Code(s) of Conduct.



Child Safe Standards 2,3 and 4




Children, families and equity.

- · Children and their families:
 - o influence your policies,
 - o know the rules,
 - o know who to go to if rules are broken,
 - o have their individual needs considered,
 - o with vulnerabilities are included in the process
 - all children have access to information, support and complaints processes

- Online contact and communication



Head of Child Safe Organisation



 The head of a child safe organisation must ensure the organisation implements the Child Safe Standards through systems, policies and processes which may include, but are not limited to:

- Child Safe Commitment Statement
- Child Safe Policy
- Code of Conduct
- Online Code of Conduct
- **Complaint Management Policy**
- Reporting Policy
- Recruitment Policy
- Risk Management Plan
