Chairman's Update - June 2021

SA Sailing KZN AGM

The last year and a half have been chaotic in all spheres of life due to the Covid pandemic and there is no foreseeable end in sight in the medium term. Future planned events may be affected as lockdown rules may be inevitable, and we have to comply with regulations.

Over a dozen events in KZN were cancelled and/or postponed making up sailing calendars difficult.

Schools put all sports on hold and this affected the TSL and junior events. Various Regionals and Nationals were rescheduled to fit in with level lockdown changes.

It has been challenging on many fronts in KZN, namely:

- Getting volunteers to adequately perform respective tasks/duties
- Getting clubs to timeously pay SA Sailing fees
- Financial constraints in KZN limiting any initiatives
- Cut in DSR funding limiting activities
- Starting another Sailing District in KZN
- Shortage of qualified ROs

Some wins on the positive side

- Lotto allocated funds for transformation and development. Planning roll-out in place
- Sail Africa is officially affiliated to SA Sailing
- Comprehensive Maritime Transport Policy (CMPT Initiative with Dept Transport and SA Sailing to increase the visibility of sailing)
- Formation of OSASA, working towards bringing Kite boarding and Windsurfing in the SA Sailing environment.
- Durban Sport Development and Recreation department opportunities to engage sailing
- Resurrect TSL Winter league at PYC. Calendar in progress as well as bringing the boats to PYC from HMYC
- Diversity and transformation roll out in KZN
- Building good relationships with KZN Clubs with Gary and team
- PYC Beach site opened and generating events and new members income for their club.
- Working with DUT and UKZN to resurrect varsity sailing
- Building good relationships with DSR thanks to Precious's inputs
- DSR Budget roll out activities
 - 1. Sailing Instructor courses L 1and L2 10 participants
 - 2. Safety boat instructors 17 participants
 - 3. Taste of Sailing 63 participants
 - 4. Learn to sail Keel boats 12 participants

- 5. Introduction to Sailing 16 participants

- Appointment of a full time marketing specialist for SA Sailing
- Growth of Laser 4,7 and Optimist training with thanks to Jerome and Cornell
- Sail Africa youth development with keelboat events

A remarkable effort and achievement by both Jackies (Smit ZYC and Barnard Sail Africa) for reaching out to the community and helping those in need during these Covid and winter times. (Jackie name meaning is "may God protect" and "Supplanter" which means someone with strength and perseverance.
- A special mention to Gert Le Roux for support and taking the RS Terras under his wing. A big disappoint for the SA Team that Covid has put paid to the Worlds due to be held in Copenhagen.
- To all those colleagues and sailing members that have kept sailing alive and well in KZN over the decades, namely Campbell Alexander, Rob Bell, Derek Wilkes, Rob Barker Sean Jones, Gavin vd Meulen & Chris Sutton – the Inland offshore gurus, to name a few.

Objectives for KZN sailing

- Improve communication with all clubs Appoint a member from each KZN to represent the respective club (and class) on SA Sailing KZN committee e.g HMYC- Hunters, Solings, Darts. Youth. PYC F15, Lasers, Hobies, Youth etc

- Monitor and track membership from clubs on a monthly basis.
- Improve SA Sailing KZN visibility on social media pending assistance from the new marketing incumbent.

- Roll out Sailwave training for KZN
- Fast track Lotto and DSR fund spending on Taste of Sailing, Learn to Sail, Youth development etc.
- Increase class participation at Regionals and local Nations events in KZN
- Support Sail Africa and focus on "on boarding" transformation youth to improve our demographics in sailing
- Roll out transformation and diversity strategies with KZN Clubs
- Get more podium finishers from KZN on Regional and Nationals event

30 Ways to increase Club memberships

- 1. Get Help from Current Members
- 2. Host a "bring a friend" meeting

Encourage members to bring someone. This could even be a recurring event so that new members are continually bringing new friends!

- 3. Reach out to former members
 - Some people might be ready to come back.
- 4. Encourage members to share your newsletter
 - Especially if they're featured in it!
- 5. Invite members' families to events
 - Spouses, siblings, parents, and (grown-up) children are all potential members (depending on the type of membership you offer).
- 6. Help members develop an "elevator speech" about their membership
 Why are they members? What's the biggest benefit of membership? Can they explain the purpose of the
- 7. Ask your members for recruitment ideas

They may have an idea you haven't thought of before or know about opportunities within their own social networks.

