing Clubs at the time of their invitation to take part in the Regatta.

9.2 Date For The Event

The Board shall ratify the dates for the conduct of all sanctioned RV Events.

9.3 Venue Selection For The Event

9.3.1 The RV CEO shall invite Organising Committees to express an interest to conduct a RV Event under the provisions of these Rules and to the specifications determined by RV.

9.3.2 Organising Committees which express an interest to conduct a RV Event will need to display to satisfaction of RV that they are capable of conducting the event within the provisions of these Rules and staging terms, and where the event has been staged before, have successfully conducted the event to the satisfaction of RV.

9.3.3 Should any Organising Committee be unable to display to RV that they are able to meet the required standard for the conduct of the RV Event at the time applications are reviewed, then RV shall be entitled to award the conduct of that event to an alternate Organising Committee and on such venue and on such commercial arrangements, as it sees fit.

9.3.4 The process for allocation of RV Events to Organising Committees is contained Appendix 11.

9.4 Notice Of Regatta

9.4.1 RV shall publish a notice of the regatta calling for entries in accordance with these Rules.

9.4.2 The preliminary notice of a regatta will be posted on the RV website must contain the following items:

- (i) the place, time(s) and days(s) of the RV Event;
- (ii) the program of races. Where applicable the order of races shall be as laid down by the Board;
- (iii) the amount of entry fees;
- (iv) a plan of the course;
- (v) the date and closing time for entries; and

(vi) the contact details of the Regatta Secretary.

9.5 Entries

RV will communicate details of entries received in accordance with the requirement of Rule 48.

9.6 Staging Agreement

The Organising Committee that is awarded the conduct of a RV Event shall enter into a Staging Agreement, which shall prescribe the conduct and management of the event in line with, but not limited to, Appendix 12 – RV Staging agreement

9.6.1 The monetary agreements between the Organising Committee and RV;

9.6.2 Dates for the conduct of the RV Event;

9.6.3 Appropriate recognition and involvement of sponsors of RV;

9.6.4 Monitoring of the preparations for the conduct of the RV Event;

9.6.5 Inspection of facilities

9.6.6 Insurance

9.6.7 Naming of the RV Event

9.6.8 Division of responsibilities for the conduct of the RV Event

9.6.9 Promotion of the ideals of RV, and their recognition

9.6.10 Creation of an Organising Committee for the conduct of the RV Event

9.6.11 Recognition by the Organising Committee that the RV Event is the intellectual property of RV

9.6.12 Agreed reporting processes

9.6.13 Arrangements for the sale of merchandise

9.6.14 Any other terms and conditions on which the parties may agree.

The pro forma staging agreement is contained in Appendix 12

9.7 Reports on Arrangements for the Conduct of Regatta

Three months prior to the start of an RV Event the Organising Committee of the Club conducting the RV Event shall inform the RV CEO of the arrangements for the regatta and the schedule for the completion of those arrangements.

9.8 Regatta Review

9.8.1 RV shall conduct a review of all RV Events within one month of the regatta. In doing so, RV shall receive within 2 weeks of the conclusion of an RV Event the following reports, which will be used to evaluate the RV Event and make recommendations for future events and/or changes to the venue:

(i) Regatta secretary report - template provided by RV

- (ii) The referee report - template provided by RV
- (iii) The Field of Play – template provided by RV
- (iv) Competitor feedback – in any form received

By Law to Rule 9

Role of the Field of Play Manager

- 1.1 *The Board shall appoint the Field of Play Manager. The RV CEO may appoint other people to act in this role where the Field of Play Manager is unavailable to undertake the duties.*
- 1.2 *The Field of Play Manager shall*
 - *be a licensed RV Umpire,*
 - *have had hands on experience in conducting major rowing events, and*
 - *have a sound knowledge of the Rules of RV as well as its policies and procedures*
- 1.3 *In general, the duties of the Field of Play Manager are to ensure that the provisions of the staging agreement with RV are complied with and that and that the regatta is satisfactorily run both from the safety and competitive points of view.*
- 1.4 *The Field of Play Manager will maintain a continual liaison with the Competition Commission.*
- 1.5 *The Field of Play Manager will maintain a continual liaison with the Organising Committee for any RV Event and shall have the authority to agree the facilities to be provided.*
- 1.6 *The Field of Play Manager shall monitor and report to the RV CEO on the on-water preparations for each RV Event, in particular, addressing issues relating to the responsibilities of the Organising Committee.*
- 1.7 *On arrival at an RV Event, the Field of Play Manager should inspect the regatta course with a representative of the Organising Committee and the President of the Jury taking particular note of safety aspects, including warm-up and cool down areas, traffic rules in racing and training, and areas where crews will be marshalled. They will also inspect the boating area, to ensure that the arrangements for boating and disembarking are satisfactory and that the traffic rules are adequately displayed. They will also ensure that the minimum requirements for the regatta required by the Rules of Racing and By-Laws are in place (e.g. distance markers, photo finish, weighing arrangements, medical facilities, rescue services, etc.).*
- 1.8 *Once the Field of Play Manager is satisfied that the course and event environs meet the requirements of the RV Rules the Field of Play Manager shall declare it fit for use and hand over the course to the President of the Jury for competition. The Jury shall then conduct the regatta in accordance with these Rules.*
- 1.9 *The Field of Play Manager shall attend the first meeting of the Jury and should notify the Jury of any problems that she/he foresee, either from a*

safety or competitive point of view. However, the Field of Play Manager should leave the Jury to carry out its role as set out in the Rules of Racing.

- 1.10 During the regatta, the Organising Committee and/or the President of the Jury shall consult the Field of Play Manager on any matter where there is any uncertainty concerning the application of RV Rules. The Field of Play Manager shall advise the Organising Committee, President of the Jury of any failure to comply with RV Rules. In the event of a disagreement between Organising Committee and President of the Jury and the Field of Play Manager the position of the Field of Play Manager shall prevail.*
- 1.11 The legal responsibility for matters of safety rests with the Organising Committee and nothing in the Rules of Racing or By-Laws shall be taken as imposing legal liability on the Jury or the Field of Play Manager.*
- 1.12 Within two months of the end of the event, the Field of Play Manager shall send a report to the RV CEO, who shall then forward it to the Organising Committee. The report should set out comments, proposals, and criticisms in a prescribed format.*

RULE 10 PREMIERSHIPS, TROPHIES AND MEDALLIONS

- 10.1 RV will conduct a point score competition for the award of Premierships in Victoria based in the format established in Appendix 9.
- 10.2 The perpetual trophies of RV shall be under the control of the RV CEO. The trophies may be released by the CEO to:-
 - 10.2.1 the Organising Committee for exhibition and subsequent presentation to winning representative crews; or
 - 10.2.2 the Club of the winning representative crews for special occasion
Provided that the Organising Committee or Club requesting possession of the trophies:
 - 10.2.2.1 indemnifies RV for all approved transport costs;
 - 10.2.2.2 provides adequate and acceptable undertakings as to security of the trophies to the satisfaction of the CEO; and
 - 10.2.2.3 returns the trophies to the control of the CEO within such time frame as agreed.
- 10.3 The perpetual trophies shall be insured by RV for such sum as the Board may from time to time determine.
- 10.4 The perpetual trophies, while in the control of the CEO, shall be kept in safe custody.

RULE 11 RV SPECIAL PURPOSE FUNDS

The Board may establish special purpose funds from time to time, as approved by the General meeting. These funds shall be listed and recorded in the annual report. The investments of these funds can be invested jointly with other funds

and the annual income allocated to each fund by reference to the percentage of assets invested.

11.1 Interstate Fund

11.1.1 There shall be established in the books of RV a fund to be known as the Interstate Fund.

11.1.2 RV may transfer to the Interstate Fund such of the property and investments of RV as RV in General Meeting may from time to time determine and shall credit to the fund any property or monies received by it by donation, bequest, appeal or otherwise for the specific purposes of the Interstate Fund.

11.1.3 The Interstate Fund shall be invested in the name of RV and in any investments authorised by RV.

11.1.4 At the Boards discretion the net annual income received from the Interstate Fund shall be applied towards defraying the expenses of the teams selected to represent Victoria in each year.

11.1.5 After defraying team expenses provided for in 10.1.4 the surplus net annual income shall be added to the capital of the Interstate Fund.

11.1.6 In a year where more than 100% of net annual income is to be applied towards defraying team expenses, the additional funds shall be withdrawn from the capital of the Interstate Fund.

11.2 International Fund

11.2.1 There shall be established in the books of RV a special fund to be known as the International Fund (hereafter called "the International Fund"). RV may transfer to the International Fund such property and investments of RV as RV in General Meeting may from time to time determine and shall credit to the fund any property or monies received by it by donation, bequest, appeal or otherwise for the specific purposes of the International Fund.

11.2.2 The funds shall be invested in the name of RV in or upon any of the investments authorised by RV.

11.2.3 At the Board's discretion the net annual income received from the International Fund shall be applied towards defraying the expenses of members selected to represent Australia in each year.

This amount will be determined in the budget for each year and allocated amongst teams at the discretion of the Board.

RULE 12 PRIZES

12.1 Cash prizes may be awarded for RV Events or races conducted under the auspices of RV.

12.2 Competitors may receive cash prizes for competition.

12.3 Any such prize shall be paid to the School or Club of any competitors winning such prize, or to RV, and not directly to competitors.

Such School, Club or Board may distribute such prizes among the competitors who won the prize.

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PART II ROWERS AND COXSWAINS

SECTION 1. GENERAL

RULE 18 ELIGIBILITY AND INSURANCE

- 18.1 RV Events shall be open to all competitors who are authorised to compete by their affiliated Club and who are eligible under these Rules.
- 18.2 All rowers shall be eligible to compete in the Open category in the appropriate weight division.
- 18.3 No competitor may race for two different Clubs or Schools at the same regatta but a competitor may represent their Club and their School at a Regatta.
- 18.4 School events are restricted to crews consisting of representatives of one school only unless approved by the Board.
- 18.5 All clubs and schools must provide the dates of birth of their registered members, and other information requested by RV from time to time.

RULE 19 HEALTH AND INSURANCE

- 19.1 Each Club and School shall ensure that their competitors shall have a state of health and fitness which allows them to compete at a level commensurate with the competition level of the particular event and ensure each competitor, team official and the Club carries appropriate accident and property insurance covering their persons, equipment and property.
- 19.2 Each Club and School shall comply with the Safety Management Plan. In exceptional circumstances, RV may allow non-compliance with the Code but in such cases, RV will require that the Club or School complies with relevant marine safety legislation.

RULE 20 MEN'S AND WOMEN'S EVENTS

Subject to Rule 20, only men may compete in men's events and only women may compete in women's events. In mixed events men and women may compete in a crew in such proportion as shall be stipulated in these Rules and Regulations or otherwise by the organising committee.

By-Law to Rule 20

Determination of Eligibility – In cases requiring determination of eligibility in respect of this Rule, including sex re-assignment and hyperandrogenism, the RV Board will refer to International Olympic Committee guidelines.

RULE 21 COMMITMENT

Where required by RV, rowers may only compete at RV Events if they have submitted a signed commitment form in the form approved by RV. Each team official must have submitted a signed commitment form to RV before accreditation may be issued at an RV Event.

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RULE 25 RV CATEGORIES

The following categories of rowers are recognised by RV:

- 25.1 School (male and female)
- 25.2 Under 17 (male and female)
- 25.3 Under 19 (male and female)
- 25.4 Under 21 (Youth) (male and female)
- 25.5 Under 23 (male and female)
- 25.6 Open (male and female)
- 25.7 Masters (male and female and mixed)
- 25.8 Para Rowing
- 25.9 Rowers Score Categories – Calculated as per the formula outlined in Rule 16
 - 25.9.1 A grade races are open to all competitors.
 - 25.9.2 B grade races are open to rowers or crews with an RS equal to or greater than 2.50.
 - 25.9.3 C grade races are open to rowers or crews with an RS equal to or greater than 3.00.
 - 25.9.4 D grade races are open to rowers or crews with an RS equal to or greater than 3.50.
- 25.10 Novice races are open to rowers in their first year of rowing and who have not won a race in any division. Eligibility for novice rowing is not affected if they enter any other grade or underage event.

In addition to these categories, a lightweight category for men and women (see RULE 26) is recognised by RV.

RULE 26 RV SCORE FORMULA

- 26.1 RV utilises a “score” (Rowing Score or RS) to determine grading in races. The RS is a number that represents the performance level of the individual.
- 26.2 A crew RS is calculated by Rowing Manager on the average RS of the crew members. Entries can be made for either the correct grade or higher.
- 26.3 The cut off points for each grade shall be reviewed annually by the RV CEO to maintain balance in the competitive populations at each grade level
- 26.4 A formula is to be applied in adjusting a rower’s Rowing Score in “Grade Events” is as follows:

Win: = Current Rowing Score -0.15

Loss: = Current Rowing Score +0.03

A rower’s RS will be calculated to four decimal places.

- 26.5 A rower’s score will only be adjusted when the relevant event has 3 or more starters.
- 26.6 Each Championship win (other than a Junior School or any Master Championship, but including Australian Championship or Interstate Championship) will attract an additional deduction of -0.15 points to a rower’s score. Each representation in a state team at the Interstate Championships or an Australian Team at a World Championships will also attract a deduction of -0.15 points to a rower’s score. These additional deductions are in addition to the standard score change outlined at 17.4, 17.9 or 17.10.
- 26.7 Score Adjustment for High Performance Rowers. In the instance where a rower is selected for an Open or Underage State or National Team their score will be adjusted to 2.00 (where their existing score was greater than 2.00).

- 26.8 RS matrix
The Rowing Score is affected by the Win / Loss Formula for Grade Events outlined in Rule 26.4.4 in accordance with the following table.

26.10 Competitors who win an underage event will have a grade score applied as follows:

Level of Competition will apply where multiple divisions of the event are offered and not at Head Races.

26.11 Where a competitor's RS is lower (better) than the adjusted score they will retain their original score.

26.12 The following opening scores is applicable for all rowers: 3.70

26.13 Appeals can be lodged to RV on the RS.

26.14 Competitors who are under 16 or over the age of 43 will have a minimum score of 3.01

RULE 27 LICENCES

27.1 The Board may decide on the introduction of licenses for all categories of rowers and coxswains.

27.2 Where applicable, the jury shall appoint a person to check the licenses of all competitors at the beginning of every regatta not later than two hours before the first race of the rowers concerned.

RULE 28 COXSWAINS

28.1 Coxswains are members of the crew. However, a women's crew may be steered by a man, a men's crew may be steered by a woman.

28.2 Age categories shall apply to coxswains, except in Under 23 and masters categories.

28.3 The minimum weight for a coxswain (wearing racing uniform) is 55kg for all RV events including all School events. The weighing scales shall indicate the weight of the coxswain to 0.1 kg.

28.4 To make up this weight, a coxswain may carry deadweight in a sealed bag which shall be placed in the boat as close as possible to his/her person. No article of racing equipment shall be considered as part of this deadweight. At any time, before or until immediately after the race, the Organising Committee or Jury may require the deadweight to be reweighed.

28.5 These provisions shall also apply to coxswains in lightweight races.

28.6 Notwithstanding the provisions of Rule 12.4, a coxswain may steer for any number of Clubs at a regatta.

28.7 Coxswains must be accredited with RV in accordance with the RV Coxswain Accreditation policy to be able to steer a crew at an RV Regatta. Failure to have an accredited coxswain in a coxed race incurs penalties specified in appendix 13.

RULE 29 WEIGHING OF COXSWAINS

29.1 It is the inherent responsibility of a Club/School for ensuring coxswains to make the minimum weight wearing their racing uniform as listed in Rule 18 and where underweight, carry the correct amount of dead weight in a recognized weight bag. A coxswain's weight need not be registered with RV and need not weigh in at regattas except for Championship events.

29.2 Coxswains shall be weighed in wearing racing uniform by a person duly authorised by the Organising Committee on tested scales not less than one hour and not more than 24 hours before their first race at each Championship regatta in which they are competing. Immediately after any

race an Official duly authorised by RV may check the weight carried by the coxswain of any crew. In the event of the weight carried by the coxswain of any given crew is underweight, then the crew steered shall be relegated to last place.

- 29.3 The Organising Committee may require on the occasion of the first weighing or subsequently, the deposit of an official identity card with photograph.
- 29.4 A coxswain shall be permitted to steer for any Member Club or School at any regatta approved or sanctioned by RV provided that the coxswain shall have been registered as a coxswain of a Member Club or School pursuant to the Rules.

RULE 30 SCHOOL COMPETITORS

A school competitor is one who:

- 30.1 Qualifies as Under 21 (Youth) under the provisions of these Rules; and
- 30.2 Is attending a secondary school as a full time student.

School events are restricted to crews consisting of representatives of one school only.

- 30.3 Under 17

A rower or coxswain may compete in an Under 17 rowing event until 31 December of the year in which the rower reaches the age of 16.

- 30.4 Under 19

A rower or coxswain may compete in an Under 19 rowing event until 31 December of the year in which the rower reaches the age of 18.

- 30.5 Under 21 (Youth)

A rower or coxswain may compete in an Under 21 rowing event until 31 December of the year in which the rower reaches the age of 20.

- 30.6 Under 23

A rower may compete in an Under 23 rowing event until 31 December of the year in which the rower reaches the age of 22.

- 30.7 Under 23

Open rowing events are open to rowers of all ages.

RULE 31 LIGHTWEIGHTS

- 31.1 A rower may compete in Lightweight rowing events if he meets the following criteria:

- 31.1.1 A Lightweight men's crew (excluding coxswain) shall have no individual Lightweight male rower weighing more than 72.5 kg. A Lightweight male single sculler (male) may not weigh more than 72.5 kg.
- 31.1.2 A Lightweight women's crew (excluding coxswain) shall have no individual Lightweight female rower weighing more than 59 kg. A single sculler (female) may not weigh more than 59 kg.
- 31.2 Lightweight rowers shall be weighed wearing only their racing uniform on tested scales not less than one hour and not more than two hours before their first race of each lightweight event in which they are competing, each day of the competition. They shall present themselves as a crew at the weighing centre already wearing their racing uniform. The weighing scales should indicate the weight of the rower to 0.1 kg.
- 31.3 If a rower has races in other events on a day of racing, the weight recorded for the first event may be applied to qualify for subsequent events.
- 31.4 Rowers may re-weigh for other events after their weigh-in for their first event on a day of racing, within the time limits applicable to that event. This weight may also be carried forward for any other races in which the rower competes on that day of racing.
- 31.5 Notwithstanding the foregoing, if two rounds of the same event take place on the same day of competition and some rowers in the second round do not have to race in the first round of that day, then these rowers in the second round shall be weighed at the same time as the rowers in the first round.
- 31.6 The Organising Committee may require on the occasion of the first weighing or subsequently the deposit of an official identity card with photograph.
- 31.7 If the first race is subsequently postponed or cancelled, the lightweight rower is not required to be weighed later on the same day for that event.
- 31.8 Any rower who has been re-hydrated intravenously between the weigh-in and the respective race shall not be allowed to start.
- 31.9 If a rower exceeds the required weight or a crew exceeds the required average weight by the expiry of the time permitted for weighing, the rower (and the crew of that rower) or the crew concerned are no longer eligible and shall be excluded from the event.
- 31.10 If a rower has races in other events on a day of racing, the weight recorded for the first event may be applied to qualify for subsequent events.

RULE 32 MASTERS

A rower may compete in Masters rowing events from the beginning of the year during which s/he attains the age of 27.

By-Law to Rule 32 - Masters (Male, Female and Mixed)

1.1 The age of a rower in a Masters rowing event shall be that which they attain during the year of the event.

1.2. Masters events shall be held in the following crew age categories:

- A Minimum age: 27 years*
- B Average age: 36 years or more*
- C Average age: 43 years or more*
- D Average age: 50 years or more*
- E Average age: 55 years or more*
- F Average age: 60 years or more*
- G Average age: 65 years or more*
- H Average age: 70 years or more*
- I Average age: 75 years or more*
- J Average age: 80 years or more*
- K Average age: 83 years or more.*
- L Average age; 86 years or more.*
- M Average age: 89 years or more.*

1.3. The average age of a crew (excluding the coxswain) will be calculated by dividing the total number of years of age of the crew by the number of members of the crew rounded down to the nearest whole number.

Age categories do not apply to coxswains of master crews.

Each competitor shall be responsible for his/her own health and fitness.

Every Masters rower must have his/her age verified by RV prior to competition (passport, drivers licence or identity card).

1.4. The handicaps that will apply at RV Masters Championships are contained in Appendix 7.

1.5. Handicaps will not apply when a crew or sculler purposefully enters a master's event in a category below their determined age category.

1.6. Handicaps will apply when RV combine two age categories for the purpose of creating a race.

1.7. Where a "rowover" is run in conjunction with another event, handicaps will apply.

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RULE 33 MIXED MASTERS EVENTS

Mixed crew events may be held for masters' crews in which half of the crew excluding the coxswain, shall be women and half shall be men. The coxswain may be of either gender.

RULE 34 PARA ROWING

- 34.1 A rower may compete in a Para-Rowing event if he/she has an Eligible Impairment and has been allocated an eligible sport class and sport class status under the Para-Rowing Classification Regulations as detailed in Appendix 6 of the Rowing Australia Rules of Racing and related By-laws.
- 34.2 The categories and boat classes for Para rowers at RV Events shall be determined by the RV and published at least three months in advance of the RV Event.
- 34.3 Organising Committees and the Jury do not adjudicate on qualification issues with Para Rowing. Disputes over qualification are to be recorded and referred to the Board who will appoint an expert to adjudicate.
- 34.4 Coxswains of Para crews may be either gender and are not required to have a disability.

PART III CLASSES OF BOAT

RULE 35 CLASSES OF BOAT

35.1 The following classes of boat are recognised by RV:

- Single Scull (1x)
- Double Scull (2x)
- Pair (2-)
- Quadruple Scull (4x)
- Coxed Quad Scull (4x+)
- Four (4-)
- Regulation Coxed Four (4+)
- Coxed Four (4+)
- Coxed Eight (8+)

35.2 The classes of boats used in each event are as follows:

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PART IV BOATS AND CONSTRUCTION

RULE 39 FREE CONSTRUCTION

The construction, design and dimensions of boats and oars shall, in principle, be unrestricted subject to the limits defined in Rule 1, paragraphs 1 and 2 and Rule 39.

Nevertheless the Board of RV may, in By-Laws to these Rules, impose appropriate requirements.

By-Laws to RULE 39— Boats and Equipment

1 Requirements for racing boats:

- 1.1 *The bows of all boats shall be fitted with a solid white ball shape, minimum diameter 4cm which covers the point of the bows and is bright white. If this is an external part it shall be firmly affixed to the bow of the boat such that it does not significantly deflect if a side force is applied. If it is an integral part of the hull construction, it shall afford equivalent protection and visibility.*
- 1.2 *All boats shall comply with the requirements set out in the By-Laws to Rule 41, below (name, symbol, etc.).*
- 1.3 *Natural Properties – No substances or structures (including riblets) capable of modifying the natural properties of water or of the boundary layer of the hull/water interface shall be used.*
- 1.4 *Communications and Electronics*
 - 1.4.1 *Data Transmission - During racing (which shall mean at all times when racing “traffic rules” are in force), no communication with the crew is permitted from outside of the boat using electric or electronic equipment. In addition, no data may be sent to, or received from the boat except as provided in paragraph 1.4.2.*
 - 1.4.2 *Allowable Data – During racing, no communication with the crew is permitted from outside the boat using electric or electronic equipment. In addition, no data may be sent to or received from the boat except as provided for below. During racing, the only information allowed to the crew in the boat shall be:*
 - A. *Time*
 - B. *Stroke Rate*
 - C. *Boat velocity/acceleration*
 - D. *Heart rate*

This information shall be designated “allowable data”. This data and any information derived directly from it may be recorded during racing for later use. No other data or information may be measured, recorded or stored. Failure to comply with this By-Law shall result in a sanction up to disqualification. RV may install on each boat a device(s) for the purpose of transmitting real-time race and other information which shall be owned by RV and may be used for any purpose including presentation and promotion of the event and the sport.

- 1.5 *Quick release foot stretchers - In all boats with the foot stretchers, shoes or other devices holding the feet of the rowers shall be a type which allow the rowers to get clear of the boat without delay in an emergency. Where shoes and other devices holding the feet will remain in the boat, each shoe or device shall be independently restrained such that when the heel reaches the horizontal position the foot will be released from the shoe. In addition, where laces, Velcro or similar materials, all such materials must be able to be released immediately with a single quick hand action of pulling on one easily accessible strap. Where shoes or other devices holding the feet will not remain in the boat, each shoe or device must be able to be released by the rower without using his hands or with a single quick hand action of pulling on one easily accessible strap or release device.*
- 1.6 *The edges of blades must have a minimum thickness throughout as follows:*
- oars 5 mm;*
 - sculls 3 mm.*
- This thickness shall be measured 3 mm from the outer edge of the blade for oars and 2 mm for sculls.*
- 1.7 *The opening of the coxswain's seat must be at least 70 cm long and it must be as wide as the boat for at least 50 cm. The inner surface of the enclosed part must be smooth and no structure of any sort may restrict the inner width of the coxswains section.*
- 1.8 *All boats used in eights events at RV Events shall be in a minimum of two sections, with no section longer than 11.9 metres. With effect from 1 January 2017, all boats used in RA events shall not be longer than 12.3 m without a section. If a boat is in sections, no section shall be longer than 12.2 m.*
- 1.9 *At RV Events, the Board may require crews to carry on their boats such equipment as it considers desirable for the better promotion of the sport of rowing (e.g. mini cameras) provided that such equipment is identical for all boats in a race.*
- 1.10 *All boats from 1 January 2019 must have a production plaque or equivalent visible and permanently affixed inside the boat, up to 50 sq cm in area, on which is written the name and address of the boat builder, its mark or logo, the year the boat was constructed, the average weight of the crew for which the boat is designed, and the weight of the boat on construction or upon deliver, and stating whether the boat meets the floatation requirements specified in FISA's Minimum Guidelines for Safe Rowing, specifically that when full of water a boat with the crew seated in the rowing position should float in such a way that the top of the seat is a maximum of 5cm below the static waterline. It shall be the sole responsibility of the club including school club or State Association using a boat to ensure that it complies with this requirement.*
- 1.11 *Maximum Length – All boats used in eight events at all regattas under the authority of RV shall be a minimum of two sections, with no section longer than 11.9 metres.*
- 1.12 *Minimum length of racing boats — the minimum overall length of a racing boat shall be 7.20 metres. This will be measured from the front of the bow ball to the furthest aft extent of the boat, which may include an extension beyond the hull. If an extension is used it will terminate in a 40 mm ball as described in By-Law 39.1.1. If a boat cannot be correctly*

aligned because it is less than the minimum overall length, the Starter may exclude the crew from the race. This Rule does not apply to boats used at Para-rowing and Coastal Rowing events.

2. *Additional Requirements for racing boats:*

2.1 *RV may prescribe requirements for other boats used in competition and publish them on the RV website.*

2.2 *There is no regulation single scull.*

2.3 *Regulation four/quad scull must not exceed 12.4m in length, length being taken as the foremost face of the bow ball to the furthestmost section of the hull but not including the rudder. It shall not be less than 63cm at its widest point across the width of the top edge of the hull (saxboards or washboards). This measurement should not include riggers, rigger blocks, splash boards or any false addition of material to increase the width of the top edge.*

Nevertheless the Board of RV may, in By-Laws to these Rules, impose additional requirements.

RULE 40 INNOVATION IN EQUIPMENT

Innovations in equipment including, but not limited to, boats, oars, related equipment and clothing, must meet the following requirements before they are allowed for use in RV Events:

- 40.1 They must be commercially available to all competitors (patents may not exclude the use by a team or a competitor);
- 40.2 The costs involved must be reasonable;
- 40.3 Not provide an advantage to some competitors over others or change the nature of the sport;
- 40.4 They must be safe and environmentally sound.
- 40.5 Be a positive development for the sport of rowing and maintain the principles, in particular those of fairness and equality, of the sport.

Any innovation must be submitted to the Board for evaluation. If it is judged to meet the above conditions and is approved for use, it must be readily available for all competitors by January 1st of the next year in order to be authorised for use in RV events that year. Crews with unapproved innovations shall not be allowed to compete.

The Board has the sole authority to decide all matters under this Rule including whether an innovation is significant, whether it is readily available, whether the costs are reasonable and whether it is safe and environmentally sound and whether it is a positive development for the sport of rowing and maintains the principles of the sport.

RULE 41 BOAT WEIGHTS

All boats used in RV Events shall be of defined minimum weight.

By-Law to RULE 35 — Boat Weights

1. Minimum weights for boats are the following:

2-	Pair	27 kilograms

Para-rowing boat weights are specified in within the Para Rowing Event Regulations as described in the RA Para Rowing Competition Regulations.

2. The minimum weight of the boat shall include only the fittings essential to their use, in particular: riggers, stretchers, shoes, slides, seats and hull extensions. The minimum boat weight shall not include the oars or sculls, the bow number or any other item not essential to its use and not firmly fastened to the boat. Additional weight carried in the boat to achieve the required weight shall be firmly fastened to the boat or to the essential fittings described above. The minimum weight shall also include:

- *Loud speakers if they are firmly fastened to the boat and associated wiring for such speakers;*
- *Any housings or fittings that are firmly fastened to the boat for the purposes of holding electronic or other equipment;*
- *Cables and wires required to connect electronic equipment to provide “allowable data” (see By law to Rule 35), and*
- *Seat pads that are attached to the seat.*

3 Weighing Scales

The weighing scales shall be provided by a RA approved manufacturer and shall indicate the weight of the boat to 0.1 kg. The scales shall be connected to a printer so that a printed record of the boat weight is immediately available. At the beginning of each official training day and of each racing day the scales shall be tested, using calibrated (gauged) weights, by a person duly authorised by the Organising Committee conducting the regatta and the member of the Control Commission responsible for boat weighing.

4 Test weighing of boats

The weighing scale(s) shall be available to the crews 24 hrs before the first race of the regatta for the test weighing of their boats. The scales shall be located on a horizontal inflexible floor, inside a building or a tent to provide protection from the wind. The weighing area shall be easily accessible from the incoming pontoons and shall be exclusively reserved for the weighing of boats during the regatta.

5 *Responsibility for the weight of a boat*

It is solely the responsibility of the crew that their boat has the required minimum weight.

6 *Official Boat Weighing Procedure*

The President of the Jury or his delegate shall make a random draw before the start of each racing session to select the boats which are to be weighed. He shall also have the right to include additional boats at any time before the finish of the race of the boat concerned if there is a suspicion that certain boats are underweight. He shall deliver copies of this draw to the responsible person at the Control Commission. The draw shall be kept confidential until the crew of each selected boat is notified of that selection.

A member of the Control Commission shall notify the selected crews as they leave the water after their races and they, or people appointed for that purpose, shall accompany each boat to the weighing scales. A selected crew is required to take its boat directly to the weighing scales when it is notified that the boat has been selected for weighing. Failure to do so may lead to the crew being penalised as if the boat had been underweight. Once the crew has been notified that the boat has been selected for weighing, no extra weight of any description can be added to the boat until the boat has been weighed.

At the official weighing of the boat the normal wetted surface of the boat is accepted. However, any standing water must be removed before the weighing, in particular any water between the shoulders and under the canvas. All other items (cox boxes, tools, clothes, sponges, bottles, etc.) must be taken out of the boat before the weighing.

The boat shall be officially weighed.

6 *Failure to make the minimum weight*

If a boat is below the minimum weight, the member of the Control Commission shall write the words "First Boat Weighing" on the printed result sheet. He shall then test the scales with the gauged weights, observed by the crew representative, and print out the result of this test. He shall record on the printed test result the name of the crew and the event and shall write the words "Test Weighing" on the printed result sheet. Both the crew representative and the member of the Control Commission shall sign the printed result of this test.

The boat concerned shall then be weighed for the second time. If, on the second weighing, the boat weight is not below the minimum, no further action is necessary. If, however, the boat is still below the minimum weight the member of the Control Commission shall record on the printed result the name of the crew, the event and the number. He shall write the words "Second Boat Weighing" on the printed result sheet. Both the crew representative and the member of the Control Commission shall sign the printed result. No other or later weighing shall be considered as valid.

The member of the Control Commission shall award the appropriate penalty to the crew.

The member of the Control Commission shall deliver the three printed results (First Boat Weighing, Test Weighing of the scales and Second Boat Weighing) to the President of the Jury.

The penalty for having raced in an underweight boat shall be that the crew is relegated to last place in the particular race. If two or more boats in the same race are underweight, they shall all be relegated and they shall be ranked in the descending order of their respective boat weights on the second weighing. If their boat weights on the second weighing are identical they shall be ranked by their order of finish in the race. If the crew races again in an underweight boat in a later round of the same event then the penalty shall be the exclusion of the crew.

PART V COURSES

RULE 42 CHARACTERISTICS

- 42.1 Rowing Courses in Victoria are classified in Categories 1-3 based on the following criteria.

Category 1 – As per RA requirements for a 2000m, minimum 6 lane course, buoyed each 10 metres or better, held start, and straight and 1000 metres for masters races

Category 2 - 1500m or greater in length, 6 or less lanes, buoyed each 100 metres or better including bridges and corners in the case that the course is not straight.

Category 3 – All other approved courses.

- 42.2 The Board may lay down other requirements for RV Events.

RULE 43 LENGTH OF THE COURSE

- 43.1 The standard racing distances shall be 2,000 metres straight for Open, Underage, A and B grade Male and Female. C and D grade Male and Female and Masters (Male, Female and Mixed crews) the course shall be 1,000 metres (or other distance approved by the RV CEO).
- 43.2 The provisions of this Rule require the use of moveable starting installations in order that the bows of all boats of whatever class may be aligned on the same start line.
- 43.3 The length of the course and all intermediate distances shall be measured by an independent qualified surveyor and an accurate, certified plan shall be held by the Organising Committee conducting the Regatta and submitted to RV.
- 43.4 The Board may depart from this Rule in RV Events which are not championships.
- 43.5 The non-standard course may be shorter (for example, sprints) or longer (for example, long distances, head races, heads of the river, etc.) than the standard course. It is not necessary that the course be straight.

RULE 44 NUMBER OF LANES

On courses used for 2000m Championships, races shall normally be held over six lanes but, in principle, the course shall have at least eight lanes. For 1000m Championships races must be held on a course with a minimum of 4 lanes. Otherwise courses will be approved for use at the same time that the regatta is approved by RV.

By-Laws to Rules 42 to Rule 44

These By-Laws are found in Appendix 1.

PART VI ORGANISATION OF REGATTAS

RULE 45 AUTHORITY OF RV

- 45.1 All RV Events are under the overriding authority of RV and subject to the terms of any Staging Agreement entered into between RV and the Club, School, Association or Organising Committee concerned. An Organising Committee shall be responsible for the organisation of regattas or competition.
- 45.2 The preparation of the Regatta Program shall be at the direction of the RV CEO. The Club, School or Association which has been awarded the right to conduct a RV Event shall appoint an Organising Committee.
- 45.3 Upon appointment of the Organising Committee, the Club, School or Association shall forward full and detailed particulars of the members of that Committee to the RV CEO.
- 45.4 The Organising Committee appointed by the Club or other body that is conducting the Regatta is responsible for its organisation and direction and for the course and all necessary installations and equipment both on and off the water as set out in these Rules.

RULE 46 DUTIES OF THE ORGANISING COMMITTEE

- 46.1 An Organising Committee is responsible for the proper organisation of the regatta. The Organising Committee shall, in particular:
 - 46.1.1 Make available a stretch of water and technical equipment conforming to the present Rules of Racing;
 - 46.1.2 Appoint a Safety Officer;
 - 46.1.3 Appoint a Medical Officer;
 - 46.1.4 Take all other steps that are required to ensure the proper organisation of the regatta in accordance with, but not limited to, the staging agreement.
- 46.2 Provide to the satisfaction of the Field of Play Manager, sufficient personnel to ensure that all on shore facilities are adequately staffed so as to ensure their effective and efficient operation and the maintenance of those facilities for the duration of the event.

By-Law to Rule 46 - Duties of the Organising Committee

- 1. *Clubs, Schools, Associations, or Organising Committees wishing to conduct any regatta shall forward to the CEO, within 21 days of the call for applications, an application accompanied by the Regatta Application Fee provided for in 2.*

2. *Clubs, Schools, Associations, or Organising Committees applying to the Association to conduct an event as provided in By-Law 1 must pay a Regatta Application Fee at the time of making an application. Such deposit is refundable should the application be refused. Successful applications may be required to pay an insurance fee if they do not carry suitable liability cover for the event. These fees are outlined in appendix 13.*
3. *A Club, School, Association or Organising Committee that wishes to conduct a regatta or has conducted a regatta during the previous season and wishes to conduct a regatta in the next season must be able to demonstrate that it satisfies the minimum standards and has actioned any issues raised in the review process*
4. *All RV Events are under the authority of RV and of the Club, School, Association or Organising Committee concerned.*
5. *Responsibility of the Organising Committee - An organising committee is responsible for the preparation and running of the regatta.*
6. *Course, Installations, Jury - The organising committee is responsible for the course and all necessary installations and equipment, both on land and on the water. It is also responsible for the organisation of the regatta. RV shall appoint the Jury.*
7. *Safety Officer - The Organising Committee shall appoint a person as the regatta Safety Officer with specific responsibilities for ensuring that all the appropriate safety measures, including traffic rules, have been considered and then implemented for the safe running of the regatta. Nevertheless, the legal responsibility for safety matters rests with the Organising Committee as a whole, and nothing in the Rules of Racing shall be taken as imposing legal liability on the Safety Officer personally.*
8. *Medical Officer - The Organising Committee shall appoint a person as the regatta Medical Officer with specific responsibility for ensuring that appropriate medical support and facilities are readily accessible to the regatta. First aid facilities and a rescue service on the water must be available during all venue opening times.*
9. *Compliance with Rules of Racing - The Organising Committee is responsible to ensure the proper running of the regatta in accordance with the Rules of Racing. The Board may nominate Technical Delegates to any event held under the RV Rules of Racing to advise the Organising Committee where required and to report on the conduct of the event.*
10. *Radio and Telephone Communications - It is essential that there should be direct telephone and/or radio communication between the President of the Jury, the finish, the start and the Control Commission in order to enable the members of the Jury properly to carry out their duties. It is also essential that radio communication is provided between the rescue service on the water and the medical staff on duty at the course to deal with any emergency.*
11. *In making application to conduct a regatta, the applicants shall take note of the following provisions derived from the FISA Rules.*
12. *Prizes and Sponsorship Contracts*

Competitors may receive cash or other prizes for competition. They may also enter into sponsorship contracts provided these contracts do not conflict with the objects, values and sponsors of RV.

13. *Payments to Competitors*

There shall be no restriction imposed on payments made to a competitor from any source.

14. *Merchandising Rights*

At all regattas under its authority RV retains the right to sell or authorise the sale of merchandise, souvenirs and other articles. This right is devolved to each Organising Committee conducting RV sanctioned regattas.

15. *Commercial Publicity, Sponsorship and Advertising*

RV may impose additional requirements on Organising Committees beyond these Rules at the time of approval of the regatta.

16. *Entries, Entry Fees, Entry Levies, Withdrawals and Crew Changes*

16.1 Entries are received via Rowing Manager. The date for close of entries is as published by RV for each regatta.

16.2 RV sanctioned regattas shall be open to all competitors who are authorised to compete by any Club recognised under Rule 6.1.

16.3 When the regatta program has been approved by RV all events listed shall be conducted if two or more entries are received. Events may be combined where deemed appropriate.

16.4 The entrance fee for each competitor, including approved levies, in any race shall be approved by RV. Levies for School events shall be reviewed by RV each year. Within the entry fee there shall be charged on each entry any levy imposed in accordance with Part 9 of the Constitution. (Levies imposed for the purpose of providing funds for the Interstate and/or International Team expenses shall be reviewed by RV Board).

16.5 Entry fees are payable on all entries submitted to RV. By definition this is taken as the time when the entry is displayed in Rowing Manager at the close of entries.

16.6 Collection of entry fees will be undertaken by RV. RV shall invoice clubs for the amount of entry fees and collect by the means determined by the Board from time to time. RV, following the deduction of any levies shall remit to the Organising Committee the balance of the entry fees.

17. *Entries received after the closing time for entries can be accepted by RV where:*

17.1 a lane exists for the entry which does not alter the timetable of events; and

17.2 the entrant pays the advertised seat fee, plus an administration fee equal to RV of 100% of the advertised seat fee; and

17.3 crews shall be accepted on a first come basis (if only one lane exists then it is the first crew with an entry that is accepted and all other crews are rejected); and

17.4 the cut off for entries and the 'window' for late entries shall be advised to members prior to the commencement of each season; and

17.5 in the case where crews would otherwise have a 'no race', RV will attempt to find another opportunity for that crew or parts thereof to race in another event. This would not be considered as a late entry.

18. Timetable

A timetable of events shall be posted on the Rowing Victoria website prior to each regatta.

19. Programmes

All programmes for such regattas shall contain a notice provided by RV and no alteration or addition may be made to these notices unless the permission of RV CEO is obtained.

20. Fines

20.1 Non-Starters and Scratchings

20.1.1 Non-starters will be regarded as anyone who fails to notify the RV office of a withdrawal by email by 2.30pm on the last working day immediately preceding the regatta, if a regatta is not on a weekend, the RV office will advise the cut-off date for withdrawals.

20.1.2 Non-starters in any event who notify the Regatta Secretary or RV Office after the time mentioned in this law 20.1.1 - forfeiture of entrance fee and a fine set out in Appendix 13.

20.1.3 Crews or scullers who notify the RV Office of their withdrawal prior to the time mentioned in this law 20.1.1 - forfeiture of entrance fee.

21. Crews Removed From an Event

Such crews or scullers will not be permitted to row down the course in front of any race or in company with crews whilst competing in a race. Penalty: Fine as per Appendix 13 of these Rules.

22. Substitutes

The name of substitutes (including coxswains) must be notified not less than 1 hour before the advertised start time of a race to the Regatta Secretary on the prescribed form. Failure to do so incurs a penalty set out in appendix 13.

23. Non Events

Where withdrawals or lack of entries are received for an event, the President of the Jury if it occurs on a day of racing or RV if it occurs before the day of racing, may place the remaining crew in another event or redraw the event. Where a representative of a Club accepts the new entry, the normal rules regarding withdrawal and entry fees apply

RULE 47 REGATTA DAY INCIDENTS

47.1 Regatta Day Incidents that include Code of Behaviour violations, Disputes and cases not covered by the Rules of Racing or the relevant By-Laws shall be resolved by a Tribunal. In principle these matters are outside the

Rules of Racing and have been unable to be resolved by the responsible persons appointed for the regatta.