8. Offer club business cards to your members

It's an easy way for them to point people to your club and share more easily with their network. "Member referrals are a big source. Give members "business cards" to hand out to prospective members when they meet them. The cards have a line for the referral source so the member gets credit for referring someone new."

9. Volunteer as a group

You'll get to do good as well as meeting other volunteers in your space.

10. Coach members on creating a welcoming experience

Getting potential new members to attend meetings is only half the battle! Remind current members to greet newcomers and avoid club jargon when there are visitors.

11. Ask members to list their membership in their professional bios

It gets your club name in front of more people, builds your organisation's prestige, and reminds members to talk about it.

12. Create an invitation email template your members can use
Make it easy for members to send invitations by doing most of the work for them. You could also

create paper-based pamphlets or member application forms, or boiler-plate text that current members can copy-and-paste into emails or Facebook messages that they send to colleagues.

13. Give members a button or pin and encourage them to wear it

Make sure it's stylish so members will be more likely to wear it, and people will ask what it's about.

14. Conduct exit interviews with departing members

When you know why people are leaving, you can start figuring out ways to keep them

15. Create perks for club members who recruit new members

Little perks and freebies can really motivate people. Think about gift certificates, a shout-out at your next meeting, or even reserving a coveted parking space for members who bring in new blood.

16. Create a promotional video

1. Members can share it with their contacts, and you can share it on social media.

17. Thank your members regularly

- 1. There are a few different ways you can do that. Here are just a few:
 - 1. Create a video thank-you message from the leader of your organisation, and publish it on your website, your social media profiles, and your email newsletter.
 - 2. Each year, make a list of all the events, services, and educational opportunities that were made possible by your membership fees. Publish the list on a separate page on your site, and link to it on a regular basis in your online content and email campaigns.
 - 3. Host a yearly event to say "thank you" to your members. Consider a member brunch, picnic, pool party, or other fun gathering.
 - 4. Write handwritten thank-you notes to your members. In our digital age, a personalised note is even more meaningful and memorable.

18. Assign especially engaged members a "recruitment role"

1. You can also hold special recruitment meetings to give these members tools and encourage them to recruit new members — or give them a few minutes in every meeting to announce their results and ask for help.

19. Film member stories and testimonials

Publish them to your website and social media so you can give prospective members a visual reminder of just how engaged your current members are.

20. Launch a direct mail campaign

If you can acquire a mailing list, or if you reach out to lapsed members, you might see success!

21. Invite guests to meetings

Let prospective members see what they're getting into by inviting them to your meetings.

22. Create a welcome packet for guests

Include things like the mission, calendar, and contact information, as well as information about becoming a member.

23. Follow up with guests

Send an email or postcard, or make a phone call thanking the guest for attending, and asking if they're

considering membership. Sending out <u>a post-event survey</u> can also help you see what went well and what you can improve for next time.

24. Sponsor a local event

Include your club name and logo on promotional materials, and make sure event organisers have your club information for anyone who asks.

25. Give a talk about your club at other organisations

Share your mission and activities with other civically minded people.

26. Host activities for members and non-members alike

A group activity is an excellent way to meet new people. Something like a beach clean-up or other community service projects can attract a wide range of prospective members.

- 27. Host a charitable event like a run or walk

 You'll raise money for a good cause and introduce your club to new people who also support the cause.
- 28. Host a business spotlight event for local businesses

 Local business owners will learn about each other, and about you!
- 29. Hold diverse events to appeal to a variety of age groups

 If all your events appeal to one group of people, mix things up by hosting an event to appeal to a different one.
- 30. Host a <u>free luncheon</u>
 - 1. Never underestimate the power of free food to bring people to an event.
 - 2. Invite prospects to come for a coffee on you, simply to learn about your club and meet your members.

The results of the race are as follows and I would like to thank each and every child forparticipating and the parents who assisted.






What is planned for July?

SA Sailing Regattas for 2022


Dates were forwarded to SA Sailing for next year's Dinghy sailing regattas. The