- 47.2 Before the commencement of each Regatta Season the RV Board shall appoint persons to the Tribunal Panel. These shall be a Tribunal Chair and Alternate and up to five (5) panel members. It is desirable but not essential for the Chair and Alternate to have legal qualifications. A Tribunal shall consist of the Chair or Alternate and two (2) panel members. Tribunal decisions shall be by simple majority.
- 47.3 The Incident must be fully described in a Regatta Day Incident Report and signed by the complainant and a responsible person of the Club or School. If the complainant is an Umpire the report shall also be signed by the President of the Jury. Witness accounts and names must also be appended to the incident report. The Regatta Day Incident Report complete with all statements must be lodged with the RV CEO at the RV Office by 4.00pm on the first business day after the incident.
- 47.4 Following the receipt of a Regatta Day Incident Report the RV CEO shall immediately arrange for a Tribunal Hearing to take place. Tribunal Hearings shall occur on either the Wednesday or Thursday following the incident. The complainant and witnesses may be asked to appear as well as any other persons that the Tribunal deems necessary.

Tribunal Hearings shall be conducted in person at a location determined by the RV CEO. If it is not convenient for a complainant, respondent or witness to attend in person then a telephone or video link shall be arranged.

- 47.5 The outcome of Tribunal Hearing shall be final. The outcomes of a Tribunal Hearing may include:
- (i) Dismissal of the matter
 - (ii) Change of Race Result
 - (iii) Reprimand
 - (iv) Fine or Suspension as provided elsewhere in the RV Rules
 - (v) Recommendation to change policy, rules, practice or procedure.

In the case of a Reprimand, Fine or Suspension the RV CEO must also advise the Club or School of the respondent in writing of the outcome. If the respondent is an Umpire, the Umpire's Panel and the RV Board must be advised. If the respondent is a member of RV Staff the RV Board must be advised.

Outcomes of Tribunal Hearings are to be recorded by the RV CEO and placed in safekeeping by RV. Prior sanctions recorded against an individual are to be taken into account by the Tribunal in the determination of a sanction.

RULE 48 SPONSORSHIP CONTRACTS

Competitors entering RV Events may enter into sponsorship contracts provided these contracts are reviewed and approved by RV and their Club in advance, and that these contracts are in compliance with RV rules.

RULE 49 RV MERCHANDISING RIGHTS

- 49.1 At all RV Events, RV retains the right to sell RV merchandise, souvenirs and other articles. The Organising Committee shall provide sites for this activity at no cost to RV.
- 49.2 All goods of whatever kind and description for distribution or sale or ordering for later delivery at a RV Event or any company, agent or affiliate of RV shall be under the authority, direction and control at all times of the RV CEO.
- 49.3 The RV CEO may at any time delegate, transfer, assign or licence all or part or parts of its authority and rights herein to such person(s), committee or organisation as it decides upon terms and conditions acceptable to it.

SECTION 2. ADVERTISING PROVISIONS

RULE 50 COMMERCIAL PUBLICITY, SPONSORSHIP AND ADVERTISING

Prohibited Advertising:

- (i) Any form of advertising (including body advertising) or Identifications, not specifically permitted by these Rules, is prohibited.
- (ii) All advertising must comply with the laws of the country or region in which the regatta is being staged.
- (iii) Even if otherwise permitted by laws of the country or region, no advertising is permitted which is inappropriate or which is harmful to the image of rowing including tobacco and strong liquor (more than 15% alcohol content) or in contradiction with FISA Statutes or Rules, in particular with Article 3 of the Statutes. In case of doubt, the Board shall decide. In events, regattas and championships solely for juniors advertising relating to alcohol is strictly prohibited.
- (iv) Where an advertiser or sponsor deals mainly in products which are prohibited by this clause, but also produces some other (not prohibited) product or service, it may have identifications, provided that the identification is clearly associated with the product or service that is not prohibited and cannot be seen as advertising the prohibited product.

The Board may prescribe By-Laws regarding commercial publicity, sponsorship and advertising at RV Events.

By-Law to Rule 50 – RV Advertising Rules

These By-Laws are found in Appendix 2.

RULE 51 ROWERS' CLOTHING

- 51.1 The RV CEO shall keep a register listing the racing colours of each Club, Institute and School in the State. Clubs shall assist the Board to maintain the Register by

informing RV of the colours of Clubs, Institutes and Schools affiliated with them or any alterations thereto.

- 51.2 Clubs or Schools must submit their colours to the RV CEO for approval. The RV CEO will assess the colours to make sure that they do not conflict or are too similar with the colours of existing clubs or schools.
- 51.3 Each member of a Club or School, or of a composite crew in the case of a Club or Institute crew competing in a RV Event, shall wear the registered racing colours of such crew member's Club, Institute or School when racing in regattas under the auspices of RV.
- 51.4 Each member of a Club or school competing in a RV Event shall wear the racing uniform of their Club or school and other garments which must all be identical in design and colour except for permitted sponsor identifications which shall nonetheless be identical colour within each crew. Except as provided for composite crews, members of the same crew shall compete in identically coloured clothing.
- 51.5 The racing uniform shall be designed so that the shoulders and arms of the t-shirts provided by RV (if any) are seen clearly.
- 51.6 Any changes in design or colours of racing uniforms registered with RV must be submitted to the Board at least two months before the date of the RV Event.
- 51.7 The Board may issue further regulations regarding rowers' clothing at RV Events, in particular, including use of a t-shirt provided by RV or other RV sponsor identification as in the By-Laws to RULE 41.
- 51.8 In certain events, the RV Board may prescribe that the blades of all oars and sculls shall be painted in the same manner on both sides in the colours of their Club or School or a consistent colour. Emblems need only be displayed on one side. In the absence of such a ruling or accident during a regatta, oars should be uniformly painted.

SECTION 3. ENTRIES, WITHDRAWALS AND CREW CHANGES

RULE 52 AUTHORISATION BY CLUBS

A crew or sculler may only compete in an RV Event only if authorised by its Club. The latter shall be held responsible for the payment of the entry fees.

If a crew enters a regatta without authorisation from their relevant Club then that Club cannot be held responsible for the crew and for its actions.

RULE 53 RESTRICTIONS ON ENTRIES

- 53.1 RV Events – Subject to Rule 12.4 no competitor may compete for two different clubs, institutes, schools or states at the same regatta.
- 53.2 All competitors shall be affiliated with RV at least 2 days prior to racing. Failure to affiliate rowers within that time frame shall incur a fine set out in Appendix 13.
- 53.3 Composite Crews - The composite rules applying to RV Events are:

- (a) Clubs may enter composite crews in the Open (including open lightweight events) and Masters Categories without restriction.
- (b) Clubs may not enter composite crews in under age events except with the prior approval of the RV CEO.
- (c) No composite crews shall be permitted in rowing score events.
- (d) Applications for a composite crew should be made to the RV CEO at least one week prior to the closing of entries to the event or events in which the composite crews seek to participate. The RV CEO shall approve or decline such an application by reference to guidelines approved by the Board and published on the RV website.

RULE 54 ENTRIES

The entry of a crew for a RV Event shall only be made via Rowing Manager unless otherwise approved by the Board. The entry shall be valid only if all details have been completed.

By-Law to Rule 54 - Entries

- 1 *Entries shall be made in the form approved by the Board and must include:*
 - 1.1 *the classification of the event entered;*
 - 1.2 *the name of the Club, Institute or School to which the competitors are affiliated, where appropriate;*
 - 1.3 *the names of the competitors including their positions in the crew.*
 - 1.4 *declare the eligibility of the competitors to compete in the event.*
- 2 *Each entry in a RV Event shall be validated:*
 - 2.1 *Validation of Entries shall be undertaken in a manner as may be approved by the Board from time to time.*
 - 2.2 *Each Club must validate each entry that contains competitors from that Club. Such validation shall indicate that the said competitors are eligible to compete in the race for which they have entered and that the said Club has no objection to such entry.*
 - 2.3 *Entries received from an Institute of Sport may be validated by an official of that Institute of Sport as may be approved by the Board from time to time without further reference to each competitor's Club.*
 - 2.4 *Any entry that includes competitors from two or more Clubs must be approved by each Club with which the competitors therein are affiliated.*
 - 2.5 *Validation of an entry by a Club/Institute of Sport will confirm acceptance by the Club/Institute of Sport of financial liability for that entry.*
 - 2.6 *Entries that are not validated by a Club/Institute of Sport will not be accepted.*
- 3 *No entries in an RV Event shall be accepted after the closing date unless in accordance with published policies of RV*
- 4 *Entry Fees and Deposits*

- 4.1 *The Organising Committee responsible for the conduct of a regatta may charge such entry fees and deposits therefore as are approved by the Board. The maximum entry fee for each competitor that can be charged shall be determined as follows:*
- 4.1.1 *The entry fee for each competitor, including approved levies and GST, in any race, shall be determined by the category of the course upon which the regatta is to be held. The maximum entry fee applicable to each course category is listed in Appendix 13 - RV Fees and Levies:*
- 4.1.2 *Head racing and Championship regattas - these regattas may charge entrance fees in excess of the fees in Appendix 13 but are limited to the entry fees charged for each competitor in that season.*
- 4.1.3 *Masters Regattas – The RV Masters Regatta series events may charge up to the entry fee for each competitor as prescribed in appendix 13 regardless of the category of the course upon which the regatta is to be held*
- 4.1.4 *The entry fees for each competitor, determined at (1), (2), and (3) above shall be subject to annual review by the Board commencing April each year. The maximum entry fees for each competitor shall be adjusted annually by the CPI movements for the year ended 31 March.*
- 4.1.5 *Notwithstanding anything contained in this By-Law (4) any regatta committee seeking to charge an entry fee for each competitor in excess of that determined above may make its case direct to the RV CEO for determination prior to the 31 May preceding the regatta.*
- 4.2 *Any deposit paid in respect of any crew or sculler shall be refunded to the Club or an Institute of Sport lodging the entry upon that crew's or scullers participation in the event for which it has been entered,*
- 4.3 *If a crew or sculler does not start in any race for which it has entered, the deposit paid in respect of that crew shall be forfeited to the Organising Committee. If a crew or sculler starts in any of the eliminatory races in any event and subsequently withdraws from further races in the event, the deposit shall be forfeited to RV.*
- 4.4 *The Organising Committee shall refund all deposits which it is obliged to refund under this By-Law to the relevant Club or an Institute of Sport as soon as practicable and in any event not later than one month after the conclusion of the regatta. The RV CEO shall be notified when all deposits required to be refunded have been refunded.*

5 Regatta Draw

The procedures relating to the draw are set out in RULE 62 and RULE 63.

6 Composite Entries

Clubs entering people from another club into a composite crew may be responsible for their affiliation to RV if that person is in fact not a current competitive member of their club and doesn't intend to become one.

7 Payment of Entry Fees and Affiliation Fees

Clubs shall pay for entry fees and competitor affiliation fees by a direct debit process approved by RV and in accordance with the payment policy approved by RV and published on the RV website. Failure to comply with this By-Law shall incur a penalty set out in Appendix 13.

RULE 55 LIST OF ENTRIES

After the close of entries, RV shall ensure that a list of entries and provisional program is published on the RV website.

RULE 56 FALSE DECLARATIONS

Any false declaration regarding the name, classification, club membership or eligibility of a competitor shall result in the disqualification of every rower of the crew concerned from all races for which they are entered at the regatta in question.

RULE 57 OBJECTIONS TO AN ENTRY

Any objection to an entry shall be made in writing and lodged in writing within one hour after the completion of the race with the President of the Jury. After consultation, the RV CEO or appointed delegate shall decide if the objection was upheld.

RULE 58 WITHDRAWALS

58.1 All withdrawals shall be made to the RV office by email prior to the regatta or to the Organising Committee on the day of racing.

58.2 If a Club or School withdraws from an event for which it is entered after 2.30pm on the last working day preceding the first race of the event, penalties established by RV shall apply. Where the reason for failing to scratch in time is due to medical reasons arising after the time frame above, then upon production of a medical certificate the penalties may be withdrawn by RV. Where the reason for failing to scratch is due to reasons beyond the control of the Club or School, such as an accident, the penalty may be withdrawn by RV at its discretion upon receipt of a submission by the Club or School. This discretion does not apply to failure to appear for a race.

58.3 A withdrawal once made is irrevocable.

58.4 In the event of a withdrawal the entry fee and deposit paid in respect of that crew shall be forfeited to the Organising Committee.

58.5 If a crew or sculler does not start in any event for which it has entered, the entry fee and deposit paid in respect of that crew shall be forfeited to the Organising Committee and penalties established by RV shall apply.

58.6 In the event of a withdrawal the Organising Committee may conduct a new draw.

RULE 59 CREW CHANGES BEFORE THE FIRST HEAT

59.1 Crews – Clubs, Institutes or Schools may substitute up to one half the number of rowers (as well as the coxswain, if applicable) in all crews originally entered by them.

- 59.2 Any substitution to a crew shall be communicated in writing to the Organising Committee before the race. The Organising Committee must maintain the alteration in their official records.
- 59.3 Single Scullers – No substitute is permitted for a single sculler.
- 59.4 The written declaration notifying the change of name and status of any replacements must be certified by the Secretary, or nominated Official of a Club, to confirm that the notified substitute competitor(s) is/are registered rower(s) with the Club with which their Club or School is affiliated.

By-Law to Rule 59 – Changes after the Entry Deadline and before the First Heat

In the case of illness of, or injury to, a member of a crew before the first heat, a substitution may be made if a medical certificate is provided and if the change is approved by a member of the RV Medical Commission or its delegate or a person permitted by the President of the Jury. A separate medical examination of the rower concerned may be required by this member or delegate. The replaced rower may compete at any point during the competition on production of a further medical certificate, and with the approval of the same member of the RV Medical Commission or delegate or the person permitted by the President of the Jury, and of the RV Board. Any replacement rower must be eligible to represent that Club or School.

Not more than one half of the rowers in a crew (plus the coxswain, if applicable) may be changed in accordance with this By-Law.

RULE 60 CHANGES AFTER THE FIRST HEAT

- 60.1 Crews – No change may be made in a crew which has already raced in a heat of its event, except:
- 60.2 in the case of illness; or injury
- 60.3 In which case a medical certificate shall be required. In such a case the change must be approved by the RV Medical Officer or his/her delegate, who may require a separate medical examination of the rower concerned. The rower may compete again at any point during the competition on production of a further medical certificate, and with the approval of the same Medical Officer or his delegate, and the President of the Jury.
- 60.4 Up to half of the rowers in a crew (plus the coxswain, if applicable) may be changed in accordance with this Rule.
- 60.5 Single scullers - No substitution is permitted for a single sculler.

SECTION 4. SAFETY AND FAIRNESS

RULE 61 GUIDING PRINCIPLES

The principles guiding the Field of Play Manager, Organising Committee and the Jury in charge of the regatta shall be:

1. Safety of all competitors

2. Fairness for all competitors

Each individual competitor and official shall act at all times in accordance with these principles.

RULE 62 SAFETY – GENERAL PRINCIPLES

- 62.1 Detailed measures to ensure the safety of competitors shall be included in the By-Laws, but an Organising Committee must in addition check the particular safety aspects of its regatta venue and impose further safety measures as appropriate.
- 62.2 During the regatta, a medical and rescue service shall be ready to act both on the land and on the water.
- 62.3 Where required, the Organising Committee shall announce the official opening day of the course for training, and shall also announce the opening time and the closing time of the course on each day of training and of racing.
- 62.4 The Board may remove the right to conduct a RV Event if it is not satisfied that the By-Laws regarding safety have been observed.
- 62.5 All rowers shall at all times act and compete in accordance with the Rules in force relating to the safety use and condition of their boats, oars, sculls and other items of equipment. In addition it is the responsibility of Clubs, rowers, coaches to ensure that all their equipment is in a suitable condition for the water conditions prevailing during the event. They shall comply with the instructions of the Jury and of the Organising Committee on any matter relating to safety.
- 62.6 At RV Events, suitable care will be taken to provide safe conditions. However, the ultimate responsibility for safety lies with the Club or School for whom the rower is competing and with the individual rower. In this respect RV accepts no legal liability.

By-Law to Rule 62 – Team Managers

At RV Events each participating Club or School shall appoint a representative who shall be known as a Team Manager. The Team Manager, or his delegate, shall attend any Team Managers' meeting and shall communicate information from any such meeting concerning racing and safety to all rowers and coaches in their team. Failure of a Club, Club or School to appoint a Team Manager or failure of a Team Manager to attend any official meetings or communicate information may result in the Club or School being penalised by the Board.

RULE 63 TRAFFIC RULES ON THE COURSE

- 63.1 The Organising Committee must publish, and display clearly in the regatta program and in the embarkation area, the traffic rules to be followed to control the movement of the boats on the water. These rules must cover:
 - 63.1.1 Traffic rules for training
 - 63.1.2 Traffic rules for racing

63.2 It is the responsibility of every rower, coach and team manager to read, to understand and to obey all the traffic rules. In addition the rowers, while warming up or cooling down shall:

63.2.1 Not cross the finish line (in any direction) while boats from another race are in the process of finishing,

63.2.2 Stop when competing crews approach their position,

63.2.3 Not follow a race over all or part of the course, even outside the buoyed area, when not taking part in a race.

By-Law to Rule 63 - Traffic Rules on the Course

1. *A copy of the traffic rules must be published in the regatta programme and large signs/map (125cm x 60cm) must be clearly displayed in the boating area. These signs/map should be located beside the areas where the crews go out on to the water.*
2. *Where a buoyed course is used, the traffic rules for training shall identify at least one clear lane of water (13.5m) as a neutral lane between crews travelling in opposite directions on the water. If it is not possible to provide the neutral lane, then the crews travelling in opposite directions must be separated by a "swimming line", or equivalent, as a continuous, physical barrier.*

In principle, there shall be no training during racing at RV events.

3. *The traffic rules for racing shall also cover the warm-up area and the cool-down area. They shall also take into consideration the safe movement of any boat taking part in any victory ceremony or other users of the waterway.*

RULE 64 OTHER BOATS ON THE WATER

- 64.1 During the official hours of training (where relevant) and racing no boat (moving or fixed) shall be allowed on the regatta course or the training areas without the specific authority of the President of the Jury. The President of the Jury shall determine the position and the movement of all approved vessels, i.e. umpires' launches, rescue boats, television boats, workboats etc. The President of the Jury will also control and approve the personnel and equipment carried on such vessels.
- 64.2 The organising committee is responsible for ensuring that no unauthorised rowers or crews shall be permitted on the water at any time during the course opening times, from the first day the course opens until the end of the regatta, without the specific approval of the President of the Jury.
 - 64.2.1 If the President of the Jury (PofJ) gives permission for a crew to transit, they should be instructed to:
 - a) wait to receive direction from an umpire before entering the competition zone (including any marshalling areas),
 - b) carefully transit the course without stopping unless for traffic reasons and also giving right-of-way to competing crews,
 - c) never overtake any crews participating in the regatta (whether racing or in the traffic lane), and

- d) under no circumstances engage in training 'pieces' within the competition zone including the traffic lane. The competition zone is identified as the stretch of waterway consisting the racing course, plus and extension to cover all launching and marshalling areas plus a 100m safety buffer.

64.2.2 Whilst within the competition zone crews must obey all directions from Umpires.

64.2.3 This will enable crews not competing to participate in training either side of the competition zone but does NOT allow crews to train in the competition zone.

64.2.4 Breaches of the policy

Should the direction of an Umpire be ignored, the Umpire should record as many of the following as possible:

- The club/school name
- The name of the cox/stroke or key crew member,
- The boat name,
- The coach's name,
- The type of boat,
- The location, date and time, and/or
- Whatever other information that can be ascertained about a crew.

This information must be reported to the regatta PofJ who will make a formal note in their report to RV.

RV will notify a club of the report and give the club five days to provide a submission to RV.

RV will issue a fine as detailed below where either a club/school has failed to make a submission within the timeframe outlined, or where RV deems the breach occurred as reported.

Penalties

Penalties as prescribed in the schedule.

RULE 65 LOCAL RULES

Where the rules of racing require amendment for the requirements of a course or the nature of the event, local rules will apply. Local rules must be approved by the Field of Play Manager and be published in the regatta program. The local rules will be incorporated into, and have the same effect, as the rules of racing.

RULE 66 FAIRNESS – GENERAL PRINCIPLES

All rowers shall compete fairly, showing respect for their opponents and for the race officials. In particular, they shall be at the start on time and follow instructions of the officials at all times, on the water and off.

Failure to comply with these requirements may lead to a penalty being imposed on the crew. The race officials shall ensure that the Rules of Racing are applied fairly to all competitors.

SECTION 5. PROGRESSION SYSTEM

RULE 67 PROGRESSION SYSTEM

67.1 Should the number of crews taking part in an event exceed that of the available starting positions used for racing, a progression system shall be used and adopted by RV from time to time. The draw shall be random unless the RV Events and Competition Manager decides in the case of a major event that the heats should be seeded.

Each round of an event shall finish at least two hours before the following round of the same event.

67.2 The progression from heats to later rounds shall be published in the printed program.

67.3 The Fairness Committee or the President of the Jury as the case may be, may alter the progression system at any time. Other than for situations where adverse weather has caused changes, the Fairness Committee or the President of the Jury as the case may be, will provide ample notice to competitors of any alternative system that will be used.

By-Law to Rule 67 – RV Progression System

The details of the RV Progression System are found in Appendix 3 to the RV Rules of Racing.

RULE 68 THE DRAW

68.1 At RV Events, the draw for each round of racing shall be undertaken by RV in accordance with the directions of the Board.

68.2 Late entries shall be accepted by RV where:

- a) A lane exists for the entry which does not alter the timetable of events;
- b) the entrant pays the advertised seat fee, plus an administration fee equal to 100% of the seat fee;
- c) Crews shall be accepted on a first come basis. (If only one lane exists then it is the first crew with an entry that is accepted and all other crews are rejected)
- d) A late entry must be received in writing from a recognised club official such as a club Rowing Manager system administrator, secretary or captain.
- e) The cut off for entries and the 'window' for late entries shall be as per the Rowing Victoria website.
- f) A late entry is considered to be any regatta entry which is received following the advertised close of entries.
- g) In the case where crews would otherwise have a "no race", Rowing Victoria will attempt to find another opportunity for that crew or parts thereof to race in another event. This would not be considered a late entry.

68.3 Notwithstanding the above RV reserves the right to reject any late entry.

- 68.4 The Board may require that a preliminary race be conducted to determine the lanes for the final. If an event has a Final only and no preliminary race is required, then the draw for lanes shall also take place at the main draw.
- 68.5 If a preliminary race is run, preference for lanes will be given to those crews/scullers who compete. Crews/scullers that do not compete in this preliminary race for this event will be allocated remaining lanes
- 68.6 If a crew withdraws after the draw, but at least two hours before the start of the first heat and if the number of crews remaining in the event involves another variant of the heats and repêchages, or if the withdrawal results in an avoidable imbalance between the number of crews in each heat, the President of the Jury may request a new draw.
- 68.7 In the case of difficult conditions where delays or postponements are not possible, the system to determine lanes may be modified by the President of the Jury, in consultation with the Fairness Committee, in order to complete the regatta. Any modification will consider the previous results at the regatta in placing crews in the better lanes in accordance with RV rules.

By-Law to Rule 68 - Determining the Lanes (Normal Conditions)

1. *Where appropriate the Board shall appoint a Seeding Panel for a particular regatta. The Seeding Panel shall determine which crews in which events should be seeded. The purpose of seeding is to avoid having all the faster boats in an event being drawn into the same heat in the first round. The Seeding Panel will apply criteria determined by the Board and published in advance.*
2. *For the heats (or final where there are no heats and there is no requirement for a preliminary race), a draw shall be held to determine the lane to be assigned to each crew. There shall be a random draw for the order of the heats so that the highest seeded crew is not always in heat 1 and for the lanes of the seeded crews in each heat. The seeding order shall only affect the placing of crews in the heats. It shall not be taken into account for any of the later rounds of competition.*
3. *For the repêchages, semi-finals and finals, the principle is to put the crews with the best placings in their previous round in the inner lanes. Similarly the crews with the lower placings in their previous round are put in the outer lanes. If the crews have the same placings in the heats, repêchages or semi-finals then there shall be a draw to determine their lanes in the next round.*

RULE 69 WITHDRAWALS AND DISQUALIFICATIONS AFTER THE DRAW

If a crew withdraws or is excluded or is disqualified after the Draw then the following procedures shall operate:

- 69.1 If the withdrawal, exclusion or disqualification takes place before the start of the first heat or the start of the first repêchage, the start of the first quarter-final or the start of the first semi-final of the event the President of the Jury may take the appropriate steps to modify the Draw or to make a new Draw. The result of the race will show the crew as SCR (Scratched), DNS (Did Not Start), EXC (Excluded) or DSQ (Disqualified). A crew withdrawing before its Heat or which is excluded or

disqualified at any point in the event shall not be ranked in that event. A crew withdrawing after its Heat but before the start of its repechage or its quarter-final or its semi-final will be placed last in the overall ranking of that event, and if there is more than one, then equally in last place.

- 69.2 If a crew stops rowing during a heat, a repêchage, a quarter-final or a semi-final and does not finish the race then the result of the race will show the crew as DNF (Did Not Finish). The number of crews stipulated in the draw will go forward to the next round. The crew that does not finish the race will not race again in the event and will be placed last in the overall ranking of that event. In the case of a problem outside the control of a crew which prevents the crew from finishing a race, the President of the Jury may decide to place that crew last in that race.
- 69.3 If a crew is excluded or disqualified after the start of the first heat of the event, then the result of the race will show the crew as EXC or as DSQ. The number of crews stipulated in the draw will go forward to the next round. The crew that has been excluded or disqualified will not race again in the event and will not be ranked in the event or events.
- 69.4 In any final, if a crew withdraws before the start of the race or if a crew stops rowing during the race and does not finish the race, then the result of the race will show the crew as DNS (Did Not Start) or DNF (Did Not Finish). The crew that withdraws or stops during the race will be placed last in that final.

RULE 70 TIME TRIALS

In cases of a very large entry in certain events and/or limited time availability or in adverse conditions, the Fairness Committee may decide to hold Time-Trials instead of or in combination with heats, repêchages, quarter-finals, semi-finals and finals as provided below.

By-Law to Rule 70 - Time Trials

- 1 *If the Time-Trial System is used for the heats then in each separate heat the highest seeded crew starts first and the second highest seeded crew shall start second. The remaining crews shall start in the order of their lanes, as given from the official draw.*
- 2 *If the Time-Trial System is used for repêchages, semi-finals or finals then in each separate race the crews shall start in order according to their placing in the previous round. Where two crews have the same placing, (e.g. both were heat winners), then there shall be a draw to determine their starting order.*
- 3 *Each separate race shall be started at not more than five-minute intervals.*
- 4 *Crews in each race compete in the same lane and shall be started at approximately 30- second intervals. Where the Fairness Committee, in case of adverse weather conditions, or otherwise the President of the Jury, decides that conditions are equal in two lanes, then racing shall take place using those two lanes with crews starting alternatively in adjacent lanes.*
- 5 *Time Trials shall be started from the normal fixed start positions. If conditions so require, they will start crews with a "flying start" in which crews are timed from the 100m mark and they race 1900m.*

- 6 *If a crew is caught by any crew that starts behind them then they must move out of the lane to allow the overtaking crew to pass safely. Once the crew has overtaken them then they must move back into the original lane. Where two lanes are being used for the Time Trial the crew moving out of their lane must ensure they cause no interference to crews racing in the other lane.*
- 7 *In a Time-Trial, RULE 72 (Damage while in the Start Zone) does not apply.*

RULE 71 ADVERSE WEATHER CONDITIONS

At all RV Events, other than the RV State Championships, the President of the Jury shall take the place of Fairness Committee and may after consultation with the appropriate members of the Jury make changes to the program if the weather creates unfair or unrowable conditions.

By-Law to Rule 71 - Alternative programs in cases of Adverse Weather Conditions

- 1 *It is the duty of the Fairness Committee to determine if the weather has created, or is about to create, unfair or unrowable conditions. It is then their responsibility to decide on the appropriate program from the alternatives described below. In applying these alternatives the Fairness Committee will always consider (1.1), (1.2) and (1.3) before considering (1.4) or (1.5).*
 - 1.1 *To use the lanes offering the most equal conditions.*
 - 1.2 *To delay the racing program, either to later in the same day or to the next day, if the weather forecast indicates that the conditions are likely to improve.*
 - 1.3 *To start racing earlier than previously announced, provided that the announcement of the new times is made by announcement widely on the previous day.*
 - 1.4 *To re-allocate the lanes for each individual race, using the placing from the previous round to put the crews with similar placings from the previous round into adjoining lanes and giving the crews having achieved better placings better lanes. For a heat crews shall start in the order of their lanes, as assigned to them in the official draw. Where two or more crews have the same placing in the immediately previous round, (e.g. each were heat winners), then there shall be a draw to determine their lanes.*
 - 1.5 *To implement the Time-Trial System for each individual race, e.g. if there were four heats from the official draw, then there shall be four separate Time-Trial Races.*
- 2 *After the Fairness Committee has determined that alternatives (1.1) to (1.5) in By-Law 64:1) above are not appropriate solutions to the difficulties created by adverse weather conditions and after consultation with the teams at a Team Managers' Meeting convened for this purpose, it is the duty of the Fairness Committee to decide whether to implement one of the following solutions in order to continue the regatta:*
 - 2.1 *To omit a round, or part of a round, of the event (e.g. semi-finals) where adverse conditions have stopped racing for a significant period of time or where the weather forecast indicates that racing will not be possible on any number of the remaining days. In such a case the composition of the next rounds will be determined on the basis of the results of those rounds that have been*

completed and may necessitate more than six crews in each race. Wherever possible the rankings of the crews in the previous rounds will be used as the basis for the composition of the next rounds.

- 2.2 *To reduce the length of the race to no less than 1,000 m where conditions are so adverse that no other alternative is possible.*

The alternative programmes listed above provided that results from previous rounds may be used differently to determine which crews advance to later rounds.

SECTION 6. PENALTIES

RULE 72 PENALTIES

In any case of breach of rules and in accordance with Rule 90, a member appointed to the Jury for that regatta shall impose appropriate penalties. The penalties available to the Jury are:

1. Reprimand;
2. Yellow Card which shall constitute a formal warning. A crew awarded two (2) Yellow Cards applying to the same race shall be awarded a Red Card and excluded from the event;
3. Relegation where specifically provided in these rules;
4. Red Card which excludes the crew (from all rounds of the event in question);
5. Disqualification (from all events in the regatta).

In cases of exclusion or disqualification, the Jury may also order a race to be re-rowed with all remaining crews or with a limited number of crews should this be necessary, in his/her opinion, to ensure the fairness of the competition.

By-Law to Rule 72 – Yellow and Red Cards

When a Yellow or red Card is awarded to a crew, the penalised crew shall be informed immediately or as soon thereafter as possible.

The penalty shall be verbally announced by the Starter as part of the Start Procedure prior to their next race notifying them of the following: -

1. *The penalty;*
2. *The nature of the infraction;*
3. *When the infraction occurred;*
4. *Any other important facts.*

If a penalty is applied by a member of the Jury, it shall be shown on the race result in the following form:

DSQ – Disqualification

EXC - Exclusion

REL – Relegation

SECTION 7. THE START

RULE 73 AT THE START

- 73.1 The first 100 metres of the Regatta Course constitutes the start zone. A crew may enter the start zone if permitted by the Starter, but shall not enter the racing lanes until all crews from the preceding race have left the start zone and the Starter has attributed a lane to the crew.
- 73.2 Crews must be attached to their starting positions or in the case of a non-fixed start, at the appointed position to be called onto the start, at least two minutes before the designated start time.
- 73.3 The Starter may start the race without reference to absentees. A crew arriving late at its starting position may be awarded a Yellow Card by the Starter.

RULE 74 THE STARTING PROCEDURE

- 74.1 The Starter shall inform the crews of their starting positions. He shall start the race when the crews are ready and when the Judge at the Start indicates that the crews are correctly aligned.
- 74.2 The Judge at the Start, or the Starter in the case of a side start, alone shall decide if the boats are correctly aligned or if one or more crews have committed a false start.
- 74.3 Should the Judge at the Start, or the Starter in the case of a side start, deem there to be a false start or the start to be otherwise faulty, the Starter shall stop the race and if there was a false start, shall award a Yellow Card to the crew or crews which, in the opinion of the Judge at the Start, caused the false start. A crew causing two false starts or receiving two Yellow Cards which apply to the same race, for any infringement whatsoever shall be awarded a Red Card and be excluded from the event.
- 74.4 Where crews are started from the side, the roles of the Starter and Judge at the Start are combined and the start shall be commenced by the audible command "Go" instead of the drop of the flag.
- 74.5 In the case of a non-fixed start, where possible, the race should be started from behind either by a starter or the following umpire.

By-Law to Rule 74 - The Starting Procedure

1 Starting Procedure (with flags)

Crews must attach themselves to their start pontoons at least two minutes before the starting time of their race. Where there is no fixed start, crews shall be at the appointed position to be called onto the start line two minutes before the starting time of their race. Two minutes before the designated start time, the Starter shall announce "Two minutes" and this shall signify to the crews that they are formally under Starter's orders. The announcement of "Two minutes" shall also be an instruction to the crews that they must be ready to start within two minutes. After announcing "two minutes" and if he is satisfied that all the crews are ready to race the starter may, in adverse weather conditions or other special circumstances, proceed with the start without waiting for the designated start time.

Before giving the start commands, the Starter shall ensure that the Umpire and the Judge at the Start are ready. When the boats are aligned and the crews are ready to

race, the Starter shall make a roll-call by announcing - in lane order - the names of each of the crews in the race. Once the roll-call begins the crews must make sure that their boats are straight. Each crew is responsible for being both straight and ready to race at the end of the roll-call.

Once the roll-call begins the Starter shall take no further notice of any crew which then indicates that it is not ready or that it is not straight. After the last crew has been named in the roll-call the Starter shall check that the Judge at the Start is indicating that the crews are still correctly aligned and shall then say: "Attention".

The Starter shall then EITHER raise the red flag OR where the start is given using traffic lights, shall press a button (or switch) to change the traffic lights from the neutral position to red.

After a clear pause the Starter shall give the start signal by:

Either dropping the red flag quickly to one side and simultaneously saying: "Go",

Or by pressing a button that shall at the same instant:

- (i) change the red light to green;*
- (ii) make an audible signal through the loud speakers;*
- (iii) start the timing system for the race;*

The pause between the raising of the red flag / the showing of the red light and the start signal shall be clear and shall be variable from race to race.

If the starting procedure is interrupted for any reason then the Starter may begin the procedure again, starting with the roll-call.

After a false start the starter must begin the procedure again, starting with the roll call. The starter is not required to announce "two Minutes" again.

2 Quick Start

Where the starter considers, for adverse weather conditions or any other valid reason, that the normal start with the roll call should not be used, after saying "Two Minutes" he/she shall inform the crews that he/she will use the "Quick Start". Once the normal start has been used, the Starter shall, in principle, not change to the quick start for the same race if the race has to be restarted. For quick start, in place of the roll call, the starter shall just say: "Quick Start". After a clear pause he/she shall then say "Attention". He/she shall then proceed with the remaining start procedure.

RULE 75 FALSE START

A crew whose rowers begin rowing and whose boat crosses the start line after the Starter has raised his red flag, or the red light is shown, and before the start command is given has committed a false start indicated by a Yellow Card. If more than one boat crosses the start line before the start command is given, only the crew or crews that the Judge at the Start decides actually caused the false start shall be awarded a Yellow Card(s).

By-Law to Rule 75 – Consequences of a False Start

After the start command has been given, the Starter shall look towards the Judge at the Start to satisfy himself that it was a good start. Should the Judge at the Start indicate that this not be so, the Starter shall stop the race by ringing his bell and waving his red flag from side to side. If the traffic lights start system includes both visual and audible signals to indicate a false start then these shall be used (instead of the bell and the red flag) by flashing the red light and sounding the audible signal repeatedly and in this case, the Judge at the Start may directly activate the signal to stop the race.

In the case of a false start, the Judge at the Start shall inform the Starter of the name of the crew or crews to be penalised and the Starter shall award that crew or crews a Yellow Card when they have returned to their starting position by stating “(Name of Crew), False Start, Yellow Card!”.

Where the start facilities permit, the Starter shall instruct the official on the starting platforms to place a yellow marker, or in the case of a Red Card, a red marker, adjacent to the starting position of the crew or crews so penalised. This Yellow Card shall remain in effect until the race has been rowed and shall therefore apply in the case of a postponement or a re-row.

A crew which is awarded two warnings (Yellow Cards) applying to the same race shall be excluded (indicated by a red card).

RULE 76 OBJECTIONS AT THE START

A crew awarded a Yellow Card or excluded or disqualified at the start may make an objection to the Umpire or the Starter at the time. The Umpire or the Starter shall decide immediately on the objection and shall communicate the decision to the objecting crew, to the other crews in the race and to the President of the Jury and other race officials.

SECTION 8. DURING THE RACE

RULE 77 RESPONSIBILITY OF THE ROWERS

All rowers shall compete in their races in accordance with the rules. Rowers are responsible for their own steering. Each crew shall have a lane reserved for its own use and shall remain completely (i.e., including its oars or sculls) within this lane throughout the race. If a crew leaves its own lane then it does so at its own risk. If it impedes or interferes with any of its opponents or gains any advantage thereby, it may be penalised without prior warning or other notification from the umpire. The same rules apply to non buoyed courses.

RULE 78 INTERFERENCE

A crew causes interference to its opponents if its oars, sculls or boat encroach into the opponent's lane and cause a disadvantage to its opponents by contact, its wash or other distraction, or in any other way. The Umpire alone shall decide if a crew is in its own lane or if it is interfering with another crew and causing them a disadvantage. If a crew has caused interference to another crew and has, in the Umpire's opinion, affected the finishing position of that crew then it may be excluded by the Umpire but, in principle, only after it has been warned by the Umpire. In the situation where a collision between boats or oars or sculls has occurred the Umpire may exclude the crew causing the collision even if no prior warning has been given to that crew.

In no case may the Umpire alter a placing.

By-Laws to Rule 78 - Consequences of Interference

- 1 *Alerting a crew - If a crew is about to interfere with another by its wash or by leaving its lane, the Umpire shall raise his white flag, call to the crew at fault, stating the name of the crew and indicate the required change of direction by lowering his flag to that side. In principle, the Umpire may not otherwise give steering indications to a crew unless there is an obstruction in its lane.*
- 2 *Stopping a crew - To ensure the safety of the competitors and to prevent damage to boats and equipment, the Umpire may intervene by raising his white flag to the vertical position, naming the crew and giving the command "Stop". A crew so instructed shall immediately stop their boat. The crew may begin rowing again to the finish of the race if permitted by the umpire.*
- 3 *Alerting the Umpire - If, during a race, a crew considers that it is being interfered with by another crew and is suffering a disadvantage thereby, then a member of the crew should, if possible, draw the attention of the Umpire to the interference at the time the interference occurs to indicate that it intends to make an objection.*
- 4 *Remedying a disadvantage - If a crew is placed at a disadvantage, the first priority is to restore its chances. The imposition of any penalties is a secondary consideration. Should a crew suffer a disadvantage, the Umpire must take the most appropriate course of action provided by the Rules. He may, for example, stop the race, impose the appropriate penalty and order the race to be re-rowed. Depending on circumstances, he may allow the race to continue and the Umpire will then announce his decision after the race is over. He may not only penalise the crew at fault while the crew that has suffered interference does not have its chances restored to it.*

RULE 79 COACHING DURING RACING

In addition to the provisions of the By-Laws to Rule 34, it is prohibited to give any instructions, advice or directions to rowers or crews that are racing with any electric, electronic or other technical device, either directly or indirectly from outside the boat.

SECTION 9. THE FINISH

RULE 80 FINISH OF THE RACE

A crew has finished the race when the bow of its boat has reached the finish line. The race shall be valid even if the crew is incomplete. Nevertheless, a crew of a coxed boat finishing the race without its coxswain shall not be placed.

By-Laws to Rule 80 - Finish of the Race

1. *Race concluded – A race is concluded when the Umpire so indicates by raising a white or red flag.*
2. *Official Result – The official result of the race shall be determined by the Judge at the Finish and crews shall be ranked in order of the bows of their boats reaching the finish line. Where the umpire considers that the race was not in order, the Judge at the*

Finish shall take into account the decision of the umpire in determining the official result of the race.

3. *Photo-Finish – In the case of a close finish the Judge at the Finish shall determine the order of the finish by viewing the picture produced by the photo-finish system. The necessary equipment shall be operated by specialists who do not form part of the team of Judges at the Finish. Systems using less than 100 frames per second are not suitable for determining the order of finish. RV will supply the specified equipment for this purpose.*
4. *Timing – Intermediate times and finish times shall be recorded to 1/100th of a second. This may mean that where there is a difference between crews on the photo-finish system of less than 1/100th of a second, those crews may have the same recorded times but will have different rankings. The necessary equipment shall be operated by specialists who do not form part of the team of Judges at the Finish. If the finish of the race for each crew can be clearly determined by the naked eye, times taken by hand operated timing equipment may be used. In the case of a photo-finish the times shown on the results sheets and on the scoreboard shall be taken from the photo-finish for all the crews in the race.*
5. *The race was in order – Even if he is satisfied that the race was in order, the Umpire must check to be sure that no crew is making an objection under Rule 69 or Rule 75 before indicating to the Judge at the Finish, by raising his white flag, that the race was in order. Before leaving the finish area he shall make sure that the Judge at the Finish has acknowledged his signal with either a white flag or white light.*
6. *The race was not in order – If the Umpire considers that the race was not in order he shall raise his red flag. If an objection has been raised in accordance with Rule 69 or Rule 75, he shall speak to the affected crew(s) in order to understand the reasons for the objection and may consult the Judges at the Finish to obtain the finishing order of the affected crews.*

Exclusion by the Umpire – A crew excluded by the Umpire during the race or at the finish of a race shall be notified by the Umpire saying “(name of the crew) – (reason for the exclusion) – red Card – Exclusion.

RULE 81 DEAD-HEATS

When the order of finish between two or more crews is too close for any difference to be determined, then the result shall be declared a dead heat between the crews involved. If there is a dead-heat, the following procedure shall operate:

1. In a heat, a repechage, quarter-final or a semi-final if a dead-heat occurs between crews, then they shall be given equal placing in the final order of that race and the next placing(s) shall be left vacant. If all crews involved in the dead-heat progress anyway into the next round their relative positions in the next round shall be decided by lot. If insufficient lanes exist in the subsequent round the President of the Jury, shall determine the method of progression and relative position.
2. In a final, if a dead-heat occurs between crews, then they shall be given equal placing in the final order and the next placing(s) shall be left vacant. If the tied placing is for a medal position then the Organising Committee shall provide additional medals.

SECTION 10. OBJECTIONS, PROTESTS, OUTCOME OF PROTESTS, APPEALS AND DISPUTES

RULE 82 OBJECTIONS

A crew claiming that its race was not in order or was improperly judged may make an objection to the Umpire immediately after the finish of the race and before leaving the finish area by raising an arm. To be valid the objection must be made before the boat has left in the immediate area of the finish line and before the crew disembarks. The Umpire of the race, or if no umpire was following the race the Judge at the Finish, decides on the objection and communicates his decision to the crews in the race and to the other race officials. A crew excluded or otherwise penalised may make an objection to the Starter (if penalised at the start) or Umpire at the time the penalty is awarded in accordance with Rule 71.

By-Law to RULE 82 - Objections

If a crew considers that the race was not in order a member of the crew must raise his arm to indicate that it is making an objection. In this case the Umpire, or if no umpire was following the race the Judge at the Finish, shall not raise any flag but he shall consult with the objecting crew and consider their objection. The Umpire, or if no umpire was following the race the Judge at the Finish, may then decide upon one of a number of alternative actions e.g.:-

- a) He may over-rule the crew's objection and raise a white flag to signify that he has decided that the race was in order,*
- b) He may accept the crew's objection and raise a red flag to signify that he has decided that the race was not in order. In this case he must go to the Judges at the Finish in order to give them his decision and any necessary explanations. The Judges at the Finish, in such cases, shall not announce the official result of the race until the Umpire has given his decision,*
- c) He may decide to seek further information regarding the objection. In this case, he shall raise a red flag and then take any necessary further steps to resolve the issues relating to the objection, e.g., consult with other officials, consult with other persons, and consult with the President of the Jury etc. The Judges at the Finish, in such cases, must not announce the official result of the race until the Umpire has given his decision. If there is likely to be a long delay in resolving the objection, the Judges at the Finish may announce an "unofficial" result of the race but with the clear statement "Subject to an Objection".*

RULE 83 PROTESTS

A crew whose objection has been rejected or crews affected by the acceptance of the objection or a crew that has been disqualified or excluded or ruled DNS or DNF, or crews disputing the published results may lodge a protest in writing to the President of the Jury not later than one hour after the Umpire has communicated his decision regarding the objection or, in the case of disputing the published results, one hour after the results have been published. It shall be accompanied by a deposit of AUS\$100.00 or equivalent, which amount shall be refunded if the protest or appeal is allowed.

The Board of the Jury shall decide if the protest was justified. It will make its decision before the next round of races in the event concerned, and, in any case, no later than two hours after the last race of the day.

As a general rule, in the case of a protest concerning the final of an event, the victory ceremony of that event shall be postponed until after the Board of the Jury has made its decision.

RULE 84 THE OUTCOME OF THE PROTEST

The Board of the Jury shall decide on the protest and on the measures resulting from its decision including:

1. reprimand;
2. Yellow Card (a crew receiving two Yellow cards applying to the same race shall be awarded a Red Card and excluded from that event);
3. relegation (where specifically provided in these Rules),
4. Red Card (exclusion from all the rounds of the event in question);
5. disqualification (from all events in the regatta);

After application of the appropriate penalty, if any, the Board of the Jury shall take any other appropriate measure(s) to restore the chances of a crew that has suffered a disadvantage. This may require a re-row of a specified number of crews.

RULE 85 APPEALS

An appeal against a decision of the Board of the Jury by a person affected can only be made to the Board by 4:00pm on the next immediate business day after such decision has been communicated by the Board of the Jury or by the Organising Committee to the person affected. Decisions of the Board under this rule are final

RULE 86 BLANK

This Rule is intentionally left blank

RULE 87 EXCEPTIONAL CASES

Should it be necessary to make decisions in exceptional cases (e.g. postponement of a session of races or suspension of the regatta), the president of the Jury shall appoint and preside over a body to make such decisions.

RULE 88 THE REGATTA REPORT

The Jury shall carry out its duties until the end of the regatta.

The President of the Jury shall make available to the Board a report on a standard form of RV outlining an incident that occurs at an RV Event within 24 hours of that incident.

The President of the Jury shall write a Regatta Report on the standard form of the RV which shall include comments on the running of the races and on any incidents and disputes

arising. This report shall be received at RV not later than 7 days after the regatta. The Board may require this report to be forwarded to it.

The Organising Committee shall ensure that the complete results of the RV Event shall be available to RV within 1 hour of the completion of the Event.

SECTION 11. THE JURY

RULE 89 RV BOAT RACE OFFICIALS

- 89.1 RV shall arrange two levels of Boat Race Officials licences to be known as level 1 and level 2
- 89.1.1.1 Level one licences shall be granted to anyone who passes the level one licence examination. The duties of a level 1 umpire shall be those deemed appropriate by the President of the Jury.
- 89.1.1.2 Any umpire who has held a Level 1 Boat Race Officials accreditation Licence that is recognised by the umpire accreditation scheme (if any) may become a level 2 RV umpire, provided that the umpire:
- has adequate sight and hearing, and
 - is assessed as being competent by RV and which assessment involves examinations.
- 89.2 The level 2 RV Umpires' Licence is valid for a period of four years and can be renewed in accordance with the National Officials Accreditation Scheme. The holder of an expired licence who wishes to act as an umpire shall take a fresh examination.
- 89.3 An RV licence automatically lapses where:
- 89.3.1 The level 2 RV licence holder has not complied with all or any of the requirements of By-Law 2 to this Rule;
- 89.3.2 The level 1 RV licence holder has not participated at a regatta for 12 months; or
- 89.3.3 The Board revokes a licence under By-Law 3 to this Rule.

By-Law to Rule 89 – RV Umpires

1 Setting of Examination

The Umpires Commission shall set the theoretical and practical examinations that each of the licence applicants seeks to attain.

The Umpires Commission shall undertake the conduct of examinations and shall refer their recommendations to the Board for the grant of a licence.

2 Issue and Renewal of Licences

2.1 *The Board may issue a licence upon receipt of advice in writing from the Umpires Commission that a candidate has passed the examination;*

2.2 *The Board may renew a licence upon receipt of advice in writing from the Umpires Commission that the licence holder seeking renewal has:*

2.2.1 *Been an active umpire at regattas held under the auspices of the RV;*

2.2.2 *Assessed as competent by the Umpires Commission; and*

2.2.3 *Has met the requirements of the National Officials Accreditation Scheme for a Level 2 Umpire.*

3 *Review Of Licence*

The Umpires Commission may at any time review the performance or eligibility of a holder of a licence to retain the licence and may submit a report with recommendations as it deems appropriate to the Board.

RULE 90 ROLE OF THE JURY

The jury shall ensure that the regatta is run in accordance with these Rules of Racing, and in particular, that all crews race under the same conditions.

RULE 91 PRESIDENT OF THE JURY

91.1 The Umpires Commission shall appoint a President of the Jury for each session of racing at a RV Event.

91.2 The President of the Jury shall allot duties to each member of the Jury and shall supervise their activities. He shall take the chair at meetings and ensure proper co-ordination with the Organising Committee.

RULE 92 COMPOSITION OF THE JURY

92.1 The jury shall be appointed by the RV Umpires Committee and shall consist of persons carrying out the following duties:

92.1.1 President of the jury

92.1.2 Starter

92.1.3 Judge at the Start (if required)

92.1.4 Umpire

92.1.5 Judges at the Finish, one shall be the senior judge

92.1.6 Supervisors of the Control Commission (where required) one of whom shall be the senior member.

92.2 All members of the Jury shall be holders of a RV umpire's licence.

92.3 The Jury shall be appointed by the RV Umpires Commission

RULE 93 THE BOARD OF THE JURY

The Board of the Jury shall consist of the President of the Jury and two other members of the Jury, designated by the President of the Jury on a daily basis prior to the start of each session of racing. This Board shall decide on any protests made according to RULE 78.

The President of the Jury shall also nominate three substitutes. In the case of a protest, no-one directly involved in the dispute (e.g. the umpire or the starter) shall constitute part of the

Board which decides that protest. In such a case, the President of the Jury shall call upon one or more of the substitutes.

RULE 94 SAFETY OF ROWERS

The safety of rowers and coxswains must be the prime concern of the Jury at all times during the regatta.

In the case of unsafe conditions, the President of the Jury is empowered to take any necessary decisions and communicate any required changes to the Starter and the Umpires on the course. If time allows, the President of the Jury shall consult the Organising Committee before taking such decisions.

The President of the Jury shall ensure proper co-ordination between the Jury and the Organising Committee, in particular with the Safety Officer and with the Medical Officer.

SECTION 12, DUTIES OF THE UMPIRES

RULE 95 CONTROL COMMISSION

The Control Commission shall ensure that the composition of the crews is correct and that their equipment is in order. It shall also assist in the identification of the rowers required to undergo doping tests after their race.

By-Laws to Rule 95 - Duties of the Control Commission

The Organising Committee shall appoint the members of the Control Commission taking into account the regatta program and the number of competitors. The President of the Jury or his delegate(s) shall supervise the activities of the Control Commission which shall carry out its duties in the boathouse area and at the boat stages. In particular, the Control Commission is responsible for checking the following points:

- 1 Crew changes before the race;*
- 2 The provision of substitutes for competitors who have fallen ill between heats of a race;*
- 3 Weighing of coxswain;*
- 4 Dead weight to be carried by coxswains (before and after the race);*
- 5 Weighing of competitors in lightweight events;*
- 6 Classification of competitors where necessary;*
- 7 The ages of Junior, Under 23 and Masters competitors and, where applicable, the average ages of Masters crews;*
- 8 Boats and equipment:*

- a) *Compliance with all safety requirements provided for in the Rules of Racing (by-law to rule 33);*
 - b) *Correct bow numbers on each boat;*
 - c) *possible use of unauthorised equipment;*
 - d) *where applicable, minimum weights of boats,*
 - e) *conformity of the boat with the rules regarding advertising/identifications,*
 - f) *painting of oar-blades where required;*
- 9 *Uniform clothing of competitors and its conformity with the rules regarding advertising/identifications;*
- 10 *Where doping tests are carried out, the Control Commission is responsible for seeing that the competitors required to undergo tests are taken to the officials responsible for this immediately after getting out of the boat;*
- 11 *At RV Events, that the photographing of competitors has taken place (if required by the Board), either before the Heats or immediately after the Heats, and the checking of the competitors' identity with those photographs before each subsequent race has taken place.*

RULE 96 THE STARTER AND THE JUDGE AT THE START

The Starter and the Judge at the Start shall ensure that the correct starting procedure is followed.

By-Laws to Rule 96 - Duties of the Starter and the Judge at the Start

- 1 Starter
- 1.1 *General Duties - Before taking up his duties, the Starter must satisfy himself that all equipment and installations required by the Rules covering the start and the course are present and in working order. The Starter shall check that any steering guides are present and that the radio and/or telephone communication with the Judge at the Start, the President of the Jury, the Judges at the Finish and the Control Commission is in working order. The Starter shall also make certain that any crews on the water are obeying the prescribed traffic rules.*
 - 1.2 *Languages — In principle, the Starter and the Umpire shall use visual signals to convey information. Where verbal communication is necessary, they shall address the rowers in English. If, for any reason, the use of another language enables a member of the Jury to be better understood by a crew, a competitor or an accompanying official, they may repeat their information in that language.*
 - 1.3 *Unfair or unsafe conditions - The Starter shall consider whether the wind is likely to create unequal or unsafe conditions and, if directed below or after consultation with the President of the Jury, they shall take whatever steps may be necessary in accordance with these rules to ensure a fair race. The Starter shall consult with the President of the Jury who will consult with the Fairness Committee. The President of the Jury shall inform the Starter of any required changes, in principle, at least two minutes before a start.*
 - 1.4 *Information to Crews – Where a fixed start is used, the Starter shall inform the crews of the time remaining before the start and tell them (as soon as they enter*

the starting zone for the first time) in which lane they will race. In addition, they shall inform the crews when there is five minutes, four minutes and three minutes remaining before the start time. They shall check that the competitors' equipment and clothing are in order.

- 1.5 Starting Procedures - The Starting Procedures to be employed by the Starter (including Quick Starts and False Starts) are described in the By-Law to RULE 68 in the Rules of Racing. If a crew is excluded at the start or does not arrive at the start for its race the Starter shall leave the lane of that crew vacant.*
- 1.6 Exclusion - The Starter shall award a Red Card and exclude a crew if the crew has received two Yellow Cards that apply to the same race.*
- 1.7 Late Arrival - The Starter may award a Yellow Card to crews arriving late (less than 2 minutes before the start time) at their starting positions or not ready to race at the designated start time. They may exclude a crew arriving after the start time.*
- 1.8 In the case of a yellow Card previously awarded to a crew the penalty shall be announced of "Two Minutes" for the race concerned. The Starter shall instruct the official on the starting platforms to place a yellow marker adjacent to the starting position of the crew.*
- 1.9 Postponement - Should it be necessary to postpone a race (e.g. equipment breakage) or should some other unexpected event occur (e.g. lightning), the Starter shall consult with the Umpire and the President of the Jury; then inform the crews of the new starting time both verbally and where possible in writing (legible to all competitors) on a board affixed to the start tower. The Starter shall inform the Organising Committee and the Judge at the Finish of the new starting time and the President of the Jury of anything unusual. In all cases, crews must inquire from a member of the Jury regarding any changes before getting out of the boat.*

2 Judge at the Start

- 2.1 Communications - Before taking up his duties, the Judge at the Start shall ensure that the radio and telephone link with the Starter and between the aligner and the officials on the starting platforms is in working order.*
- 2.2 The Judge at the Start checks that the aligner has positioned all the boats with their bows exactly on the start line. When he is satisfied that this is the case he indicates this to the Starter by raising his white flag. (Where a white and red light are available for this purpose, the Judge at the Start shall use these lights in place of the white and red flags.) Should correct alignment be lost during the subsequent starting procedure he shall lower his flag or switch off the white light until the boats are realigned.*
- 2.3 False Start - Should he consider that there is a false start; the Judge at the Start shall inform the Starter and the Umpire by waving a red flag or displaying a red light. After the race has been stopped, he shall inform the Starter of the name of the crew or crews which caused the false start. The decision as to whether one or more crews caused a false start is the sole responsibility of the Judge at the Start.*
- 2.4 Contact with the Umpire – Before the start, the Judge at the Start shall make contact with the Umpire to assure himself that the latter is ready.*

RULE 97 THE UMPIRE

The Umpire shall ensure the proper conduct of the race and the safety of the rowers. In particular, they shall endeavour to ensure that no crew gains any advantage or suffers any disadvantage from its opponents or from outside interference.

Where the Umpire considers that a crew has been significantly impeded, the Umpire shall endeavour to ensure that its chance of is fully restored to it. He shall impose appropriate penalties on crews at fault whether or not prior warning or notification has been given to those crews. The Umpire shall not give any steering indications to crews except as may be required to assist with the accordance of. Nevertheless, they shall endeavour to ensure that accidents are avoided and to prevent crews from being interfered with by their opponents.

If necessary, the Umpire may stop the race, impose any necessary penalties and order the race to be re-rowed from the start, either immediately or later. In the latter case, he shall decide on the new starting time in consultation with the President of the Jury and he shall inform the crews concerned.

The Umpire may also allow the race to continue and exclude crews after the race has finished. They may confine any re-row to such crews as he shall designate. However, when the Umpire considers that the impediment has not affected the result of the race, or considers the effect of the impediment was not significant, they may decline to order a re-row of the race or of the crews involved in the incident.

Zonal Umpiring – The Board may decide that at a RV event, advised through the Events and Competition Manager, umpiring of some races shall be carried out from boats that are stationary or which do not follow the whole race or by umpires stationed on the land adjacent to the course, and shall issue instructions and guidelines accordingly.

Where the President of the Jury considers that weather or other conditions are such that zonal umpiring is about to put the safety of crews at risk he may decide to revert to dynamic umpiring for the remainder of the racing session.

By-Laws to Rule 97 - Duties of the Umpire

- 1 *Precedence - Except for the duties specifically attributed to them, both the Starter and the Judge at the Start are subordinate to the Umpire.*
- 2 *Duties on the Way to the Start - On the way to the start, the Umpire shall inspect the course installations to ensure that they are in proper order and shall satisfy himself that there are no obstacles on the course. He also makes certain that any crews on the water are following the prescribed traffic rules. Should he find any defect in the installations, he shall inform (e.g. by radio from the start if necessary) the President of the Jury and he shall also inform any crews concerned.*
- 3 *Duties during the Starting Procedure - During the starting procedure, the Umpire's launch should either be immediately beside the Judge at the Start or behind the crews, in the centre of the course. Should the start for any reason be faulty, the Umpire may order the Starter to stop the race or may stop it himself by ringing a bell and waving his red flag.*
- 4 *As soon as the race has started, the Umpire's launch shall follow immediately the competitors in the centre of the course.*

- Position of the Umpire's Launch - During the race, the Umpire must ensure that his launch is so placed as best to enable him/her to take action as effectively as possible. The position of the Umpire's launch depends on the progress of the race and the possible positions of the crews in the subsequent heats; it may also depend on weather conditions.*
- 5 *The Umpire must satisfy himself that crews whom he may wish to address can hear him. Should it be necessary to overtake one or more crews, he must see to it that they are not hampered more than is necessary by the wash of his launch.*
 - 6 *Type of Race - The Umpire's decision may be influenced by the type of race (heat, repêchage, quarter-final, semi-final or final). He must therefore take this factor as well as the position in the subsequent races into account in considering any action which he may take under these rules*
 - 7 *Safety - The Umpire shall take every care to ensure the safety of the competitors and he must do his utmost to prevent damage to boats and equipment. When necessary, he may call a crew's attention by raising his white flag, stating the name of the crew, and stop it by giving the command "Stop". Should one or more competitors fall into the water or should any boat capsize or sink, the Umpire must satisfy himself that the rescue service is in action and, if not, he shall remain with the capsized crew until he is satisfied that all members are safe and the rescue service is present.*
 - 8 *Adverse Weather - In the case of squalls or sudden deterioration of the weather, it is the responsibility of the Umpire to decide if the race may be started, is to continue or if it is to be stopped. The safety of the competitors is more important than any of the provisions of the Rules of Racing.*
 - 9 *Clothing - When officiating, the Umpire shall stand upright in his launch and wear the prescribed clothing.*
 - 10 *Coaching – As coaching with electric, electronic or other technical devices is not allowed during racing, the Umpire must make a regular check on the area adjacent to the course.*
 - 11 *Overall Ability, Coaching - The Umpire must keep himself informed on rowing questions in general. It is also desirable that he should get to know the racing characteristics of individual crews and coaches. As coaching with electric, electronic or other technical devices is not allowed during racing, the Umpire must make a regular check on the area adjacent to the course.*
 - 12 *Zonal Umpiring – For zonal umpiring the President of the Jury shall designate the points along the course at which the umpires shall be positioned and shall give such instructions as are necessary, including for contingency or other situations. Zonal umpires when stationed in boats, may move to the centre of the course after the race has passed to confirm that all crews are within their lanes and shall then return to their designated position. If the umpire considers that any crew is about to interfere with another crew the umpire may follow the race for such distance as he considers necessary to take the appropriate actions under these rules.*
 - 13 *Where zonal umpiring is in force, the provisions of this By-Law shall refer to each of the umpires responsible for their respective zone and outside where appropriate. The*

extent to which zonal umpires carry out their duties shall be subject to their location and consequent ability to verse the race.

RULE 98 JUDGES AT THE FINISH

The Judges at the Finish shall determine the order in which the bows of the boats cross the finish line. They shall ascertain that the race was in order. They shall be responsible for validating the results.

By-Laws to Rule 98 - Duties of the Judge at the Finish

- 1 *Duties - The duties of the Judges at the Finish are as follows:*
 - 1.1 *To determine the order in which the bows of the boats cross the finish line;*
 - 1.2 *To satisfy themselves that the Umpire has indicated, by raising his white flag, that the race was in order and to indicate to the Umpire acknowledgement of his signal by raising a white flag or displaying a white light;*
 - 1.3 *To list the crews in their correct order of finish;*
 - 1.4 *To check that the official results on the result sheet and on the scoreboard are correct. The senior Judge at the Finish shall sign the official record of the results.*
- 2 *Position - In order to enable the officials in the finish tower to carry out their duties correctly, they must be seated one behind the other and one above the other along the projection of the finish line. As a general rule, there shall be at least two judges, one of them the senior judge, at the finish.*
- 3 *Timing (where used) – Intermediate times and/or finish times shall be recorded. The necessary equipment shall be operated by specialists who do not form part of the team of Judges at the finish. If the order of finish can be clearly determined by the naked eye, times taken by hand-operated timing equipment may be used. Where photo finish equipment is in use, the times shown on the result sheets and on the scoreboard shall be taken from the photo-finish for all the crews in the race.*
- 4 *Photo-finish - In the case of a close finish the Judge at the Finish shall determine the order of finish by viewing the picture produced by the photo-finish system. If the Judge at the Finish is not able to determine the order of finish between two or more crews then the result will be declared as a dead heat between the crews involved. The necessary equipment shall be operated by specialists who do not form part of the team of Judges at the Finish. Organisers must provide equipment specially designed for the purpose. In principle, the photo-finish system shall record at a minimum rate of 100 frames per second.*

RULE 99 BLANK

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PART VII ANTI-DOPING RULES

RULE 100 ANTI-DOPING

Doping is strictly prohibited.

The fight against doping in rowing is regulated by the Olympic Movement Anti-Doping Code, that the Board has formally adopted as FISA rules and that the Board has the power to clarify and/or supplement, by appropriate By-Laws.

In rowing, for those who infringe doping provisions, a penalty may be imposed extending to, in a relevant case, a life ban from all competition. The version of the World Anti-Doping code, its By-Laws and the RA Anti-Doping By-Laws valid at the time of the violation shall apply.

By-Laws to Rule 100 – Anti-Doping

These By-Laws are found in Appendix 5 to the RA Rules of Racing, being the RA Anti-Doping Policy which can be found at www.rowingaustralia.com.au/ra-rules-of-racing-and-related-by-laws/.

PART VIII CONCLUDING PROVISIONS

RULE 101 CONCLUDING PROVISIONS

These Rules were approved by the Board with effect 21 days after being published by RV.

APPENDICES

APPENDIX 1 COURSES

Regulations for RV Events Regatta Courses

1 RV Manual for Rowing Championships

In addition to conforming to the Rules of Racing and to the Racing By-laws a course and all its technical equipment must also comply with the specifications and descriptions given in the latest edition of The RV Regatta Operations Manual.

2 Stretches of water

2.1 General

A standard international course shall be straight and shall not have less than 6 racing lanes. It shall provide fair and equal racing conditions for six crews. For a course constructed after February 2001, there must be a minimum of eight racing lanes.

In addition to the 6 racing lanes there must be sufficient water width available to allow crews to get to the start, to warm up and to cool down safely.

For RV Events it is recommended to have a minimum of 8 racing lanes available, plus sufficient water width on both sides of the course to allow for both safe traffic patterns and for moving lanes in case of unequal conditions.

2.2 Length of Water

The minimum length of water necessary to contain the standard course is 2,150m. For a course for Masters the minimum length is 1,150m.

2.3 Width of Water

The standard international course shall be at least 108m wide i.e. $13.5 + (6 \times 13.5) + 13.5 = 108\text{m}$.

The minimum recommended width of the course for RV Events shall be at least 135m i.e. $13.5 + (8 \times 13.5) + 13.5 = 135\text{m}$.

This width is a minimum and is only acceptable if a low level TV road is provided alongside the full length of the course.

The ideal recommended width of the course for RV Events shall be at least 162m i.e. $27 + (8 \times 13.5) + 27 = 162\text{m}$.

This width allows for traffic movements beside the course and for TV coverage from the water.

2.4 Depth of Water

For a standard course the depth of water must be at least 3 metres throughout all racing lanes at the shallowest point if the depth over the course is unequal. However, it is recommended that a course should have a minimum depth of 3.5 metres.

A number of old, artificial courses were constructed with an even depth of 2 metres. As long as they remain with an equal depth at all points on the course then they can still be accepted as a standard course.

2.5 Local Conditions

The course must be sheltered from wind as far as possible. If not, there must be no natural or artificial obstacles (such as woods, buildings, structures) in the immediate neighbourhood of the course which might cause unequal conditions on the water.

On a standard course there should be no stream. Any stream existing should be so slight as not to give rise to unequal conditions on the different lanes. The running of the race must not be influenced by natural or artificial waves. The banks must be so designed as to absorb and not to reflect waves.

2.6 Plan

A plan showing the location of the course, the length and the number of lanes and the layout of the technical installations must be included in the advance program.

3 Technical Installations -Category 1 (For RV Events)

3.1 Start zone

3.1.1 Start Pontoons

The bows of each boat shall be aligned on the start line. This requires the use of start pontoons which may be moved forwards or backwards in order to allow for boats of different lengths. They must be of a solid construction and able to be firmly fixed in position.

For RV Events, Regattas the start pontoons must be connected by land or by a Start Bridge, minimum 2m wide, allowing easy access for officials and for representatives of the media.

3.1.2 Steering Aids

The centre of each lane shall be marked by pairs of steering markers placed behind the start line. These steering markers must be clearly visible over the first 200 metres of the course.

An alternative to the construction of large steering markers behind the start is to fix smaller steering aids onto the start installation itself, and, in addition, for the albano lanes to be buoyed at 5 metres intervals for the first 100 metres of the course. These buoys shall be of a different colour from those marking the majority of the course - see 3.2.3 Buoys.

3.1.3 Start Tower

The start tower shall be between 40 and 50 metres behind the start line in the centre of the course. The tower shall be equipped with a covered platform for the starter which shall be not less than 3 metres and not more than 6 metres above the water level, depending on the distance from the start line. The tower shall be built in such a way that the starter has a clear view over the entire start area, including the aligner's hut.

3.1.4 Starter's Equipment

The tower should be equipped with either one or two large clocks that are clearly visible from a minimum distance of 100m to the crews on the course and those crews waiting for the start, or with other equipment which will allow the starter to inform the crews of the time remaining before the start of their race. In case of delay or postponement, a revised starting time shall be displayed to competitors on a large board by the starter. The starter shall give his instructions and orders by means of a microphone connected to loudspeakers so arranged that they may be heard simultaneously by all competitors.

In addition, the start tower must be provided with a red flag, a bell, a megaphone or a microphone and loudspeakers, a board and chalks or felt markers to enable the starter to inform crews of any postponement of races.

3.1.5 Radio or telephone communication

The starter shall be in direct communication by radio and/or telephone with the Judge at the Start, the Judge at the Finish, the Control Commission and the President of the Jury.

3.1.6 Aligner's Hut

This shall be a fixed structure placed exactly on the start line, ideally not less than 15m from the first lane and no more than 30m. The floor level of the hut should be between 1m and 2m above the water level. The hut should provide weather protection for up to 4 persons and there should be enough space so that the Judge at the Start and the aligner can both clearly observe the start line. The Judge at the Start shall sit closer to the first lane with the aligner behind him, at a higher level. There shall be radio links between the aligner and the start pontoon officials who shall be provided with earphones.

For RV Events, it is preferred if the hut be provided with false start control equipment, producing a "freezing the picture" system. This requires a video camera, a computer, two monitors and a printer.

3.1.7 The Start Line

The start line shall be defined as the line running between a thin vertical wire in the aligner's hut and a vertical black line painted on to a fixed marker on the far side of the course. The background colour for this marker shall be bright yellow.

The aligner's hut must carry two thin wires (1mm) fixed vertically and along the line of the start (40 to 50cm apart) at the front of the hut and kept in tension

3.1.8 Other Facilities

There shall be facilities for effecting minor repairs in the neighbourhood of the start, (this will require a substantial pontoon). Adequate toilet facilities should be provided either as a permanent fixture or by using temporary units.

3.1.9 Start Zone

The start zone is the first 100m of the course, from the start line to the 100m line. The start zone shall be marked by Albano system buoys of a different colour (red) and also by two white flags outside the limits of the course at the 100m mark.

3.1.10 Alignment Control Mechanism

RV Events may use an alignment control mechanism in the centre of each lane which shall hold the bow of the boat in a fixed position on the start line until the starter makes the start.

Such a mechanism shall be designed to hold the bow safely, without any risk of damage to the boat. It shall release the bow of the boat immediately when an electrical signal is triggered by the starter. The mechanism shall also be designed to operate in a "fail safe" manner i.e. if there is any fault with the mechanism, and then it shall immediately release the bow of the boat and move to a position such that no damage can be caused to any part of the boat.

3.1.11 Visible Signal and Audible Signal

At RV Events the start shall be given using a visible and an audible signal.

The traffic lights showing the visible signal and the loudspeaker emitting the audible signal shall be fixed adjacent to each start pontoon.

The centre of the traffic lights shall be fixed at a height of between 0.7 metres and 1.1 metres above the water level. Each traffic light shall be positioned 2.0 metres from the centre line of the start pontoon, on the side nearer the centre of the course. There shall be a visible signal which operates in only three positions:

- a neutral (black) position
- a red light signal
- a green light signal.

The starter shall start the race by operating just one button. This button will control the green light signal and the sound signal; it will start the timing system, it will freeze the video picture for the Judge at the Start and it will release the alignment control mechanism (if provided).

The control system shall be designed to allow the following order of events as far as the crews are concerned:

- neutral (black) – no lights - no sound signal
- red light, no sound signal
- if necessary, return straight from red back to neutral
- green light and a sound signal.

The mechanism must not have more than three positions for the visible signal (neutral, red and green) and the control system must be capable of returning from red to neutral without passing through green.

The mechanism must ensure that the green light and the sound signal are given at exactly the same time.

Separate traffic light units shall be fixed so that they can be seen by the starter and by the Judge at the Start.

The electrical system shall be provided with a duplicate, back-up system. Both the red and the green signals shall be clearly visible to the bow person in an eight even in conditions of bright sunlight.

3.2 Between Start and Finish

3.2.1 Lanes

The lanes shall be buoyed according to the Albano system. These lanes must be straight and of the same width over their whole length.

The width of each lane shall be 13.5m. (In special circumstances the width of each lane may be reduced to 12.5m).

For a standard course it is recommended that there should be eight buoyed lanes, (minimum is six).

For RV Events there shall be a minimum of 8 buoyed lanes.

3.2.2 Lane numbering

Lane No 1 should be on the left hand side of the starter in the Start Tower looking towards the Finish.

3.2.3 Buoys

The space between buoys along the axis of the course shall be not more than 12.5 metres but preferably 10 metres. The surface of these buoys (whose diameter shall not exceed 15cm) shall be pliant (not hard) and their colour, luminous yellow-orange, shall be the same in all lanes. There shall be a line of buoys of a different colour every 250 metres, (red). It is recommended that all the buoys in the first 100 metres and in the last 250 metres shall also be of this different colour.

Note: By-law 3.1.2 authorises buoys in first 100m of course at 5 metre intervals in certain situations.

There shall be no buoys on the start line or on the finish line. In particular venues it is acceptable to use white (or other colours) buoys instead of yellow buoys as long as these alternative colours are clearly visible to the rowers and to the officials.

3.2.4 Distance Markers

The distance marker at the finish shall be 2000. Every 250 metres beyond the start, the distance from the start shall be marked on both sides of the course, either by clearly visible boards of a minimum size of 2m x 1m on the banks or by cubes (1m cube) on the water. They should read, at the first 250 metre mark - “250”, then “500”, and so on to the 1750 metre mark.

3.2.5 Intermediate Times

Equipment to the satisfaction of the Competition Commission shall be provided every 500 metres for recording the intermediate times and placings of all competitors.

Timing equipment may be installed on the bank adjacent to the course, provided the personnel who will operate such equipment are not more than 15 metres from the nearest lane.

Where the timing equipment is to be located on a floating platform, then such platform shall be fixed and located off the course no closer than 5 metres to the nearest lane.

The timing equipment shall be housed in an adequate structure to provide protection for the operators of such equipment from the elements.

Any floating installation shall be stable, in a fixed position and of such dimension considered safe for the operators of any equipment.

3.3 The Finish Area

3.3.1 Finish Line

The finish line shall be marked by a vertical wire tautly stretched immediately in front of the Judges at the Finish. On the other bank there shall be a corresponding and clearly visible mark (a black band on a board painted luminous-yellow). Alternatively two vertical wires may be used.

The finish line may be marked on the water by two red flags placed on white buoys at least 5 metres outside the course on each side. If necessary, the two red flags (or one of them) may be placed on the bank. It is essential that these flags be exactly on the finish line and that they do not impede the view of the judges at the finish nor the progress of crews going to the start.

3.3.2 Finish Tower

This must be a structure erected exactly on the finish line and placed approximately 30 metres from the outside of the racing lanes. It should have three levels. It should accommodate the timing, the Judges at the Finish and the photo-finish equipment together in the same room. In addition it can accommodate the commentary, the results board operator, TV cameras and a RV regatta control room. There must be a loud hooter or horn to signal to each crew that it has crossed the finish line.

3.3.3 Area beyond the finish

There shall be sufficient clear water beyond the finish line to allow crews to stop. Ideally this should be 200m. If the boathouse area is located beyond the finish line this is essential. Under other arrangements a minimum distance of 100m might be acceptable.

3.3.4 Timing and Results Systems

Times shall be shown to 1/100th of a second on the Results Sheets and on the Scoreboard.

In the case of close finishes the order of finish must be determined by means of special equipment such as a photo-finish camera, capable of measuring time differences to at least 1/100th of a second.

For RV Events, a full back up of the timing/results/photo-finish systems shall be provided. The timing/results/photo-finish systems must comply with the specifications and descriptions given in the latest edition of "The RA Manual for Rowing Championships".

3.3.5 Results/Video Board

A results and/or video board should be located in a position where it is visible from the main spectator areas and, if possible, by the competitors at the end of the race.

The operation of the results/video board must comply with the specifications and descriptions given in the latest edition of "The RA Manual for Rowing Championships".

4 Technical installations - Category 2

All other courses shall be classified as having Category 2 technical installations.

A number of Category 2 courses may well provide facilities and equipment which make them very close to or similar to Category 1 courses. In these cases it is quite possible to hold successful regattas but it would not be possible for them to host RV Events.

5 Adjustment for Regattas

The provisions of these rules shall apply to all regattas conducted under the auspices of RV, but may be adjusted with the concurrence of the Board to suit the requirements of the event or the venue for the event.

6 Grading of Courses

- 6.1 For the ease of conduct of events and inspection of facilities, the Board, on the recommendation of the Competition Commission, shall assess all rowing courses in RV into the following categories:
 - 6.1.1 Level 1 (“RV – Championship Courses”) which are courses which have been approved by RV for the conduct of State Championships events;
 - 6.1.2 Level 2 (“Other Events”) which are courses deemed by the Competition Commission not to meet the standard required for the conduct of other events;
 - 6.1.3** Level 3 (“Unclassified”) which are all courses which have not been classified by the Board as either Level 1,2 or 3, or courses which are not suitable for the *conduct of events under the auspices of RV*.
- 6.2 All Clubs, or the Person or Body responsible for the Administration of a Rowing Course, shall be entitled to apply to the Board for the grading or reclassification of a rowing course, which shall be subject to the:
 - 6.2.1 Ability to show that the course to be inspected complies with the standards provided under these rules;
 - 6.2.2 Ability to show that events, of a standard acceptable to the Board, have been conducted on the course.

7 Courses not meeting requirements

Any Club or other body which has been awarded the conduct of a regatta to which these Rules apply, on a course which does not fulfil the requirements of these Rules in any respect, must apply in writing to the Board for permission to vary such requirements

The application must be lodged with the RV CEO for consideration by the Competition Commission, and its report and recommendation to the Board.

The application must specify in what respects the proposed course will not meet such requirements or varies from the standards provided in these Rules.

The Board may, in its discretion, and on the advice of the Competition Commission, approve such variations.

Courses not meeting these requirements or failing to obtain an approved variation from the Board within three months of the date of the event shall not be permitted to be used.

APPENDIX 2 ADVERTISING

1 General Principles

1.1 These rules:

1.1.1 Apply to all regattas conducted under the auspices of RV;

1.1.2 Apply to competitors, boats and oars as well as to regatta officials and umpires when they are on the water during the hours of the regatta, and at any time on or near the victory pontoon or stage.

1.2 Subject to meeting any advertising and signage requirements of RV on behalf of its sponsors, all forms of fixed advertising at events conducted by or on behalf of RV shall be under the control of the Organizing Committee appointed by the Board for that event.

2 Application of RA Advertising Rules

The RA Advertising Rules shall apply to RV as if the RV was RA.

APPENDIX 3 PROGRESSION SYSTEM

The progression system applying to RV Events shall be that approved at the time the RV Event is approved. Otherwise, the RA progression system shall apply.

APPENDIX 8 COMMISSION CHARTERS

Duties of the Commissions

1. Terms of Reference

- 1.1 Commissions are established to assist RV meet the objectives of the strategic plan. They shall undertake the activities set out below and provide expertise and advice to both the Board and management of RV.
- 1.2 Each Commission:
 - 1.2.1 will meet at least twice a year as required
 - 1.2.2 will liaise with the Board and CEO through its Chair.
 - 1.2.3 will liaise with other Commissions.
 - 1.2.4 reports to the CEO and provides minutes of their meetings to the CEO.
 - 1.2.5 where necessary, present to the Board under instruction from the CEO.
 - 1.2.6 will provide an annual report to the Board and any other reports as required.
 - 1.2.7 should have access to senior management and all employees and may, with prior approval of the CEO and where it deems it appropriate, engage outside experts.
 - 1.2.8 should rotate 50% of its membership annually where possible.
 - 1.2.9 the CEO shall advertise all commission positions annually

Specific Duties of the Commissions

2. Competition Commission Charter

2.1. General Area of Responsibility

To advise the CEO and the Events Manager on the RV competition program with the intent of maximizing participation in a safe and inviting environment.

2.2. Objectives and Activities

- 2.2.1 To assist the Events Manager in the allocation of regatta dates, regatta formats and venues amongst applications received and to implement those decisions.
- 2.2.2 Assist in the determination for the schedule of events, boat types and their pre-set order at each regatta, in consultation with each regatta committee.
- 2.2.3 Monitor the conduct of regattas in accordance with established guidelines and standards, and make recommendations to the CEO in respect of such matters.
- 2.2.4 To advise and assist Organising Committees to improve the standard of facilities and regatta courses for all Victorian events.
- 2.2.5 To consult, consider and represent all membership categories in the competition structure when making recommendations

2.2.6 To advise the CEO of required risk mitigation with the intent of maximising participation in a safe and inviting environment

2.2.7 The event manager will set the agenda and take the minutes in order to have them approved within 7 days of the meeting and published on the RV website.

2.3. Appointment

The Competition Commission shall consist, the, Regatta and Events Manager and such other members as are able to contribute effectively to the planning and review of the domestic competitions.

3. Umpires Commission Charter

3.1 General Areas of Responsibility

3.1.1 To act as a technical advisory group to Umpires in Victoria and to Rowing Victoria.

3.1.2 To standardise umpiring and to maintain and improve the quality of umpiring in Victoria

3.1.3 To monitor the qualifications and quality of Victorian umpires.

3.1.4 To engage with the Rowing Australia Umpires Commission and kept abreast of current issues

3.1.5 The Regatta Operations Coordinator will set the Agenda and take the minutes ensuring the minutes are approved within 7 days and published on the RV website.

3.2. Objectives and Activities

3.2.1 To provide feedback to the CEO on the work of the juries at Victorian regattas.

3.2.3 To conduct umpires' seminars using the most modern educational techniques and methods.

3.2.4 To conduct examinations for Victorian umpires licences.

3.2.5 To recommend ratification of new level 2 umpires to the RV Board via the CEO.

3.2.6 To advise the CEO of required risk mitigation with the intent of maximising participation in a safe and inviting environment.

3.3. Appointment

The Commission shall consist of the RV Regatta Operations, a Chairperson, a Secretary and a minimum of two other members.

4. Medical Commissioner Charter

4.1 General Area of Responsibility

The role of the Medical Commissioner is to advise RV on relevant medical issues and establish appropriate medical facilities at regattas.

4.2 Objectives and Activities

4.2.1 Provide medical expertise and advice to the RV Board

4.2.2 Assist in the development of RV policies such as extreme heat or cold policies /on water safety

4.2.3 Organise qualified medical personnel for major events (to work with the RV nominated rescue/first aid provider)

4.3 Appointment

4.3.1 Commissioner to be convened by invitation to interested professionals

4.3.2 Commissioner to report through the CEO to the RV Board

5. Development Commission Charter

5.1 General Areas of Responsibility

To engage with the membership on strategies to improve service delivery, increase membership, transition and retention of underage athletes.

5.2 Objectives and Activities

Provide advice to the RV Office on the creation of, and assist in the implementation of, pathway development. In particular, the following areas will be considered:

5.2.1 Elite Pathway Program - advise on the underage programs.

5.2.2 Participation - Advise on such programs as grass roots, inclusive participation and competition pathways.

5.2.3 Education - Provide guidance on coaching and coxswain education.

5.2.4 Club Resources - To act as an advisory in the development of resources to support membership growth

5.2.5 To advise the CEO of required risk mitigation with the intent of maximising participation in a safe and inviting environment

5.2.6 The pathway and Development Coordinator will set the agenda, take minutes at the meeting and ensure the minutes are approved and published on the RV website within 7 days.

5.3 Appointment

- 5.3.1 The development commission will comprise of representatives from each development tier (school, club, high performance), the Pathway and Development Co-ordinator, a chair and secretary.

Approval

The RV Board is responsible for approving any final material, content or recommendations from all commissions.

APPENDIX 9 PREMIERSHIPS AND AWARDS

RV shall conduct separate Senior and Junior Premiership competitions for Men and for Women, a combined Masters Premiership for Men and Women, and a Champion Club Premiership.

Senior Premiership

Points for the Senior Premiership shall be awarded as follows:

Open, Under 23, Under 21, Under 19 and Under 17 Events

One point per crew member (excluding coxswain) per starting crew or sculler, two points per winning crew or sculler, four points per winning Championship crew or sculler.

Club Premiership

Points for the Club Premiership shall be awarded as follows:

Rowing Score A, B, C, D Events.

One point per crew member (excluding coxswain) per starting crew or sculler. Two points per winning crew or sculler. Four points per winning Championship crew or sculler.

Masters Premiership (Field G. Rickards Trophy) Points for the Masters Premiership shall be awarded as follows:

One point per crew member (excluding coxswain) per starting crew or sculler, two points per winning crew or sculler, four points per winning Championship crew or sculler.

Champion Club Premiership

A Champion Club Trophy shall be awarded within RV's Regatta Program where clubs shall be awarded one point per winning crew or sculler in all divisions and events for Men, Women and Masters at any official RV Regatta. Composite Crews shall not be eligible for points.

Rower of the Year Awards

Points for Grade Rower and Masters Rower of the Year and Coxswain of the Year are awarded as follows:

1st place receives 4 points

2nd place receives 2 points

3rd place receives 1 point

RV Awards

The Association may make the following awards in every year:

The William Waterfield Outstanding Service Award. This award is given to a person who has provided outstanding to the sport of rowing in Victoria.

The Kath Bennett Community Service Award. This award is given to a person who has provided outstanding service to their club, regatta committee, regional association or other rowing community which has also benefited rowing in Victoria.

The Bob Duncan Award. This award acknowledges the commitment and professionalism of our umpires.

The Susie Palfreyman Award. This award is for distinguished Service to school Rowing

RV Hall of Fame. The Board may establish an RV Hall of Fame which shall recognize rowers, coaches and administrators of the sport in Victoria.

APPENDIX 11 COMPETITION COMMISSION POLICIES

1. Procedure to Determine Allocation of Regatta Dates in the Case of a Conflict between Applications

Purpose: Methodology needs to be developed to effectively and fairly allocate regatta dates should two or more applications be received to conduct regattas (consisting of the same events) on the same date under the Expressions of Interest process.

Procedure: To be considered applicants must first comply with the Policy and Procedures Part 3 Regatta Operations – clause 25 Regatta Applications and Approvals (as attached). For the purposes of clarity member associations that are not Clubs will be considered on the basis of the Clubs that form the association. (i.e. GRA will be considered to comprise its member schools and clubs). Applicants who satisfy this requirement and have submitted an Expression of Interest for the same date(s) will be notified and requested to make a more detailed submission based around the following evaluation system:

Basis upon which points will be allocated by the Competition Commission.
Points will be determined using the reporting and review processes on the following scale:
1-unsatisfactory, 2-satisfactory, 3-good, 4-very good, 5-excellent.

On Water: To be determined via the Referees report for the last regatta run by the applicant, this will include the extent to which a regatta host has prepared the course in response to the directives and guidelines of RV and the FOPD.

Off Water: To be determined via the Referees report for the last regatta run by the applicant, this will include an assessment as to how well the regatta host met the minimum standards set out in the Application documents.

Organisation: To be assessed based upon the experience and depth of the Organising Committee submitted by the applicant and may include such factors as longevity of the regatta etc.

Other factors: Any other factors which may be raised by the applicant considered relevant by the Competition Commission which may include such material as participation levels and trends, political factors etc.

Overriding considerations:

Preference will be given in the first instance to applications that conform to the draft competitive format.

Incumbent regatta committees that comply with the Policies and Procedures and the draft competitive format will take preference over other applicants for a date.

Conclusion:

The Competition Commission will make a recommendation to the Board based upon this evaluation. The completed evaluation process and any submissions will be available to conflicting applicants upon request.

Entry policy for School Events

The entry policy for regattas aims to provide an equitable management framework that addresses the diversity of rowing programs across schools given the variation in school enrolments and available resources.

This regatta entry process applies with respect to the number of Fours, Quads and Eights entered at each level, being the Year 9, Year 10 and Senior levels. RV reserves the right to review and adjust entries in the best interests of all competitors.

Specifically, and with respect to any single level:

1. A school enters Fours or Quads in divisions commencing with Division 3, in line with the reference table 1 given below.
2. Where a school enters both Fours and Quads, the rules apply as if they were entered in the same boat class.
3. Where the mixture of boat classes entered by a school includes Eights, then each Eight is to be deemed as two Fours or Quads. Refer to Table 2 for Eights only entries.
4. Where a school enters 4 or more Single Scullers, that school will be deemed to have entered a Four or Quad as if it was their lowest-level Division for this Entry Policy. Thus for example, four Single Scullers and a Quad would mean that the Quad would need to enter Division 2.
5. Schools may elect to enter their crews in higher divisions than indicated by this Policy.

APPENDIX 14 RV APPEALS POLICY

PART 1 RV Appeals Tribunal

Important Note: Certain words and expressions, where used in this Appeals Policy have a defined meaning, particular to this document. Please refer to Part 3 - Interpretation for the meaning of the defined words.

References in this Appeals Policy to provisions are reference to provisions in this Appeals Policy unless specified otherwise.

- 1.1 RV will appoint a Permanent Tribunal Chairperson from time to time and one or more Alternate Tribunal Chairpersons to act from time to time as Tribunal Chairperson of an Appeals Tribunal. RV reserves the right at any time and from time to time to replace or remove any Tribunal Chairperson or fill any casual vacancy, provided that each Tribunal Chairperson will be a Judge or have been admitted to practice as a Barrister or Solicitor in any State or Territory of Australia, or be a retired Judge, barrister or solicitor.
- 1.2 As and when required, RV or the Permanent Tribunal Chairperson at the request of RV will establish an Appeals Tribunal that will consist of the Permanent Tribunal Chairperson or an Alternate Tribunal Chairperson who will act as Tribunal Chairperson.
- 1.3 In the case of any appeal in relation to selection to or removal from a State Team selected for competing at an Event, or in any other case nominated at the discretion of the RV Board, the Appeal Tribunal will consist of:
 - (a) the Permanent Tribunal Chairperson or an Alternate Tribunal Chairperson who will act as Tribunal Chairperson;
 - (b) a person with a thorough knowledge of rowing who has preferably had recent international or State competition experience in rowing; and
 - (c) one other person of experience and skills suitable to the function of the Appeals Tribunal,who will constitute a quorum for the purpose of hearing and determining any appeal under Part 2, provided that with the consent of the Appellant and RV, the Appeals Tribunal may be constituted by two persons, one of whom must be the Permanent Tribunal Chairperson or an Alternate Tribunal Chairperson.
- 1.4 No person appointed to an Appeals Tribunal may hear and consider any appeal if he or she is an RV Board member, an Officer of a Member Association or a Selector or if by reason of his or her relationship with:
 - (a) the Appellant;
 - (b) any member of the Board of RV;
 - (c) any of the Selectors; or
 - (d) any persons whose interests may be affected by the outcome of the appeal;he or she would be reasonably considered to be other than impartial.
- 1.5 Should an Appellant or any other party to an appeal challenge the impartiality of any member of the Appeals Tribunal, the challenge will be determined by the Tribunal Chairperson sitting alone. In the case of a challenge to the Tribunal Chairperson, the challenge will be determined by the Alternate Tribunal Chairperson sitting alone.
- 1.6 Each Appeals Tribunal will be bound by the following requirements:

- 1.6.1 it must observe the principles of natural justice;
- 1.6.2 it is not restricted solely to the rules of evidence and may inform itself as to any matter in such manner as it thinks fit;
- 1.6.3 it will conduct its hearings with as little formality and technicality and with as much expedition as the gravity and proper consideration of the matter permits;
- 1.6.4 hearings may occur in such manner as the Tribunal Chairperson decides, including telephone or video conferencing;
- 1.6.5 each Appellant must establish one or more grounds of appeal to the reasonable satisfaction of the Appeal Tribunal with full regard to the full importance and gravity of the issue;
- 1.6.6 the parties to an appeal will not be entitled to be represented by a barrister or solicitor save with the leave of the Tribunal Chairperson, which will only be given in exceptional circumstances and, if given, may be given unconditionally or on such conditions as the Tribunal Chairperson thinks fit;
- 1.6.7 if a question of law arises during the course of a hearing, the Tribunal may, at the request of the parties or at the discretion of the Tribunal Chairperson, adjourn the hearing of the appeal in order to obtain legal advice;
- 1.6.8 the Tribunal Chairperson may require the parties to attend a directions hearing or hearings (whether in person or by any other means of communication determined upon by the Tribunal Chairperson) and the Tribunal Chairperson may give directions from time to time to assist in the efficient and expeditious conduct of the hearing;
- 1.6.9 if the Tribunal Chairperson is of the view that the outcome of the appeal may affect the interests of any person in addition to the Appellant, the Tribunal Chairperson may, so far as practicable, require that notice be given to such other person or persons and that person or those persons may appear at the hearing of the appeal and/or make written submissions to the Appeals Tribunal;
- 1.6.10 the Appeals Tribunal will give its decision on any appeal as soon as practicable after the hearing and will provide the CEO, the Appellant and other parties to the appeal with a written statement of the reasons for its decision;
- 1.6.11 as a matter of usual practice, the Appeals Tribunal will in the case of any successful appeal refer the question or matter the subject of the appeal back to the Selectors for determination in accordance with the Selection Policy, save that the Appeals Tribunal may itself conclusively determine the issue which is the subject of the appeal where:
 - (a) it has determined that:
 - (i) it would, in the view of the Appeals Tribunal, be impractical to refer the question back to the Selectors in the time available in which entries to the Event must be submitted by RV or an Event Governing Body; or
 - (ii) there has been such a disregard of the Selection Criteria or other provisions of the Selection Policy by or on behalf of the Selectors that a reasonable person could reasonably conclude that it is unlikely that the Selection Criteria or Selection Policy will be

properly followed and/or implemented; and

- (b) prior to making the determination in paragraph 1.6.11, the Appeals Tribunal has advised the parties and all persons whose interests may be affected by the outcome of the appeal of:
 - (i) the possibility of it making such a determination; and
 - (ii) that it may itself conclusively determine the issue of selection; andpermitting the parties and all such persons the opportunity to make submissions and give evidence in respect thereof.

Where the Appeals Tribunal refers the question or matter the subject of the appeal back to the Selectors for determination in accordance with the Selection Policy, the Selectors must also make the subsequent determination in accordance with any further directions or guidance from the Appeals Tribunal and provide reasons for their subsequent determination to the RV Board;

- 1.6.12 each Appellant must attend his or her appeal hearing in person or (if the Tribunal Chairperson has decided the hearing will occur by telephone or video conferencing) over the audio or audio and visual link established for the purposes of the hearing; and
 - 1.6.13 notwithstanding anything else in this Appeals Policy, the Appeals Tribunal may give its decision on any appeal on the papers (i.e. without holding a hearing) if so determined by the Tribunal having regard to the principles of natural justice. The Appeals Tribunal will give its decision on any appeal on the papers as soon as practicable after its decision.
- 1.7 Notwithstanding paragraph 1.6.11, the Appeals Tribunal will in the case of any successful appeal on the ground that the decision was affected by actual bias (paragraph 2.4.3) refer the question or matter the subject of the appeal back to the Selectors for determination in accordance with the Selection Policy, save that RV must first replace the Selector or Selectors whose decision was in the opinion of the Appeals Tribunal affected by actual bias, with another Selector or Selectors of RV's sole discretion for the purpose of determining the question or matter the subject of the successful appeal.

PART 2 RV Appeals Process

- 2.1 Subject to paragraphs 2.7 and 2.8, any decision of the Selectors or RV made pursuant to the powers in the following sub-paragraphs of the Selection Policy is made subject to the appeals process set out in this Appeals Policy:
 - 2.1.1 paragraph 5.6.2 of the Selection Policy (selection to State Team);
 - 2.1.2 paragraph 5.6.3 of the Selection Policy (removal from State Team);
 - 2.1.3 paragraph 5.6.5 of the Selection Policy (progressive selection to the State Team pursuant to the Selection Requirements);
 - 2.1.4 paragraph 5.6.9 of the Selection Policy (suspension); and
 - 2.1.5 paragraph 1.4 of the Selection Policy (failure to meet participation undertakings and requirements).

For the avoidance of doubt, an Athlete has no right of appeal against the size or rowing discipline of boat or crew in which the Athlete has been allocated to compete at the Event for which the Athlete sought selection.

- 2.2 Any appeal against an Appellable Decision will be addressed according to the following procedure:
- 2.2.1 The appeal will proceed and be heard within the timeframes prescribed in the Appeals Policy by an Appeals Tribunal established by RV in accordance with the Appeals Policy;
- 2.2.2 Any subsequent appeal will be heard by the RV Board.
- 2.3 If there is more than one appeal to an Appeals Tribunal or to the RV Board that impacts upon the selection of a team or crew to compete in an Event or in respect of the same position for an individual Athlete, then at the direction of the Tribunal Chairperson such appeals may be consolidated and heard together on such terms or subject to such procedures as the Tribunal Chairperson determines in his or her discretion.
- 2.4 The sole grounds for any appeal to the Appeals Tribunal are that:
- 2.4.1 the express requirements of the Selection Policy or (where applicable) the Selection Criteria have not been properly followed and/or implemented; or
- 2.4.2 the Participant was not afforded a reasonable opportunity by RV to satisfy the Selection Criteria; or
- 2.4.3 the decision was affected by actual bias; or
- 2.4.4 there was no material on which the decision of the Selectors could reasonably be based.
- 2.5 Any appeal by an Athlete against an Appellable Decision must be made in accordance with the following procedure:
- 2.5.1 before submitting a notice of appeal, the Appellant must first have attended a debrief with one or more of the Selectors regarding the Appellable Decision (whether in person or by any other means of communication). For the avoidance of doubt, failure to attend a debrief in accordance with this paragraph 2.5.1 will preclude an Appellant from proceeding with an appeal under this Appeals Policy;
- 2.5.2 within 24 hours of the announcement of the decision against which the appeal is made, or of the debrief (2.5.1) whichever is the later, the Appellant must give written notice including the grounds of that appeal (not exceeding two pages in length) to the CEO;
- 2.5.3 Within 24 hours of receiving the Appellant's notice of appeal the Selectors will provide the CEO and the Appellant with a written statement of the reasons for the decision against which the appeal is made (not exceeding two pages in length); and
- 2.5.4 In the case of an appeal by an Athlete against any failure to be selected in a State Team or selection or invitation for progression pursuant to the Selection Requirements, then:
- (a) the announcement of the decision can arise from an omission to name the Athlete in a State Team or State Squad or list of invitees for progression;
- (b) the time for appealing the decision under paragraph 2.4 shall commence on the first announcement of a decision under which the Athlete is omitted from selection or further consideration for selection; and

- (c) the Athlete shall have only one right of appeal in respect of the circumstances leading to omission under the first announcement.
- 2.6 The decision of the Appeals Tribunal will be binding on the parties and, subject only to any appeal to the RV Board under paragraphs 2.7 and 2.8, neither party may institute or maintain proceedings in any Court or Tribunal other than the said Appeals Tribunal.
- 2.7 The sole grounds for any appeal against a decision of the Appeals Tribunal are:
 - 2.7.1 a breach of the rules of natural justice by the Appeals Tribunal; or
 - 2.7.2 that the decision of the Appeals Tribunal is otherwise wrong in law.
- 2.8 Any appeal from a decision of the Appeals Tribunal must be solely and exclusively resolved by the RV Board.

PART 3 Interpretation

3.1 Meaning of Expressions and Words

In this Appeals Policy the following expressions, abbreviations and words shall have the following respective meanings:

Alternate Tribunal Chairperson means an alternate Tribunal Chairperson as appointed from time to time by RV.

Appeals Policy means the RV Appeals Policy as issued and amended by RV from time to time.

Appellable Decision means the **decisions** listed in paragraph 2.1 of the Appeals Policy and Appellable Decisions means any two or more of them.

Athletes include oarsmen, oarswomen and coxes.

Chair of Selectors means the person (if any) appointed by the RV Board from time to time as the Chair of Selectors.

CEO means the Chief Executive Officer for the time being of RV, and in the absence of any such person, then the person nominated by the RV Board.

Event means Interstate Championship, Masters Interstate Championship, National Pathway Regatta, State regatta or any other event approved by the RV Board for which the Participant nominated for selection.

Event Governing Body means the governing body or bodies having responsibility or jurisdiction in relation to the conduct of or participation at the Event,

Extenuating Circumstances means an inability to compete and/or attend at an Event, trial, training camp or satisfy any other attendance required under the Selection Policy, or the Selection Requirements arising from:

- (a) injury or illness;
- (b) equipment failure;
- (c) travel delays;
- (d) bereavement; and/or
- (e) any other factors reasonably considered by the Selectors to constitute extenuating circumstances.

Member Association means a Club or School that is a member of RV.RV

State Squad means the State Squad (if any) specified or provided for in the Event Requirements, for formation prior to selection of Participants in a State Team.

State Team means the State Team selected to compete at the Event.

Nomination Form means the Nomination Form specified by RV for the relevant Event or Events and without limitation may include two or more documents such as a notification of nomination and terms and conditions of nomination.

Officer of a Member Association means any of the following:

- (a) a councillor of the Member Association;
- (b) a secretary or a voting member of the executive board or committee of management or equivalent of the Member Association;
- (c) an employee of a Member Association; or
- (d) an employee of any State or State institute of sport.

Officials includes support staff.

Participants means Athletes and Coaches who nominate for selection in a State Team in relation to an Event and includes Athletes and Coaches who are members of a State Team.

Permanent Tribunal Chairperson means the Permanent Tribunal Chairperson appointed from time to time by RV.

RV means Rowing Victoria

RV Board means the board of RV elected or appointed in accordance with the constitution of RV and responsible for the day-to-day management of RV.

RV Policies means the policies, by-laws and rules of RV as in force from time to time including without limitation, the Anti-Doping Policy and Codes of Conduct for Athletes, Coaches and Officials.

RV Website means www.rowingvictoria.asn.au

Selection Criteria means the criteria specified in Part 3 of the Selection Policy.

Selection Requirements means those events in which participants must take part for the purpose of selection.

Selection Policy means the Selection Policy and includes without limitation any annexures and the Selection Requirements and the Appeals Policy.

Selectors means the panel of selectors appointed by RV from time to time as Selectors.

Squad means a squad of athletes and Coaches nominated or selected by RV and at RV's discretion categorised by any one or more of gender, weight class, rowing discipline, event or location.

Team includes where the context permits crew or sculler.

Tribunal Chairperson means the Chairman or Chairwoman of an Appeals Tribunal, being the Permanent Tribunal Chairperson or an Alternate Tribunal Chairperson.

Under Age means any Event (other than a Masters Event) where race eligibility is determined by the Athletes age

APPENDIX 15 HEAD RACING RULES AND GUIDELINES

Head Races will be governed by the Rules of Rowing Victoria with the addition of these guidelines specific to head racing. The Host must also ensure the Safety Management Plan is in effect for the regatta. Any questions regarding any aspect of these rules and guidelines should be directed to Rowing Victoria or the Field of Play Director prior to the day of the race.

HEAD RACING RULES

Starting Procedure

All boats must be in the marshalling area at least 5 minutes prior to the start of their race if there is marshalling room for all competitors (or at least 5 minutes prior to the start if crews can access the launching area and start line without disrupting racing). Once in the marshalling zone, boats must line up parallel to one another in race order with odd numbers on one side and even numbers on the other side leaving a gap down the middle and only proceed single file once you approach the start line (or line up accordingly on the start line and wait for "NUMBER..... GO"). Warm-ups will be limited on most courses other than rowing to the start. All starts must be running and crews must be started approx 20-40 metres from the timing point.

Starting Procedure for Late Arriving Boats

Late arriving boats must await instruction from the Marshals or Starter. Boats that arrive late may be allowed to start behind their assigned position, but only at the discretion of the Starter.

Crews will be started in reverse order fastest to slowest and in event brackets.

Racing

All racing must be run in accordance with RV Rules of Racing. Anyone contravening the rules will be disqualified.

Rivers used for head racing must be closed for the duration of the race to all other river users.

Should an injury or breakage occur or a competitor becomes separated from any part of their equipment during the running of an event, the boat or crew must pull over to the bank as soon as is practical and wait for the race to pass. If a competitor is in the water and it is unsafe to retrieve equipment out of the way of racing crews, they must leave the equipment and make their way to the shore (provided they do not need the buoyancy of the vessel for survival). Competitors must not resume racing without permission from first aid/rescue and a boat race official.

If a competitor requires medical assistance, they should refer to the closest marshal who will contact a safety boat.

It is very important for all crews to continue rowing lightly having crossed the finish line to avoid collision from crews still finishing.

All crews **MUST** obey marshals at all times. Failure to do so may result in disqualification or incur a time penalty. Umpires can apply the following penalties:

- Intentional interference or any boat showing blatant disregard for safety

- Cause of minor or major collision
- Finish infringement
- Crossing the course without the consent of an official
- Use of audible profanity
- Sitting in the way of other finishing crews on the finish line

Respect for the safety of other competitors and their equipment must be observed at all times. At no time should an oar be used in anger toward another crew or competitor.

During racing, boats must stay on the course, which is between any buoys that are set up on the course and indicated on the course maps.

Overtaking Rule

A boat is deemed to be overtaking when it has its bow ball within half a length of the stern of the boat in front. When this occurs the slower boat must not block or obstruct the faster crew. The faster boat must be prudent and delay the act of passing if a pass cannot be accomplished without incident

Additional

1. The race host and or the President of the Jury reserves the right to penalise or disqualify any competitor or crew who appears to violate the spirit of the race.
2. Penalties must be published per regatta by the regatta host
3. The referee and race host has the right to postpone or cancel the regatta due to adverse weather, darkness or safety concerns. In this instance, crews forfeit race entry fees.
4. Umpires may direct competitors for safety and/or fairness at any time and these instructions must be obeyed.

RACE HOST GUIDELINES

In addition to the above rules, the Race Host must comply with the following guidelines:

Statutory Requirements

Statutory bodies, Organising Committee members and regatta staff must be supplied with the following documents:

- 1) Safety plans
- 2) Communications plan
- 3) Emergency communications plan
- 4) Competitor notes and safety guidelines
- 5) Course Map

Competitor notes and safety guidelines (4) and the course map (5) must also be supplied to all competitors.

- 1) Safety plans
 - a. all points raised in the competitor notes and safety guidelines (see below)
 - b. boat race official/marshal location specifications
 - c. list of duties to be performed by safety marshals that differ from regular racing. For example, the warning of crews to change course to avoid a potential incident.
 - d. course map with emergency access points marked

- e. description of the points of danger and their location

2) Communications plan

- a. A list of all staff working on the day including back-up contact numbers for regatta staff and rescue (should radio communication fail)
- b. Emergency services numbers
- c. Protocol if access restricted by other on water activity

3) Emergency communications plan

- a. The document entitled 'Emergency Communications Plan' contained in the Regatta Resources Kit (for on-water and off-water emergencies)

4) Competitor notes and safety guidelines

- a. Instructions for safe progression to the start
- b. starting procedure details (marshalling, "NUMBER.....GO", marshalling buoys, distance between "GO" and the timing point etc
- c. passing rule
- d. description of the course
- e. details of any hazards along the course and how these are marked (via warning buoys)
- f. briefing time
- g. presentation time
- h. details on warm-up area if applicable
- i. details on safe steering of the course (separate for coxswains if applicable)
- j. finishing/warm-down instructions including clearing the finish line as soon as crossing the line and ensuring right of way at all times for those competitors still finishing
- k. a request for competitors to view the course maps and take due care at all times for the safety of themselves, their craft and other competitors
- l. a directive that competitors who are involved in an accident or capsize will not return to racing unless cleared by rescue/first aid and the boat race officials
- m. details of river closures
- n. following/viewing details for coaches/spectators
- o. Acceptance of BRO directives as necessary

5) Course map

- a. scale map of course
- b. hazards (including bridges, land forms etc)
- c. marshalling area
- d. start, finish, timing points
- e. indication of the course length
- f. transit lane (if applicable)
- g. warm-up area (if applicable)
- h. no-go zones (eg. area reserved for other boating craft)
- i. rescue boat locations
- j. regatta amenities as per regular regattas such as first aid, toilets, bow numbers, rigging/racking area
- k. location of boat race officials

The number and location of safety marshals required at each regatta will be specified by the Field of Play Director. Safety marshals/BROs will be positioned so each crew will be within clear view of a marshal at all times during racing.

CONDUCT OF THE EVENT

Course Set-up

- The river / course should be closed for a Head Race.
- Buoys should be set-up denoting danger areas, changes in course, marshalling, transit/return lanes and funnelling (through bridge arches)
- Designated “no-overtaking zones” are to be clearly marked on course maps.
- Clear start and finish line/posts/buoys
- Signage for changes to regular river rules
- Signage denoting a regatta in progress and river closures

Competitors Briefing

- A competitors’ briefing should be conducted prior to the event and contain a verbal summary of the competitors’ notes and safety guidelines and discussion of course hazards in reference to a map that all competitors can view.

Timing

- Timing is the responsibility of the regatta host.

Rescue

- Rescue will be provided by Life Saving Victoria or a suitable provider who equals or surpasses the accreditation required by LSV
- Minimum standards
- 2 - 5km = 2 professionally employed rescue craft plus one rescue provided by local club with 1 first aid qualified person + licensed driver, first aid kit and PFDs
- 5 - 10km = 3 professionally employed rescue craft plus one rescue provided by local club with 1 first aid qualified person + licensed driver, first aid kit and PFDs

Crew Seeding

- Events categories should be drawn fastest (anticipated) boats to slowest boats.
- Crews should be started in order from expected fastest to slowest within their event brackets. Crews should be sent off 20-30 seconds apart.
- Time between event brackets should be no less than 1 minutes in duration to allow sufficient time for the competitors to clear the start.

Progression to the Start

- In the interest of competitor comfort, 1 hour is the maximum length of time allowed from the time a competitor leaves the staging to their start time. Crews should leave the staging in start order.
- Each crew and sculler is responsible for being on time for their event.

Masters Results

The host may choose one of the following

- Handicaps based on RA/FISA Masters Handicaps
- Stuart Wilson Handicapping system (2007-08)
- Other approved by RV

1. Introduction and Participation in State Selection

Important Note: Certain words and expressions, where used in this Selection Policy have a defined meaning, particular to this document. Please refer to Part 7 - Interpretation for the meaning of the defined words.

1.1 Objective and Principles

- 1.1.1 The objective of RV is that its representative crews are selected to win each event for which they are entered and that its State Teams are the most successful State program in Australia.
- 1.1.2 There are three principles for the selection process:
 - a) That the best crews are selected to meet the objective;
 - b) That all Participants be given sufficient notice of the Selection Requirements to allow them to prepare themselves; and
 - c) That all athletes feel they have equal opportunity.

1.2 Application

The Selection Policy applies to all Athletes and Coaches who nominate for selection or participation in a State Team and also those who are members of a State Team, all of whom shall be included in the expression "Participants".

1.3 Nomination and Documentation

- 1.3.1 All Participants wishing to be considered for selection must complete and return the Nomination Form electronically and by the date and time specified in the Nomination Form.
- 1.3.2 The Chair of Selectors, in consultation with Selectors, may accept, in the Chair's sole discretion, a completed Nomination Form after the specified date or time.
- 1.3.3 All Participants wishing to be considered for selection must be a current financial member of a club or school which is a member of RV.

1.4 Participation Undertaking and Requirements

- 1.4.1 By nominating for selection each Athlete and Coach undertakes and agrees to abide and be bound by the terms and requirements of:
 - a) the Selection Policy (including the requirements and provisions of any annexures, the Selection Requirements and the Appeals Policy);
 - b) the Nomination Form;
 - c) the RV Policies;
 - d) the policies and by-laws of the Event Governing Body; and
 - e) A Participant also agrees to be bound by any additional or amended requirements of RV or an Event Governing Body as notified from time to time by publication or notification in accordance with Part 6 of the Selection Policy.
- 1.4.2 RV may remove a Participant from consideration for selection to the State Team, the State Squad or (if applicable) from the State Team or State Squad itself if RV determines (and has not excused) in its sole discretion that the Participant has at any time engaged in conduct (whether publicly known or not), which has brought or would have the tendency to bring the Participant or rowing into disrepute or censure, or which would be inconsistent with, contrary to or prejudicial to the best interests, image

or values of RV, or as a result of which the Participant's membership would not be in the best interests of the State Team.

2. Selection Overview

2.1 Selection Background Information

- 2.1.1 Participants are required to attend and meet the Selection Requirements for the Event or Events for which they have nominated. This may include mandatory trialling, testing, camps and regattas.
- 2.1.2 On occasions, progression through the Selection Requirements will be subject to invitation by the Selectors to the next stage of the activity plan within the Selection Requirements. The Selection Requirements may specify the manner in which progression and invitation is determined. Subject to any specific directions or requirements, the Selectors will consider the Selection Criteria set out in the Selection Policy and use their discretion in inviting Participants to progress to the next stage.
- 2.1.3 RV reserves the right to request individual sports science and sports medicine testing and the like to assist in considering any of the Selection Criteria or the requirements of the Selection Requirements as well as the Participant's condition. Further testing can be requested during the selection trials in addition to those listed in the Selection Requirements, to measure performance against any of the selection criteria.
- 2.1.4 On occasion, the Selectors may have cause to employ various forms of progression at their discretion to select members of a team or a crew or crews. This may include the formation of a State Squad and RV through its Selectors reserves the right to remove or add Participants to or from a State Squad or State Team. The grounds on which Selectors can remove a Participant from a State Team are set out in Part 5 of the Selection Policy.
- 2.1.5 The Selectors, within a reasonable time of allocating members of the State Team to a squad, will also announce when and on what basis the Selectors propose allocating members of that squad to a specific crew or crews.

3. Selection Criteria

3.1 All Participants

The selection criteria that will be taken into account by the Selectors in selecting rowers, coxes and coaches for the State Team from the Participants include:

- a) satisfaction of the Selection Requirements;
- b) performance in trialling and competition as specified in the Selection Requirements;
- c) results including, as appropriate, ergometer results, race results including current and past State and National Team performances, sports science or medical tests or considerations, ability to maintain required training loads, ability to make and maintain weight (lightweights and coxes);
- d) the athlete's current level of skill and physical fitness;
- e) any current injury or condition, which will impair, inhibit or prevent the athlete's performance;
- f) in relation to any performances considered by the Selectors, relevant rowing conditions; medical conditions, or equipment breakages or malfunctions may be considered in determining the weight to be accorded to such performances;
- g) adherence to the RV Policies and guidelines;
- h) ability to train in and travel to crew or squad training locations and competitions as required or designated by RV.

3.2 Rowers

Selection criteria specific to rowers include:

- a) Coach input;
- b) Factors relevant to crew combination, e.g. crew compatibility, technical compatibility, and crew balance and harmony.

3.3 Coxes

Selection criteria specific to coxes include:

- a) Ability to steer straight with minimal rudder adjustments;
- b) Ability to sustain the required weight;
- c) Ability to control the crew and the race (possibly tested by recording of calls);
- d) Coach input;
- e) Consultation with Athletes.

3.4 Coaches

Selection criteria specific to Coaches include:

- a) current and past record as a Coach, including performance of domestic and State crews coached, including performance of crews coached at Selection Events, management of those crews and a proven capacity to relate appropriately with Athletes, Coaches, Officials and RV;
- b) consultation with Athletes;
- c) compatibility with Athletes;
- d) adherence to the RV Policies, completion of all documentation;
- e) for Under Age selections, potential development of the Coach for subsequent State Teams.

4. Appealing Selection Decisions

4.1 Appeal Procedure

Any appeal against an Appellable Decision will proceed and be heard within the timeframes prescribed in the Appeals Policy by an Appeals Tribunal established by RV in accordance with the Appeals Policy;

4.2 Appeals Policy

The terms of the Appeals Policy form part of the Selection Policy and apply to and are binding on all Athletes.

5. Powers, Procedures and Functions

5.1 RV Board: The Constitution

Under the RV constitution, the Board is responsible for managing the affairs of RV. This includes, but is not limited to:

- 5.1.1 Appointing Selectors and a Chair of Selectors who will manage and control all aspects of the selection of State Teams in accordance with the Selection Policy; and

- 5.1.2 For the State Team for each Event, the Chair of Selectors shall explain to the RV Board the process followed to comply with the Selection Policy and applicable Selection Requirements, and the Board, if satisfied with the process, shall ratify the selection of that State Team.

5.2 RV Board: Selection Requirements

- 5.2.1 Where the RV Board has determined that RV will enter an event, the Board shall issue Selection Requirements for each such State Team and the Selection Requirements will be notified to Participants in accordance with Part 6 of the Selection Policy.
- 5.2.2 The Selection Requirements shall form part of the Selection Policy and shall bind each Athlete and Coach that nominates for consideration for selection to the State Team for the Event and RV may issue the Selection Requirements wholly or partially by way of updates or bulletins.

5.3 RV Board: Miscellaneous

Additional powers of the RV Board include without limitation:

- a) amending the composition and structure of the selection panels from time to time and in so doing notifying Athletes in accordance with Part 6 of the Selection Policy;
- b) approving changes or additions to the Selection Policy or Selection Requirements;
- c) appointing from time to time a Selectors Delegate or Delegates to assist with the selection of interstate based Athletes and crews to the State Team, and with such powers delegated by the Selectors in accordance with paragraph 5.6;

5.4 Formation of the Selection Panels

- 5.4.1 The selection panel for Senior and Para-Rowing State Teams shall be comprised of two (2) people, appointed by RV and the Chair of Selectors. The selection panel will meet to carry out the functions and exercise the powers of the Selectors for each men's and women's Senior and Para-Rowing State Team and administer the process of selection of Participants to be members of that State Team within the guidelines and requirements of the Selection Policy.
- 5.4.2 The selection panel for Under Age State Teams shall be comprised of two (2) people, appointed by RV and the Chair of Selectors. The selection panel will meet to carry out the functions and exercise the powers of the Selectors for each Under Age State Team and administer the process of selection of Participants to be members of that State Team within the guidelines and requirements of the Selection Policy.
- 5.4.3 The selection panel for Masters State Teams shall be comprised of up to two (2) people, appointed by RV and the Chair of Selectors. The selection panel will meet to carry out the functions and exercise the powers of the Selectors for each men's and women's Masters State Team and administer the process of selection of Participants to be members of that State Team within the guidelines and requirements of the Selection Policy.
- 5.4.4 To enable a staggered replacement system for selection panels, members shall be appointed for two (2) year terms, with each panel replacing one (1) appointed selector annually. The Chair of Selectors will be appointed for a two (2) year term.

5.5 Selectors: Selection Decisions

- 5.5.1 The Selectors have an absolute discretion in relation to a Participant:
- a) in selection to a State Squad or State Team;

- b) in removal from a State Squad or State Team;
- c) in progression of a Participant through the events in the Selection Requirements;
- d) in allocation to or removal from a nominated crew or boat;

5.5.2 Where a Coach has been nominated by the Selectors as the preferred or allocated Coach of a crew nominated for a State Squad or a State Team then the Selectors will consult with that Coach prior to finalising selection of the Athletes to that crew. The final decision will rest with the Selectors and not the Coach who will provide consultative assistance only.

5.5.3 In exercising their discretion, Selection Panels shall meet and their decisions shall be by majority vote:

- a) subject to the appeal provisions of this Selection Policy and approval by the RV Board pursuant to paragraph 5.1.2, the decision of the Selectors shall be final; and
- b) Selectors shall provide a debrief to any Participant who wishes to appeal a decision as required under 2.5.1 of the Appeals Policy; and
- c) Selectors must consult with and otherwise advise a Participant or Participants in respect of a particular selection decision.

5.6 Selectors: Authorities of Selectors

The Selectors shall have the following functions, responsibilities and authorities under the Selection Policy, as well as any additional or varied functions pursuant to the Selection Requirements:

- 5.6.1 Inclusion of Athletes and Coaches in a State Squad (if any) in accordance with the provisions of the Selection Requirements, and allocation of members of the State Squad, including coxes and Coaches to a specific crew or squad, their training location and variation of any such allocation or location from time to time;
- 5.6.2 Selection of Athletes and Coaches to be recommended to the RV Board as members of a State Team to compete at an Event in accordance with the Selection Criteria;
- 5.6.3 Removal of any Athlete or Coach from a State Squad;
- 5.6.4 Removal of any Athlete or Coach from a State Team where, in the opinion of the Selectors the member:
 - a) has breached or failed to observe the requirements of the Selection Policy or the Selection Requirements;
 - b) by reason of illness or injury is unable to perform to the required standard, after having received advice from the athlete's personal medical practitioner (if any);
 - c) breaches or fails to observe a requirement of any of the RV Policies;
 - d) breaches or fails to observe the requirements of an Event Governing Body in relation to the Event;
- 5.6.5 Progressive selection of Participants to the State Team as a named crew, single sculler, or category named in the Selection Requirements for the event, based on the requirements set out in or announced under the Selection Requirements for the Event;
- 5.6.6 Nomination, before selection, of a squad or group of Participants for trialling or progression towards selection as a member of a boat, crew or category within the State Team;
- 5.6.7 Authority to add any Participant to or remove any Participant from any squad that is trialling for selection for a specific crew or boat or category prior to selection to the State Team;

- 5.6.8 Power to exempt any Participant from the requirements of the Selection Policy or Selection Requirements, in accordance with the extenuating circumstances set out in paragraph 5.8 of this Selection Policy;
- 5.6.9 Suspend any Participant or member of a State Team whilst any breach, medical condition, performance or issue relating to attitude or compliance with an RV Policy is under investigation or review;
- 5.6.10 The early selection of a Coach or Coaches to the State Team;
- 5.6.11 The early selection of a sculler or crew including the Athletes for that crew in relation to any race or Event listed in the Selection Requirements in appropriate circumstances, having regard to the Selection Criteria, and the discretion as set out in paragraph 5.5 of the Selection Policy;
- 5.6.12 In respect of interstate based Athletes, the Selectors have power to delegate any one or more of their powers, procedures and functions to a Selectors Delegate or Delegates in relation to the conduct of the selection and trialling process of interstate based Athletes in the relevant state in which those Athletes and the relevant Selectors Delegate are based, in accordance with the requirements of those Athletes in the relevant Selection Requirements

5.7 Selectors' Discretion

- 5.7.1 The Selectors' task is defined by the objective and principles outlined in paragraph 1.1.
- 5.7.2 The Selectors do so within the range of the various Selection Criteria which they are obliged to consider, and these criteria are set out in Part 3 of the Selection Policy. The Selectors have discretion in selection to or removal of Athletes from a State Team having regard to any one or more of the Selection Criteria.
- 5.7.3 The discretion is necessarily wide, but the Selectors understand that it must be carefully exercised within the umbrella of the criteria. The Selectors may make decisions which call for a value judgment and overall assessment of the relevant criteria. In the exercise of their discretion, the Selectors are expected to bring to account those matters within the criteria that they consider to be relevant to the determination, in achieving the overall objective of the Selection Policy. In other words, the exercise of their discretion must be rational, logical and accountable, and importantly, fair to all athletes. For the Selectors to exercise their discretion prudently, judiciously and with sound judgment they are required to:
 - a) act reasonably and justly;
 - b) act in good faith and for proper purposes;
 - c) consider the selection criteria; and
 - d) consider the relevant materials and disregard irrelevant considerations.
- 5.7.4 The discretion is, however necessary as rowing is a team effort where a crew combination plays a significant role, as do extraneous factors such as weather conditions. The crew will be greater than the individual, and the Selectors, when evaluating data and facts, are required to consider what factors will make the best combination or crew for the particular event. It is the relevance of each of the criteria and the weight attributable to them that is the predominant function at the Selectors discretion, when comparing Athletes' performance.

5.8 Extenuating Circumstances

- 5.8.1 Any Participant unable to compete at Selection events, trials, training camps or satisfy other requirements under the Selection Policy or the Selection Requirements must seek an exemption in writing to the Chair of Selectors, including all relevant reasons. The written advice must where practicable be given more than 24 hours before the

commencement of the Selection event, trial, training camp or other attendance and in all other cases within a reasonable time of becoming aware of the failure to meet the particular requirement.

- 5.8.2 In the case of illness or injury, Participants may be required to undergo a medical examination by a medical practitioner or other health professional nominated by RV, and Participants consent to the provision of information from any such practitioner or professional to the Selectors and RV.
- 5.8.3 Where any Participant, including without limitation any Participant residing interstate, seeks consideration of Extenuating Circumstances, a decision in each case will be made by the Chair of Selectors in consultation with Selectors in their sole discretion.

6. Selection Requirements General

6.1 Timing, Notification and Announcements

- 6.1.1 The RV Board will appoint an overall Chair and Selectors for each Panel defined in section 5.4 to be effective by September 1st in each year. The Chair and Selectors for each Panel will submit Selection Requirements to the Board for ratification within two weeks of their appointment or such other time as the Board may determine.
- 6.1.2 Announcements and notifications made under the Selection Policy or changes to published Selection Requirements will be published on the RV Website as soon as practicable after announcement of the decision and any announcements and decisions so published will be deemed to have been made or announced on the day of publication (prior to midday) on the RV Website or otherwise at midday on the next day following publication (in the afternoon) on the RV Website.
- 6.1.3 RV will give participants as much notice as possible of changes to Selection Requirements.

6.2 Amendments

Any change or addition to the Selection Policy or the Selection Requirements must be approved by the RV Board and will be notified to Participants via the RV Website. The change will take effect one day after publication on the RV Website, or on the date specified in the change (whichever is the later). All Participants are advised to check the RV Website on a daily basis during the process of selection for inclusion in a State Team.

6.3 Consent, Approval and Discretion

If the doing of any act, matter or thing or the exercise of any authority under this Selection Policy is dependent on the consent or approval of a person, panel or committee or is within their discretion, then the consent or approval may be given or the discretion may be exercised conditionally or unconditionally or withheld unless express provision to the contrary has been made in this Selection Policy or the Selection Requirements.

7. Meaning of Expressions and Words within Appendix 16 (Selection Policy)

In this Selection Policy the following expressions, abbreviations and words shall have the following respective meanings:

Appeals Policy means the RV Appeals Policy as issued and amended by RV from time to time.

Appealable Decision means the decisions listed in paragraph 2.1 of the Appeals Policy and Appealable Decisions means any two or more of them.

Athletes include oarsmen, oarswomen and coxes.

Chair of Selectors means the person appointed by the RV Board from time to time as the Chair of Selectors.

Event means Interstate Regatta, Masters Interstate Regatta, National Pathway Regatta or any other event approved by the RV Board for which the Participant nominated for selection.

Event Governing Body means the governing body or bodies having responsibility or jurisdiction in relation to the conduct of or participation at the Event,

Extenuating Circumstances means an inability to compete and/or attend at an Event, trial, training camp or satisfy any other attendance required under the Selection Policy or the Selection Requirements arising from:

- a) injury or illness;
- b) equipment failure;
- c) travel delays;
- d) bereavement; and/or
- e) any other factors reasonably considered by the Selectors to constitute extenuating circumstances.

Nomination Form means the Nomination Form specified by RV for the relevant Event or Events and without limitation may include two or more documents such as a notification of nomination and terms and conditions of nomination.

Officials includes support staff.

Participants means Athletes and Coaches who nominate for selection in a State Team in relation to an Event and includes Athletes and Coaches who are members of a State Team.

RV means Rowing Victoria.

RV Board means the Board of RV elected or appointed in accordance with the constitution of RV and responsible for the day-to-day management of RV.

RV Policies means the policies, by-laws and rules of RV as in force from time to time including without limitation, the Anti-Doping Policy and Codes of Conduct for Athletes, Coaches and Officials.

RV Website means www.rowingvictoria.asn.au

Selection Criteria means the criteria specified in Part 3 of the Selection Policy.

Selection Requirements means those events in which participants must take part for the purpose of selection.

Selection Policy means the Selection Policy and includes without limitation any annexures, the Selection Requirements, and the Appeals Policy.

Selectors means the panel of selectors appointed by the RV Board from time to time as Selectors.

Selectors Delegate means a person or persons appointed by the RV Board in accordance with paragraph 5.3.

Squad means a squad of athletes and Coaches nominated or selected by RV and at RV's discretion categorised by any one or more of gender, weight class, rowing discipline, event or location.

State Squad means the State Squad (if any) specified or provided for in the Selection Requirements, for formation prior to selection of Participants in a State Team.

State Team means the State Team selected to compete at the Event.

Team includes where the context permits crew or sculler.

Under Age means any Event (other than a Masters Event) where race eligibility is determined by the Athletes age.
